Over the last few weeks a frequent question to me in Bishopstone has been 'are you the new vicar?' and the answer is both 'yes' and 'no'!

After 16 years in the Chalke Valley the Revd Canon Jenny Taylor has retired on May 11th we had a fantastic service in St John the Baptist Church, Bishopstone and a wonderful party in the Village Hall where over 170 people gathered to say farewell to Jenny. Jenny has done so much for the Chalke Valley Benefice over those 16 years and I know that she will be greatly missed by many people.

So that brings me back to the question of 'are you the new vicar?'. Following Jenny's retirement I will be taking over pastoral responsibility for the parish of Bishopstone and Stratford Tony (and also Coombe Bissett and Homington); so in that way I am the new vicar, or Rector. However, I am not new to the Chalke Valley Benefice having been appointed as Team Vicar in 2022 and then Team Rector in 2023 and have been taking services in Bishopstone for nearly three years.

I am aware that following Jenny is going to be a tough act but I am really looking forward to getting to know you all better and discovering how we can continue to make the church a central point of village life; even if geographically it can feel to be somewhat out on a limb! This is going to be particularly important over the next few months as we focus on raising the £200,000 is needed to repair the north transept roof to ensure that the church continues to be available for worship and community events well into the future. I know that you will hear much more about this project elsewhere in STaB but I encourage you all to get involved.

Proceeds to The Friends of Bishopstone Church Roof Appeal



Elections for membership of the Bishopstone Parish Council took place on 1st May. Cllr Norman Barter, Cllr Piers Edwards, Cllr Wendy Prior, Cllr Nicky Rigg, Cllr Anita Smith and Cllr Ali Thorne were elected.

A first meeting of the new Council took place on Thursday 15th May. All Councillors, and the Clerk, were present, together with Wiltshire Councillor Nabil Najjar and two members of the public. Cllr Thorne was re-elected as Chairman and Councillor Edwards as Vice Chairman. Cllr Thorne welcomed Wendy Prior to the Council and thanked Michelle Tatner and Simon Williams, who stood down at the election, for their contribution.

Cllr Najjar gave a short report. He was pleased to have been re-elected to Wiltshire Council and praised the Chalke Valley for having higher levels of turn out to vote than other parts of Wiltshire. At the time of the meeting the control of Wiltshire Council remained to be resolved after the election, but he was hopeful that commitments already entered into, eg in relation to the speed limit change in Bishopstone, would remain. A number of issues, including the continuing pothole problem, were raised in discussion.

The Council considered proposals to sow wild flowers in the longer grass of the Community Orchard. It was agreed to take this project forward and discuss detailed proposals at the next meeting.

Arrangements for the youth Bubble Football event in Bishopstone on 14th June are now well underway, together with those for a climbing wall in Broad Chalke and Nerf gun and football training session in Fovant (see details in this STaB). Fovant are also planning to hold a youth disco and barbecue in August and their own Bubble Football event in the Autumn. Mike Ash said he was very grateful for the support provided by ClIr Rigg and parents in the village in making arrangements for the event on 14th June. A key purpose of these events is to conduct a survey amongst young people in the villages about the facilities and events that they would like to see provided in the future. All those booking the first events will be asked to complete the survey. Anybody else can complete it by logging in using the QR code provided in the notice in this STaB. Please only do so if you are in the age group 12 – 18 years! Two five a side goals have been purchased also for use on 14th June. These can be made available for use on the Recreation Field at other times.

Mike Ash reported that the internal auditors had completed their review of the Council's accounts and the certificate of exemption from external audit was signed. The Annual Governance and Accountability Return for 2024/25 is published on the village website.

Councillors considered the proposal to build 15 houses at the site known as "Whitlocks" on the High Road. All had been present at the public discussion held as part of the Annual Parish Meeting on 9th May (see separate report). It was agreed to respond to Wiltshire Council's consultation on the planning application by saying that whilst the Parish Council does not object to the use of the site for housing purposes, it does object to the scale of the development proposed in this application and to the layout of the site which would create additional traffic and road safety hazards through the proposed direct access onto the High Road. The full response can be viewed on the village website.

The next meeting of the Council will be on Thursday 10th July at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Bishopstone Annual Parish Meeting took place in the Village Hall on Friday 9th May 2025. Twenty three villagers attended.

Matters raised for discussion included the implications for the village of the outcome of the elections for Wiltshire Council and the need to provide more activities in the village for young people. Whilst it remained to be seen which party would take control of Wiltshire Council, Mike Ash noted that the make-up of the South West Wiltshire Area Board remained almost unchanged. Hopefully this would mean that road improvements previously agreed for the village would remain in the programme. On youth activities he drew attention to the three events being staged by Bishopstone, Broad Chalke and Fovant Parish Councils in June which, hopefully, can be built on in the future, though much depended on the willingness of adult volunteers to help.

The main part of the meeting was given over to a discussion on the planning application for the proposed development of 15 houses on the Whitlocks site on the High Road. A number of issues were raised, mainly concerning the scale of the proposals, which were felt inappropriate to a village with few facilities, and the traffic hazards presented by increased traffic numbers and the additional entrance/ exit onto the High Road. It was felt that the development did not fit in very well with existing developments either side and that more planting was required to prevent over-looking. Members of the Parish Council who were present undertook to take these comments into account in deciding what representations to make to Wiltshire Council. Those who had raised particular matters of importance to them were encouraged to respond to the consultation themselves.

At the end of May, the Foodbank had a visit from some of the Year 6 pupils from Coombe Bissett Primary School. They brought with them 60kg of donations which had been collected by the school as part of their 'Selfless Giving Week'. The children learned about the purpose of the Foodbank, and discussed the reasons that it might be used. They were then put to work sorting the items that they had brought, putting the packets and tins into categories



according to their contents and their best-before dates. They then spent some time packing up food parcels which would last 3 days, to be handed out to a single person. The care and thoughtfulness with which this was done was wonderful to see. Finally, they unpacked a food parcel and thought about how the food it contained could be used to make 9 meals over 3 days.

The visit provided the children with a real insight into how the Foodbank works, and they returned to school eager to share their experience with the rest of the school, which they will do in Collective Worship.

Chalke Valley Fete 2025



HERITAGE LOTTERY FUND BID FOR THE REPAIR TO THE ROOF OF THE NORTH TRANSEPT OF OUR CHURCH

As you are aware the state of the roof of the North Transept of the church is causing concern and there is a need for significant and expensive repair work that will require funding.

While some of that funding will come from generous local donations and income from local events it is the intention of the PCC to apply for a Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) Grant for a proportion of the money required for the repairs.

We are currently involved in the production of bidding for that grant using our experience from the successful Big Lottery Fund (BLF) bid for the refurbishment of the Village Hall in 2013 and the village's bid to the Department of Culture, Media and Sport for super-fast broadband, otherwise known as Fibre to the Premises (FTTP), in 2023.

This will be a different challenge - why?

First and foremost, the HLF require us to meet their four key Investment Principles of Heritage, Environment, Inclusion/Participation/Access and Organisational Sustainability.

We have multi-page guidance (120+ pages!) on how to meet these principles and our responses must be evenly spread across each one.

Meanwhile, we will request quotes from at least four builders for the project. The work is scheduled to begin no earlier than March 2026. Why.....? BATS!! An extensive bat survey is in progress as the church hosts four types of bats, Lesser Horseshoe, Soprano Pipistrelle, Long Eared Bats and Serotine; the Lesser Horseshoe being categorised as rare. Depending on what they are doing – roosting, breeding or nesting governs when builders would be allowed or not allowed to begin work.

It really is all part of life's rich pattern.

It is our intention to put monthly project updates in STAB so you know what is, or is not happening. Wish us luck!

STOP PRESS! Bishopstone in Print

More from the newspaper archives. Some things never change – from the estate agent's hyperbole to the farmer's concerns about taxation!

To be Sold by Auction, (Sarum.) By THOMAS TATLOCK, At the Three Lions, in this City, on Tuefday the 16th Inflant, be-tween the Hours of Three and Six in the Afternoon, A Houfe, pleafantly fituate | near the Church, in Bithopftone. fit for a private Family, with proper Offices, Coach-Houfe, Stable and Granary, all in good Repair; with a Kitchen Garden, walled in, and planted with the beft Fruit Trees now in Perfection: Likewife a Pleafure Garden and Orchard, late in the Occupation of Mr. Corfe, held by Leafe for two good Lives, under Mr. Henry Rooke of Ercamore. The Fremiles may be viewed on Friday the rath of this loftant, and till the Time of Sale.

N. B. Billiopfione is about four Miles from Salifbury, 17 from Shattefbury, and 18 from Blandford.

The earliest entry in the archives from the Salisbury and Winchester Journal of 8 August 1768. It is an advertisement for the leasehold sale of a house, "pleasantly situate near the church in Bishopstone, fit for a private family" and with "best fruit trees now in perfection" to be held

on a lease "for two good lives", ie two generations, from Mr Henry Rooke of Breamore. This might be an early version of Throope Manor. We know from the memorial in the church that John Rooke lived at Throope.

In 1909 Lloyd George introduced his "people's budget" with unprecedented taxes on the lands and incomes of Britain's wealthy, including landowners and farmers, to fund new social welfare programmes. This report in the Daily News of September 1909 is of a speech at a Budget League meeting in Bishopstone. The Budget League was a pressure group formed by Winston Churchill to campaign in favour of the budget. Mr Maurice Hewlett, who lived in Broad Chalke, said that landowners had "set up a squealing and howling and hullabalooing such as he had never heard before" (surely not today!).

Finally, he pointed out that "England had an enormous bill to meet every year in regard to the Army and Navy" and "as long as people were so insane and so immoral as to settle their disputes with foreign countries by fighting with them, so long we would have to pay. He prayed to Heaven that that might stop within even his lifetime." This was 5 years before the outbreak of WW1!

NOVELIST'S SUPPORT.

MR. MAURICE HEWLETT'S VIEW OF LAND TAX.

Mr. Maurice Hewlett, the well-known novelist, presided yesterday at a Budget League meeting at Bishopstone, near Salis-bury, and said the wealthy people of this country, the landowners and the brewers, had set up a squealing and howling and hullabalooing such as he had never heard of before of before.

It was extremely undignified to go about the country wailing about one's misfortunes, and it was extremely ungenerous to threaten to reduce one's expenditure by reducing one's contributions to hospitals and charities. But he believed it would be done, because the last thing these people would do would be to cut off their luxuries. He knew of me great man in that neighbourhood who had already begun to reduce his dependents. The people must face that, because in the long run the Budget would do more than any Act that had ever been passed to break down the land monopoly.

Having spoken of the benefits which the Budget will bring to the working classes, Mr. Hewlett said he was always impressing

Mr. Hewlett said he was always impressing upon his neighbours in his own village, and he should continue to do so until he was tired, that the people were many and the rich were few. If the masses wanted there things they could have them. 
them and leave their tiny deposits. Bird life continues apace with the robin still watching us and the wren flitting in and out of its nest in the kitchen roof soffit.





Police Bulletin

A monthly newsletter from Philip Wilkinson, Police and Crime Commissioner for Wiltshire.



In the last few weeks, there has been some encouraging news following the publication of the latest crime figures by the Office of National Statistics. It shows that in the period ending in December 2024, recorded crime in Wiltshire

and Swindon fell by 5.6% compared to the previous year (from 41,903 to 39,627) and that Wiltshire has the lowest number of reported crimes in the country per 1,000 of population.

As a headline figure, these are good results and reflect the improvements being made by Chief Constable Roper, her senior leadership team, and the frontline officers who continue to strive to provide you with the best possible service with the resources they have available to them.

That said, I have always maintained that statistics only give you part of the overall picture, and whilst the figures tell us Wiltshire is a safe county to live in, there is a marked difference between being safe and feeling safe.

Two of the key issues members of the public speak to me about concern police visibility where they live, and the ability to contact Wiltshire Police directly either by calling 101 or 999 or contacting them online.

I support the Chief Constable's commitment to enhancing the visibility of our Neighbourhood Policing Teams by using the two new Mobile Police Stations funded by my office. From their introduction last June until the end of March 2025, they have been out in communities across Wiltshire and Swindon 226 times.

I have challenged Wiltshire Police to create a more consistent schedule, so you are fully aware of when you can speak to your local police officers about the issues affecting you.

We have made significant improvements when you're calling either 999 or 101. 90% of all 999 calls are now answered in under ten seconds and I want to make further investment in the Crime and Communications Centre to improve response times and provide a more effective and timely investigative service with enhanced victim support.

Wiltshire Police is continuing to work hard to build trust and confidence with you, but we know we see under-reporting of several different crime types for a variety of reasons.

I need you to report crime when and where you see it, so I can be confident that when crime statistics are published, it gives an accurate reflection of how you feel in your community and shows that as well as Wiltshire being a safer place to live and work, you are feeling safer.
