# St John the Baptist Church, Bishopstone

Our Grade I listed medieval building has been a place of worship since the 13<sup>th</sup> century. We now face a serious problem and need your help.

The Scope of Works has been received from the Architect, which has clarified the problems we face:

- Some or possibly all roof trusses are failing
- The ceiling has dropped
- The roof is distorted
- Increased load on the North Gable wall

The current cost of repairs is estimated at £175,000.

We hope to start the work later this year to help minimise further damage.

### **Bishopstone Parish Council**

The latest meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> March 2025. Councillors Thorne, Edwards, Barter, Smith, Tatner and Rigg were present, together with the Parish Clerk (Mike Ash). Wiltshire Councillor Nabil Najjar and ten members of the public also attended. The full minutes of the meeting are available on the village website (<a href="www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk">www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk</a>).

The main subjects of discussion were the Parish Youth Project and Maintenance of the Recreation Field. The Youth Project is a joint programme involving Wiltshire Council's South West Board and Fovant, Broad Chalke and Bishopstone Parish Councils. The aims of the project are to establish what types of out of school activities are of interest to young people living in the villages; provide a pilot programme of activities for 2025/26 and encourage the development of a group of volunteers within the village to organise and deliver activities in the future.

Bishopstone's involvement in this project was agreed at the meeting in January. The Parish Council's contribution of £500 towards the cost, together with match funding from Wiltshire Council's South West Board (SWWAB), means there will be a budget of £1,000 for events/activities in the village. It was emphasized that the main responsibility for planning and organising any activities would have to rest with parents and carers. A number of them had already indicated a willingness to be involved. Anybody else who would like to help should contact Cllr Nicky Rigg (nickyheal@yahoo.co.uk). A meeting will be arranged in due course to set up an organising group to discuss how to take this project forward.

The SWWAB programme, of which this project forms a part, is mainly intended for 13 – 18 year olds. It was agreed that in Bishopstone we should look to include all children of secondary school age. If it is clear that there is a significant demand for organised activities in the village for even younger age groups the Parish Council could consider setting up something separate for them.

Mike Ash said that he had discussed with the SWWAB and the other villages a proposal that each village should have a major launch event to give publicity to the programme. All young people in the village will be invited to attend. This will be run by experienced youth workers and be used to engage those attending to find out what other activities might interest them. An initial flyer about the planned event in Bishopstone is included in this STaB. More details will be in the May edition. Broad Chalke and Fovant Parish Councils will both be running similar events which will be open to young people from Bishopstone.

Separately, it is still the intention of Hotspire FC to use our Recreation Field for youth soccer training one night a week and they are keen to attract young people from the village to join in. Further announcements about this will be on the WhatsApp Network and village website.

The Council recognized that if the field is to see greater use it would be necessary to ensure that it is regularly mown. This task is something that has been carried out, on a voluntary basis and for many years, by the Thorne family. However, it is proving increasingly difficult to fit this in with farm activities. The Council thanked Ali Thorne for all that his family had done and approved letting a contract to *i*dverde UK Limited, a landscape maintenance company, to mow and maintain both the main Recreation Field and the Children's Play Area. It is hope to start this contract on 1<sup>st</sup> April.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> May 2025 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

# **General Practice Merger**

More than fifty people attended the Village Hall on 13<sup>th</sup> March to hear about the merger of the Sixpenny Handley and Chalke Valley Practice with Sarum Health Group from Salisbury. Dr Chet Sheth, Dr Gill Hawdon, and Advanced Nurse Practitioner Julia Hackforth gave a detailed presentation.



The new combined practice comes into being at the start of April. It will have surgeries at Sixpenny Handley, Broad Chalke, Millstream (by Central Car Park in Salisbury) and at Larkhill. The much larger team comprising not only doctors but a number of other allied health professionals, alongside a triage system that will direct patients to the best person able to help them, should help reduce waiting times and improve care. There will be a new system for booking appointments on-line through the practice website (SystmConnect), but it will continue to be possible to book or make inquiries by telephone, using existing numbers.

There was much re-assurance with regard to the future of Broad Chalke surgery. It is hoped to re-establish five day a week opening and, in due course, extend the building so that more and improved services can be provided. They said that the focus over the first six months will be on "integrating our teams and systems, enhancing patient access through SystmConnect, expanding specialist services and ensuring a smooth transition while maintaining high-quality care for all our patients". The aim will be to continue providing services as normal during the transition, though there is likely to be some disruption during the first week of April. Major tasks, such as merging the two sets of patient records into one, will be taking place then. By the time you read this more information should be available on the practice website.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

# Facilities for all the Chalke Valley SPORTS SCENE APRIL 2025

**FUNDRAISING-** We are very pleased to have received additional grant funds of £2,500 from **Empower Salisbury** towards the upgrading of the multi-use games area.

Sports Centre Management – Initial discussions have taken place with Broad Chalke Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee about more coordination and outsourcing of some finance, administrative and facility management activities required by both facilities, and how this might support the dwindling number of volunteers if the Parish Council was able to fund the costs through the Parish Precept.

Grounds Maintenance – We are delighted to be able to announce the appointment of idverde as our main sports field maintenance contractor. We have negotiated this in partnership with Bishopstone Parish Council to achieve economies of scale. With replacement of the old equipment, we had been using likely to cost over £35,000, there was little option but to seek a new way of delivering this essential part of the Sports Centre operations.

A huge thank you must be extended to Nigel Hayes for his dedicated service in maintaining the Sports Centre grounds for many years.

Climbing Wall Event. A provisional date of 1 June has been set for the visit of a mobile climbing facility to the sports centre. This is a joint initiative with Broad Chalke, Bishopstone and Fovant parish councils. It is specifically aimed at aged 12–18-year-olds and part of three events (one in each village) to attract this age group to provide an opportunity to talk with professional youth workers to identify young people's needs and priorities. A grant of £2,500 has been secured from Wiltshire Council towards this initiative.

**Chalke Valley Fete and Produce Show –** This takes place at the Sports Centre on Saturday 16 August 2025 from 1.00pm-4.00pm. Volunteers required!

Biscuits





... and have been celebrating our love of books with a book swap, book fair and the chance to read with a special adult which saw the school filled with siblings, parents and grandparents.



A three-movement work inspired by an acclaimed British composer's experience of paralysis will make its UK performance debut at Smith Square Hall this May as part of a concert in aid of Horatio's Garden charity.

Aged 29, Michael Stimpson was left unconscious and paralysed in intensive care for four and a half months after contracting the rare neurological condition Guillain-Barré Syndrome. He recalls the trauma of experiencing vivid hallucinations from the morphine and the frustration of only being able to communicate by blinking at a spoken alphabet. A lengthy recovery followed but Michael has been registered blind ever since, changing the course of his life as a classical

musician.

Tales from The 15th Floor is a piece for cello and piano reflecting this time in ICU at Charing Cross Hospital. Included in a box set released to mark the composer's 75th birthday in 2023, it will now be played in its entirety for the first time in concert in the UK this May to benefit Horatio's Garden and to thank NHS staff and volunteers whose reduced price tickets are available at £5.

Michael Stimpson said: "The long-lasting effects of this illness has played a fundamental role in my musical career and left me with a profound admiration for the NHS. I have a deep understanding of the benefit of Horatio's Garden for others experiencing life-changing spinal injury and facing months in hospital."

Dr Olivia Chapple OBE, founder of Horatio's Garden said: "Michael's remarkable story of resilience, hope and motivation as he faced life changing illness is incredibly powerful. We are so grateful that this concert will benefit Horatio's Garden to help others experiencing paralysis to find hope again in our beautiful, restorative gardens in the heart of NHS hospitals."

Tales from The 15th Floor is in three short movements. The first conveys the dramatic visions he experienced, the quiet and gentle middle movement reflects the period when his heart was failing and the third movement takes the opening rhythm of a Frank Sinatra song as its theme, inspired by an intense hallucination involving the singer.

The renowned musicians Emily Davis, Karen Stephenson, and Sophia Rahman of the Woburn Piano Trio will also present two favourite piano trios, Beethoven Opus 1 No.1 and Mendelssohn Opus 49 No.1 in D minor.





### **Police Bulletin**

A monthly newsletter from Philip Wilkinson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire.



Over the past few years, the issues surrounding shoplifting have become more prevalent in the news as shoplifting has become more organised and more brazen, with offenders often working in groups, seemingly not worried about being seen.

I've been told by shop managers that their staff have been assaulted when they've tried to intervene, and they are writing off thousands of pounds in stock.

My new Police and Crime Plan focuses on retail crime, and how we tackle the underlying causes and associated anti-social behaviour. This can make our main shopping centres, which should feel relaxed and inviting, less attractive and for some people, intimidating.

We also have to look at the financial costs to retail owners. For small and medium businesses, the disruption caused by shoplifting can be crippling. Whilst I know there are some people who'll say that the larger stores can afford to absorb the loss, but according to the Centre for Retail Research, shoplifting adds £133 to the cost of the average UK shopping bill each year.

In Salisbury, we have piloted a Business and Retail Crime Reduction Partnership, which links businesses with the police and local authorities, so we can build on the existing relationships we have, and foster new, stronger ties with the businesses and retailers in the city. We're now in the process of expanding the partnerships to other towns in the county.

We are also looking at ways to make it easier for businesses to report crimes to Wiltshire Police, so that a more intelligence rich picture can be built of where the shoplifting gangs are operating and the tactics they are using.

We have also funded anti-social behaviour (ASB) wardens to be a visible presence in our largest town and city centres, and ASB hotspot funding will continue for a further year, which means there will be extra police officer and PCSO patrols in the areas deemed to be most affected by anti-social behaviour.

By taking these measures and tackling the root causes of the anti-social behaviour which blights our commercial centres, I believe we are taking positive steps to making Wiltshire and Swindon a safer place to live and work.




