Attendance was very good, and those who could not come sent in some generous donations. As a result, our Parish raised £1331.50. Once the charity has claimed gift aid, this should rise to £1422.75, a wonderful result. Thank you all so much. The benefice as a whole raised £7,154.70.

Parish Council

The latest meeting of the Parish Council took place immediately following the Annual Parish Meeting on 12th May. This was the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council at which the Chairman and Vice Chairman are elected.

Cllr John Gibbon retired from the Council at this meeting (see below) and Cllr Ali Thorne was elected to Chair the council in the coming year. Cllr Piers Edwards was elected as Vice Chairman. The main business for the meeting was to approve the Annual Report and Accounts for the year 2021/22. No matters of concern had been raised by the council's internal auditors. The Annual Governance Statements, Accounting Statements and documents required to be published under the Transparency Code for Smaller Authorities were all approved. Full details have been published on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

The Chairman said that, unfortunately, there had been recent incidents of anti-social behaviour and vandalism in the village. Some young people had taken to gathering in The Styles and had harassed more elderly residents. The street name board for The Styles had also been removed. Damage had also been caused to equipment in the Play Area on the Recreation Field. These incidents had been reported to the police. It was agreed that further discussions should take place with them. Residents had been advised to keep detailed records of any incidents so that these could be passed to the police.

As no meeting of the council had taken place since November 2021, due to Covid outbreaks, some time was spent at this meeting dealing with matters that had arisen in the last six months – details will be in the minutes of the meeting on the village website. Mike Ash reported that the new play equipment (two “springers”) was in course of being installed in the Children’s Play Area. A considerable amount of time had been spent on the upgrade of the village website, which now met international accessibility standards. New arrangements were agreed for mowing the grass on the Children’s Play Area and the allotments in The Styles.

Change of Date: The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday 5th July 2022 at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

THANK YOU JOHN!

Cllr John Gibbon retired from the council at this year’s Annual Meeting having served as a Councillor for nine years and as Chairman for the last six. At the meeting Cllr Ali Thorne paid tribute to Cllr Gibbon for all that he had done in leading the Council in a period in which a great deal had been achieved. He referred, in particular, to John’s work in running the Community Speed Watch and in putting in place the community support arrangements during the Covid pandemic, which had been widely praised. A major achievement had been to get through the business at Parish Council meetings at pace so that they did not last any longer than was absolutely necessary!

Cllr Thorne made a presentation to Cllr Gibbon of a gift from his fellow Councillors as a mark of their thanks for his service to the community in Bishopstone. Cllr Gibbon said that it had been an honour to serve on the Council and he hoped that younger members of the community would come forward to fill his place.

Bishopstone Annual Parish Meeting 2022

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Thursday 12th May in the Village Hall. In all some 16 residents attended (including 6 members of the Parish Council). Reports were presented on activities in the past year by Cllr John Gibbon (Parish Council), Sarah Seal (PCC), Cllr Norman Barter (Village Hall) and Roger Stockton (Broadband Project). Copies of the full reports are available, together with the minutes of the meeting, on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

In his report on the **Parish Council's** year Cllr Gibbon paid tribute to all those who give up their time to support our community and make the village such a good place in which to live. In particular, he thanked those who helped out during the Covid pandemic, Roger Stockton for his work on emergency planning, and now on the FTTP project, and Cllr Ali Thorne for looking after the Recreation Field and acting as our "snow warden". He also thanked Wiltshire Councillor Jose Green, who had retired in May 2021, for all that she had done for the parish over many years and noted that her replacement, Cllr Nabil Najjar, had already shown great support, for example, in leading initiatives to tackle speeding throughout the Chalke valley.

The Parish Council had had a busy year. Cllr Edwards had taken over as Emergency Planning Officer and had led efforts to help after the fire in Stanley Close and during Storm Eunice. Cllr Tatner had suggested the use of the phone box by Pitts Lane for a second public access defibrillator and this was now in place. Further improvements had been made to the Children's Play Area and Cllr Williams, aided by son Harry and others, had led the work to mark the Queen's Jubilee by planting 30 trees on the edge of the Recreation Field. A programme had been established to carry out "minor works" in the village, so far this had been used for repairs to footpaths, to replace a fence in Mill Lane and to clear mud in Church Lane. Finally, he paid tribute to the work of Parish Clerk, Mike Ash, who, in addition to organising and implementing the Council's work, spends many hours representing the village in countless meetings trying to ensure that the needs of the village are properly recognised.

Sarah Seal reported on behalf of the **Parochial Church Council**. She said that the Covid pandemic had continued to have an impact on the day-to-day life of the church. However, thanks to the work of many volunteers, from cleaners to those who helped organise services, the church in our village had managed to stay open during the Omicron stage. She paid tribute to the continuing work of the team that produces the Parish Magazine (STaB) which was now a very entertaining and professional magazine providing vital information for our community. The cost of printing had gone up but the printers themselves had made helpful suggestions to minimize the increase. The PCC was very grateful to the Parish Council for its support with the costs of churchyard maintenance.

The Augustus Montgomery Trust, which provides support for those in need in the village, was now a dedicated fund administered by the PCC. Two families in the village had recently received help from the fund. With the cost of living increasing, there may be others that need assistance in future. Any donations to the fund would be gratefully received.

Cllr Norman Barter, for the **Village Hall Management Committee**, said that the year had again been an unusual one with continuing Covid restrictions in place. This had curtailed lettings and the Committee's own activities. The VHMC were therefore very appreciative of the financial support received from Wiltshire Council. More bookings were now coming in and events are starting to take place, albeit on a reduced scale. The Christmas Fayre, the Community Cafe and Lunches are now regular features as are the Moviola film nights but, unfortunately, the Magic Lantern evenings have stopped. The Committee are looking forward to getting back to something like normal as the year progresses.

Roger Stockton reported on the **FTTP Broadband Project**. During the year the target for the number of properties committed to the scheme had not only passed, but considerably exceeded, the number required to pay for the project using DCMS vouchers. Signing up requirements were completed last November and, somewhat to the team's surprise, Openreach immediately confirmed a start to the project and completion within 12 months. The survey of the village was completed before Christmas 2021 and the planning phase was completed by the end of January. Since then preliminary work on the network build has been carried out, as people will have noted from seeing Openreach engineers in the village. The sorts of tasks they have been doing are checking existing underground cable runs, laying new ducting to take cabling underground, finding existing cables runs, clearing mud out of manholes/ducts and putting blue rope through existing ducting to enable fibre optic cabling to be pulled through later. The actual laying of fibre optic cabling should start very soon.

Roger asked everyone to be kind to the Openreach teams. The team had benefitted from contact with them already with good working relationships with the engineers. In the building phase there is likely to be some disruption with vehicles and engineers around the village but let them get on with things and if there are problems do let the team know. There is a monthly update in STaB on aspects of the project. It is the Team's intention to hold a briefing meeting in the Village Hall when work starts.

In an **Open Forum** discussion the issue was raised of the need to extend the 30mph speed limit on Broad Chalke Road past the pub. Mike Ash said that this had been the subject of a number of submissions to Wiltshire Council over the years, with strong support from John Glen MP, but these had been rejected. Wiltshire Council merely cited the criteria set by the Department for Transport which referred only to the number of residential properties fronting the road, whereas the lower

limit was needed because of the pedestrian crossing point, and the proximity of the pub, the Children's Play Area, Recreation Field and the bus stop. However, Wiltshire Cllr Najjar has indicated that Wiltshire Council might now be more sympathetic to reduced speed limits and had already held one meeting to discuss the matter. Consideration of the further representations which might be made will be discussed at the next meeting of the Parish Council in July.

The next **Annual Parish Meeting** will be held on 19th March 2023 at 7.00pm in the Village Hall.

Help Keep Bishopstone Special



Following the retirement of John Gibbon there is a vacancy on Bishopstone Parish Council. The Council is responsible for maintaining and enhancing the amenities of the village. Recent work includes the huge improvements made to the Children's Play Area, the provision of public access defibrillators and tackling emergencies from the Covid pandemic to storm damage. Last year the council spent more than £20,000 on work in the village. By joining the Parish Council you can help to ensure the continuing conservation, improvement and enjoyment of the place in which we all live.

The time commitment is not huge – six meetings a year and a few emails from me along the way! You don't need years of local knowledge, so younger or more recent new residents would be very welcome.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

Bishopstone Ultrafast Broadband Update - June 2022

PROJECT UPDATE

The engineers have continued work in various parts of the village and we believe that they are now nearing completion of the first part of the building of the network with either the installation or maintenance of underground portions of the system. Our last conversation with the Project Engineer indicated that work could begin in mid -June or early July. Regrettably we do not have further detail but are very hopeful this is a realistic timescale.

The team also believe it would be advantageous to hold a meeting in the Village Hall to answer questions from all involved. A date will be announced as the project progresses.

POWER IS OFF - MY PHONE DOES NOT WORK - WHAT CAN I DO? DON'T PANIC!

Last month we discussed the difficulty that will arise when Openreach eventually stop using the old copper lines. There will very obviously be concern amongst the elderly and others who need to maintain phone contact if or when there is a power outage. We offer two solutions that are available now, but perhaps a word of explanation first:

Last month we highlighted the problems that you may experience when copper line services are withdrawn some time after December 2025. Most people nowadays will have a mobile phone. After all it is cheaper to make a mobile call than one using a landline. Mobile phones come in two different types, Smart and Dumb. A **smart phone** is an Apple iPhone or a Samsung type equivalent (there are other makes) and this type of phone gives access to the internet and associated messaging services, has a camera attached as well as just being a phone. A **dumb phone** is just a mobile phone and has no internet access



So one fall-back option to provide longer-term communications during a mains power failure is to have a dumb phone, such as this 4G Nokia 225, available as a back-up. Unlike “smart phones” a dumb phone consumes far less battery power and will, from a full charge, remain on stand-by for up to 28 days or provide up to 10 hours talk time. This can either be used with a cheap pay-as-you go SIM card that works in our valley (Vodafone, Giff Gaff or EE) or you could use the SIM from your Smart Phone (ensuring they are of compatible sizes). Dumb phones can cost from as little as £15 but we recommend that you buy a 4G version if you can as they will be more future proofed. There are also Big Button versions for the elderly.



In order to extend the life of this emergency communication system you could buy a “power bank”. These contain a lithium battery with connections suitable for charging a phone. They are charged up using a normal existing mobile phone charger. A 10,000mAh power bank will cost around £20 and with a full charge and will fully

charge your phone about three times providing you with a total of up to four months of mobile phone use (on standby) or 30+ hours of communication.

If you decide the above is a good idea then it is vital you keep both items fully charged. If you have a separate SIM in your dumb phone, you will also need to use it every month to keep it active. To do this, turn your dumb phone on every month and send a single text message to yourself or a friend. Leave the phone on to discharge the battery a little then charge it using the power bank. Finally, top-up the charge in the power bank and you are ready for the next mains power failure.

Meeting the Queen

In celebration of the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II we asked if anyone in the Parish had met the Queen herself. We were delighted to receive the following stories from the residents of Bishopstone. Thanks to all who contributed. We hope you enjoy reading them.

The Editor asked for stories about meeting Her Majesty, so ...

I had the honour of meeting The Queen on two occasions in my life. The first time in 1977 during her Silver Jubilee tour of Northern Ireland. I was at our Regimental Training Depot at Ballymena, and our CO arranged for six officers to attend Her Majesty at the Garden Parties to be held at Hillsborough and at Coleraine.

While I was attending her arrival at Government House, Hillsborough, a clear and military voice spoke in my ear:

‘What are you doing here?’ I recognised the voice as someone important, thinking it was one of our generals! But, swivelling my eyes to the right I realised it was the Duke of Edinburgh addressing me!

I replied: ‘Err ... Umm ... Escorting Her Majesty, Sir.’

He replied: ‘No. No. I mean, I thought you were not allowed to serve in Northern Ireland.’

I quickly retorted: ‘Oh, we are. I am a company commander at our training depot here in Ballymena, Sir.’ And he walked off to follow The Queen as she set off round the party.

The second time was in 1987, when I had the honour of attending an Investiture in Buckingham Palace to be presented with the MBE. That was a very special time, as HM spoke to me, and I shook the royal hand.

The French officers were most disappointed to hear there was no champagne reception hosted by the Queen! However, we did host one at St Cyr ‘pour arroser la decoration’!

My unexpected encounter with Her Majesty The Queen and what I heard her say

It was May 1st 2012, and Her Majesty The Queen and Prince Philip were visiting The Close and the Cathedral, as part of the celebrations for her Diamond Jubilee that year. Barriers had been erected around the Close as large crowds were expected. We took up our position early, right opposite the West Door, with our picnic lunch, and waited for about three hours.

Gradually a large crowd collected around us and a young lady next to me started to talk. She was from the Midlands and she had a large bunch of yellow roses in her hand which she wanted to give to the Queen on the walkabout. She was also talking on her phone to her friend at the back of the crowd. This person had watched the Royal couple disembark from the train at Salisbury Station earlier that morning. The two were discussing which outfit The Queen was wearing that day and when she had worn it before. It was a magenta coat and hat, with navy trim. These two ladies kept a record of what the Queen wore on all her visits. They were REAL Royal followers!! And they had an aim:

It was to present a bunch of yellow roses to Her Majesty on three consecutive days. This was to be the third day.

Next, the lady gave me one of her yellow roses to give to The Queen if she came past us.

The excitement mounted as the Royal Couple walked out of the West door. Prince Philip went to the right and, to our delight, Her Majesty headed left towards our crowd. She was indeed wearing a magenta coat and hat, with navy trim! The excitement mounted as she progressed along the line.



As she walked along, Her Majesty stopped and she took my rose, and then to the lady with the bunch, I heard her say "Oh hello. It's you again". I was amazed to hear this. I couldn't believe it. To think about all the hundreds of people she sees in a walkabout and to recognise this lady was just incredible. Her Majesty then walked on past us and I noticed immediately that the lady had vanished into the crowd and was gone! She had achieved what she wanted. I was very happy to have given her a rose and to hear her speak, but it was a quite extraordinary moment and encounter. A very exciting and memorable day.

I have been fortunate to meet HM The Queen on three occasions, twice at Investiture Ceremonies at Buckingham Palace and then when we lived in Singapore during a Royal Visit. Both occasions at the Palace were for awards linked to service in Northern Ireland - this is key to understanding the story.

On the second investiture in 1983 we had gained the permission of our girls' Headmistress to allow both of our daughters to attend the ceremony at the Palace - and mighty excited they were. The proviso from the school however was that on their return to school they would have to write an essay about the occasion.

The great day came and the process began. In those days it was the custom that all military operational awards were last in the order of the ceremony - so the great and good came and went and no sign of their father - so it was a bit boring for two young girls.

Eventually I appeared and it was all over and, as a special follow up treat we all went out to lunch at Simpsons in the Strand before returning the girls to boarding school.

A few days later we had a letter from the Headmistress with our youngest daughter's essay - which went something like this:

On Wednesday we went to Buckingham Palace to see Dad get a medal from the Queen but afterwards we had Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding!!

So much for young girls' priorities!

My own memories of HM on both occasions are how small she was, despite standing on a dais and, from the conversation with her, how very well briefed she was about why you were there.

From the private autobiography of my mother Lady Mary Anne Denham nee Stuart who died at the age of 95 late last year.

I thought that you might find this interesting, it is one of a number of memories from my mother's life. Her mother and father the Earl and Countess of Moray were very great friends of the Duke and Duchess of York, later to become King George VI and the Queen Mother. My mother and her sister Sarah were the same age as the two princesses and thus spent time together as families.

Here is an excerpt about a visit to Windsor early in the war:

The Easter following our move to London, we were invited to Windsor, which was a great treat.

The weather that Easter at Windsor was lovely. The three of us were very spoilt; my mother had her own suite of rooms and Sarah and I had a double bedroom, a bathroom and a little sitting-room all to ourselves, and there were open fires in the bedroom and sitting-room. At that time one had to be careful about not wasting fuel so all the baths had a line painted around them, five inches from the bottom, and everybody was asked not to put more than that amount of hot water in the tub.

Princess Margaret was delegated to show my sister and me round and we saw the silver and gold pantries which were quite big rooms, one containing all the silver – ornament, cups, decorations and plates – in glass cupboards and the other pantry all the gold. We had lunch with Felix Kelly the portrait painter and later we were taken to see him painting the King although he wasn't painting the King himself, who wasn't sitting then, but his Coronation robes which were arranged on a dummy.

Princess Elizabeth, of course, was doing her war work. Wearing khaki she went out every day to learn about driving and the inside of engines, returning in the evening. Everyone dressed up for dinner and luckily we had some very nice clothes that my American aunt sent over during the war when there was clothes rationing, otherwise we wouldn't have been able to look as good as we did. My Aunt Leslie had very good taste and sent us just the sort of clothes one wanted for the ages we were. We ate off gold plates which I didn't like very much because the knife made an unpleasant scraping noise. After dinner we played games such as Monopoly and listened to records. The King was very fond of a French song called 'Boom' by Charles Trenet. He was a man of simple tastes and he loved putting it on the gramophone and turning the speed up as fast as it would go which he thought the greatest fun.

terfall of poppies cascading down. Ann said: "The poppies on the wreath are all material and we used muffin tins for shape and coffee pots to shape the larger ones. Wire netting was used, and each was painted with acrylics. The pompom is made from wool."

Recipe of the Month - Shaved Asparagus Salad

The British asparagus season is short and sweet, so it's great to make the most of it. It's hard to beat asparagus simply steamed and served with butter and salt, but I also love to eat it raw, and this salad is a simple and delicious way to do that. Why not pop over to the Veg Shed at Kensons Farm in Sutton Mandeville for the very best locally grown organic asparagus? (Kensons also has a stall on Salisbury Market).

Ingredients

One bunch of asparagus (large thick spears work best for this recipe)

Juice of a lemon

2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil

Parmesan, finely grated, to taste

Salt and pepper

Method

Holding on to the woody end of an asparagus spear, use a peeler to shave off long strips of the stalk into a serving dish. The tips may fall off but pop them in the dish with the stalk shavings. Shave all the asparagus spears in the same way. It's a bit fiddly, but definitely worth the effort.

In a separate small bowl, whisk together the olive oil and lemon juice, then pour over the shaved asparagus.

Grate in some Parmesan and toss together. Add some more if you like.

Season to taste with salt and pepper.

Lovely as side-salad or a starter.

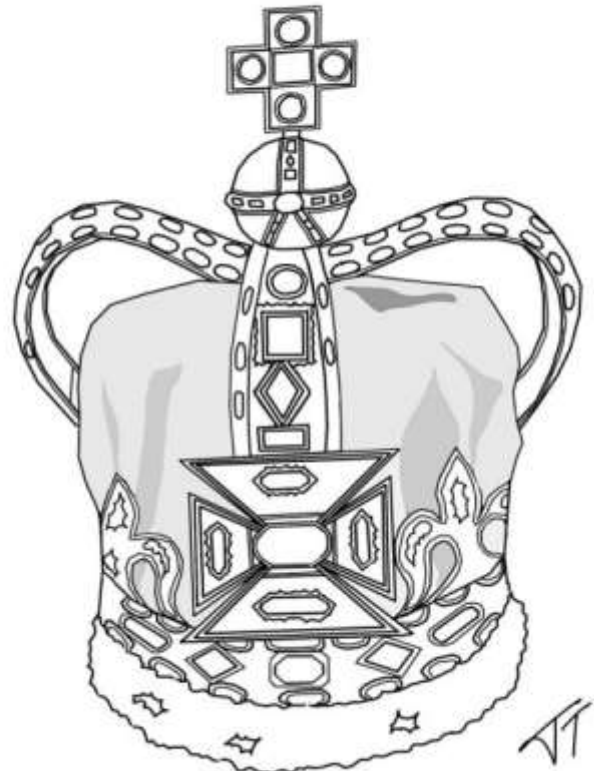
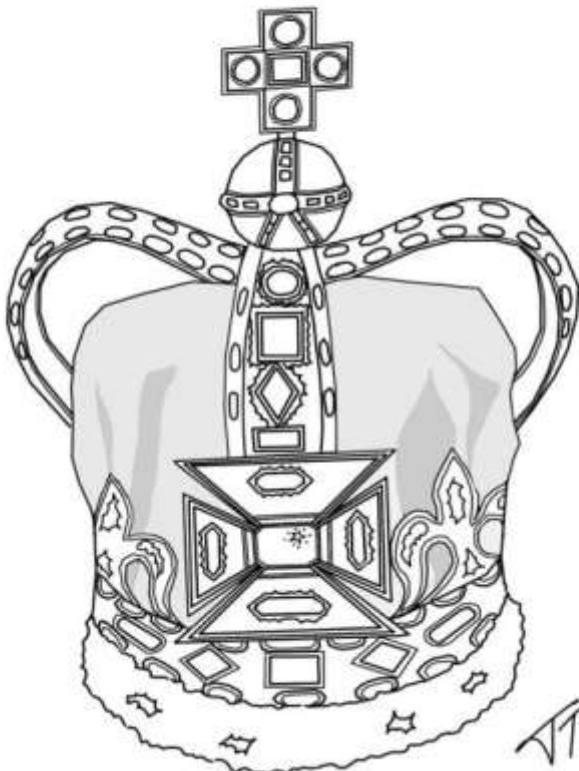

Sarah's Gardening Tips for June

1. Pinch out the tips of Fuchsias to encourage bushy growth.
2. Harvest flower heads from lavender to use in baking, crafting or to garnish your meals.
3. Keep an eye on onion and garlic plants. When the leaves yellow and die back, they are ready to harvest.
4. Protect carrots from carrot fly by covering with horticultural fleece.
5. Start to prune plum and cherry trees from now.
6. Prune overcrowded or dead stems of evergreen clematis once they have finished flowering to maintain a good shape.
7. Continue to earth up potato plants as they grow
8. Clip evergreen hedges such as privet, box and yew, while they are in active growth.
9. Top dress dwarf fruit trees with fresh compost and a slow release fertiliser.

Remember that children, marriages and flower gardens reflect the kind of care they get.

Six of Broad Chalke's most beautiful gardens will be on view from 1-5.30pm on Sunday 12 June in a unique event to celebrate **the Queen's** Jubilee.

This will be a rare opportunity to visit an interesting variety of private gardens within the Broad Chalke conservation area which are very rarely open to the public. They range from the extensive grounds of famous *Reddish House* - **Cecil Beaton's former home** (pictured); to the formal waterside gardens of medieval *King's Old Rectory*; and the pretty cottage garden of **Anthony's Ground** – a thatched house overlooking the water meadows of that name.



All six gardens are within easy walking distance of each another and a sketch map will be provided when visitors check in at the Village Hall from 12.30 onwards to buy their entry tickets for £5 a head. This price includes entry to *all* the gardens plus the village Jubilee exhibition and flower display in All Saints church opposite. Tea & home-baked cakes, plus toilet facilities will be available at the Hall, and there will be car parking around the village.

Proceeds of the day go towards the *Wiltshire Community Foundation* Welcome Fund for Ukrainian (and other) refugees, and towards Broad Chalke's church restoration project.

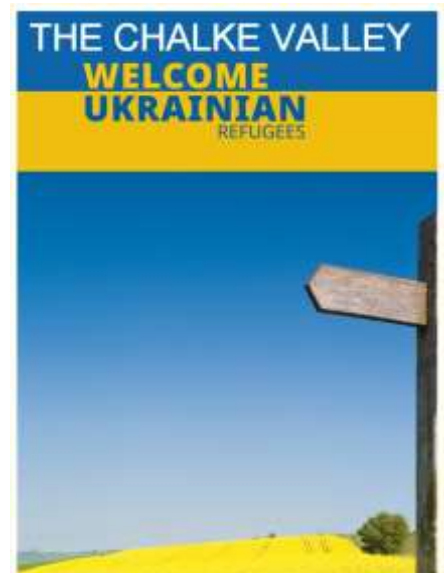
English language teaching skills are in demand.

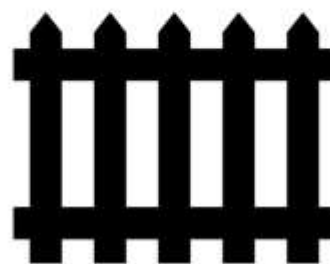
