ANNUAL PARISH MEETING AND MEETING OF BISHOPSTONE PARISH COUNCIL

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Thursday 12th March in the Village Hall. Altogether 23 residents of Bishopstone attended. Reports were presented on activities in the past year by Cllr John Gibbon (Parish Council), Rev Jenny Taylor (Rev Augustus Montgomery Coal Charity), Sarah Seal (PCC), Cllr Norman Barter (Village Hall), Kate Pendlenton (Playgroup), Mike Ash (Village Website) and by Wiltshire Councillor Jose Green. Copies of these reports will be available with the full minutes of the meeting on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk). Among the issues discussed was the campaign to increase volunteering in the village. There had been some positive responses to the appeal in the March edition of STaB, with help being offered in relation to churchyard maintenance and the village hall. However, it was agreed that the campaign needed to continue to persuade more younger members of the community to get involved in village affairs. [NB Since the meeting there has been the massive response to the appeal for younger volunteers to help support neighbours through the Coronavirus pandemic – this is reported elsewhere in this STaB].

Parish Council Meeting

The minutes of the meeting will be available on the village website.

Mike Ash reported that the new snow and ice grit bin was now in place at the entrance to the resident's car park in Whitlock Rise. He was very grateful to Jerry Steedman for providing an initial supply of grit.

Roger Stockton reported on flooding in the village. The Environment Agency had issued an "Alert" in relation to flooding from groundwater. However, thankfully, there were few signs of springs emerging this year. Meetings were being held with the Environment Agency and the Cranborne Chase AONB to discuss use of the Lottery Grant received by the AONB and possible projects related to flooding and the River Ebble.


In relation to the Coronavirus pandemic, it was pointed out that the Bishopstone Emergency Plan has a section on dealing with pandemics, the first action being the establishment of an Emergency Committee to draw up arrangements for local action. It was agreed to begin this process [see separate report on the action taken elsewhere in this STaB].

It had been agreed at a previous meeting that the derelict toilets on the Recreation Field should be retained for the time being but made secure. Mike Ash reported that a quotation had been received from Wessex Contract Services of £438.50 for the erection of steel cladding. This expenditure was approved.

Mike Ash reported that a sum of £1310.26 had been successfully reclaimed from HMRC in respect of VAT paid in 2017/18, though some of this would need to be shared with Broad Chalke and Bowerchalke Parish Councils as it related to the joint purchase of the Speed Indicator Device.

At the time of writing it is unclear when the next meeting of the Parish Council will take place. The Government is considering, in the light of the Coronavirus pandemic, whether to suspend the legislation requiring meetings to be held in person. Please see future editions of STaB, the village website and notice boards for an announcement.

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)



It is particularly gratifying to see how the village community has rallied round to provide support for those who may be affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Following an initial discussion at the Annual Parish Meeting on 12th March an Emergency Committee was established and met on Saturday 14th March. It was decided to put in place the arrangements set out in the blue leaflet that was delivered to all households on 17/18th March.

Producing the leaflet involved a fairly frantic process of dividing the village into manageable areas, identifying and approaching potential co-ordinators for those areas, drafting the leaflet and recruiting the much longer list of volunteers for the co-ordinators to draw on. I am grateful to all concerned for the speed at which they responded to the large number of requests for contact details etc. We are particularly indebted to Alyn Smith at Spectrum Printers in Wilton who turned round the printing of the leaflet in a matter of a couple of hours on the Tuesday morning, to all those who quickly delivered the leaflets in the village and, most of all, to the members of the Emergency Committee who oversaw the whole operation with only limited sleep!

REMEMBER: if you are self isolating, social distancing or whatever and need help with collection of medication, shopping etc you telephone the Co-ordinator for your area (see last page of the blue leaflet). They will mobilise a volunteer to provide help. Hopefully that will be a volunteer who is a near neighbor, but they may come from elsewhere in the village, depending on availability.

For obvious reasons we were looking for volunteers from outside the, considerable, 70+ age group. The response to this request for volunteers was overwhelming. There are now over 50 people in the village on the list of co-ordinators and volunteers. **WELL DONE BISHOPSTONE.**

At the time of writing the White Hart is putting in place arrangements for the collection of take away meals and the Queen's Head and The Hub in Broad Chalke will be doing something similar. Broad Chalke Doctor's Surgery is now closed with all services operating from Sixpenny Handley.

I hope that everyone stays safe and well.

Covid-19 Assistance in Bishopstone

The Government has made clear that a key part of the nation's response to the pandemic is for communities to help themselves. In the Chalke Valley we are lucky to already have the "Link" scheme, which, primarily, provides transport for trips to the doctor etc.

Within Bishopstone we have an Emergency Plan (copy on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk) which include the provision of assistance – for example collection of medication, food and other essential supplies - for those in need in the community in an emergency situation. The current pandemic will mean that there may be people in our community self-isolating because they have symptoms and the over 70s are likely to be staying at home or at least avoiding social contact.

Wherever possible households are expected to make their own arrangements for coping eg. through on-line shopping and support from relatives, friends and carers. However, for a few, additional arrangements may need to be made. For this purpose we have divided the village into sub areas. For each of those areas we have recruited "Covid Co-ordinators" to act as contact points for any resident if they are in need. The co-ordinators will be able to call on a wider group who have volunteered to help.

To deliver these arrangements we are mobilising voluntary effort. Much of the current voluntary work in the village is undertaken by retired residents. However, as this group has been identified as at greatest risk, and have been asked to distance themselves, we have sought the support of other members of our community in helping us all get through this pandemic.

AREA CO-ORDINATORS

The list of areas and co-ordinators, with their contact details, is on the next page. **Please contact the co-ordinator for your area if you need help**. If there is no reply from your contact point please phone one of the others on the list or Mike Ash on 781044. If you have established arrangements for neighbour support please continue to use these.

VOLUNTEERS

Co-ordinators will have a list of the volunteers to call on to provide assistance. However, we envisage a large group of volunteers will be needed as there is likely to be much to do. If you are under 70 years old, have not already volunteered and are prepared to join the list please contact Mike Ash on 781044.

TYPES OF ASSISTANCE

Volunteers may be called on to:

- Phone vulnerable people to check they are alright
- Collect and deliver medication
- Collect and deliver food and other essential supplies
- Provide assistance with on-line ordering
- Assist in the event of household emergencies

Practical help is vital but it also can be depressing and lonely being on your own. Your Covid Co-ordinator or the Rev'd Canon Jenny Taylor (01722 503081) are just a phone call away so please give them a ring and know that you are not alone.

CONTACT PROTOCOL

To ensure that all involved are safeguarded we need to have agreed arrangements for any contacts in providing the assistance outlined above. It will not involve anything requiring direct physical contact. As with the general advice, the key to this will be in ensuring all parties keep their hands washed.

Those requiring help are asked to ensure that their hands are washed prior to handing over prescriptions, shopping lists and money to volunteers. Volunteers should ensure that they wash their hands (or use gel) before completing deliveries. Exchanges should be conducted on the doorstep with adequate distance being kept between the parties.

Please keep this information (and/or the blue leaflet). We hope you won't need these contacts, but they could be very important.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

The hire charges include use of heating and electricity.



A Message from the CVHUB Chairman

Due to the Coronavirus and the current Government-advised restrictions designed to limit its spread, we took the decision to close the coffee shop for a temporary period from close of business on Tuesday 17th March. All coffee shop staff and non-vulnerable volunteers are being redeployed in the shop, which will continue to be open on the same days and for the same times as at present. All vulnerable volunteers, i.e. those over 70 and those with existing health issues, have been asked not to come in to work at the Hub until further notice for their own protection in accordance with Government advice.

The shop is expected to be busier than usual over the coming weeks as more people decide to shop locally in preference to visiting crowded supermarkets, many with depleted shelves. Additional stock has been ordered and is being regularly delivered with virtually all items readily available. Home deliveries are being offered to vulnerable and isolated people. The coffee shop staff and volunteers will be of great help in handling the extra workload, along with the many new volunteers who have already signed up to help. The Hub is very much proving its value to the local community at this time of temporary crisis, and it is vitally important that it can continue to thrive long in to the future.

Tony is implementing rigorous hygiene measures within the Hub to regularly disinfect surfaces, handles, stock etc. All staff and volunteers have been instructed to follow Government advice in respect of personal hygiene to safeguard themselves, colleagues and customers against the spread of the virus. All customers are also respectfully asked to comply with Government advice and directives regarding social distancing. Please be understanding if you are asked to queue outside the shop for a short time at busy periods in view of its restricted size. It will be in everyone's interest.

I and all my Management Committee colleagues are enormously grateful for the selfless and public-spirited way in which local people are responding to this unprecedented situation. We are fortunate in this Valley, and I know we will all continue to help and look out for each other to the best of our abilities through this temporary period and beyond.

Judith has sadly decided to leave the Hub from 8th April after many years of devoted service, recently as deputy manager. We are all hugely grateful for all she has done for the Hub, and we will miss her. Steps are in hand to appoint a suitable replacement.

A Broad Chalke and Bowerchalke Covid-19 Support Network notice has been put up on the home page of the Hub's website www.chalkevalleystores.co.uk. This has valuable information on the help which is available including local deliveries. It will be updated as necessary, so please refer to it for up-to-date information.



Nunton Farm: Loving our Cows, Conserving our Land

People often comment on how flavoursome Nunton Fam milk is. It is pretty special, addictive even, but for us producing milk isn't just about the flavour, it's also about stewardship. We feel privileged (most of the time!) to be able to work outside in the open air with precious land and animals, and we keenly feel the weight of responsibility that we hold as a business in looking after them. That's why we consciously work towards making decisions that benefit the lives of the cows in our care and do our best to look after

the environment we live and work in.

We love our cows and so maintaining high animal welfare standards is a huge part of our farming culture. We are a Free Range Dairy, which means that our 800 Friesian cows are outside for 9 months of the year, grazing freely in the pastures. Farming free range milk keeps the cows happy, but also has health benefits for humans; milk from cows that graze is higher in disease-fighting nutrients such as omega-3 fatty acids and vitamins. Happier cows and healthier people, what could be better?! You can read more about Free Range Dairies on freerangedairy.org.

As well as caring for our cows, we are dedicated to conserving the land that we farm. Farming gets a lot of bad press when it comes to greenhouse gases, but farming grassland, as we do in the dairy industry, actually harnesses more carbon dioxide than it releases. We farm grass fields for our cows, but we also maintain natural habitats for a variety of wildlife by planting hedgerows and trees and through the up-keep of our beautiful water meadows. We are a LEAF accredited farm (Linking Environment And Farming), which means that we meet LEAF's rigorous standards of sustainable farming practice (read more at leafuk.org). Our land is important to us.

If you want to support a local farm which loves its cows and looks after the land then pick up a bottle. We sell some of our milk in glass bottles through two vending machines. They are open 24/7 and are located outside The Radnor Arms in Nunton and in South Street car park in Wilton. Come and try it for yourself - it really is delicious!

In these uncertain times the milk machines are a great place to get your milk - no human contact necessary!



Village Memories - Ron and Jean Bennett





EARLIEST MEMORIES

I was born on 25th November 1930 in Brighton. My elder brother was in the Royal Navy, and I remember coming home from school one day to find a note on the table from my parents. It read that they had travelled to London to find out news about my brother, whose ship had been sunk in the Atlantic during the war. He was subsequently rescued by the US Navy and spent R & R in North Carolina. Half the crew were lost. He returned to active service in UK and survived the war.

CHILDHOOD

I lived in Brighton through WW2. At school I spent hours in damp air raid shelters in Brighton. The beaches were closed because of anticipated German invasion, and they were full of mines and barbed wire. Both Brighton piers had large holes in them to prevent German troops from landing. I represented both primary and grammar school at swimming. Sometimes the papers weren't delivered from London because of the bombing, so I then had to do my paper round in the afternoon after school.

WORK

Leaving school after my School Certificate I joined the Merchant Navy. During my service I travelled to South America four times. We were told that we would have to stay until the age of 26 to escape National Service. I then decided that I would do National Service in the RAF. Jean lost her mum when she was 14 years old, so she had to leave school to help with her younger siblings. Her dad was in the Merchant Navy and he encouraged Jean to continue her education at night school. My Building Society career started with the Alliance BS in Brighton. Moving to Liverpool I left to become Manager for Hastings and Thanet BS. Promotion to Regional Manager took me to Bexhill-on-Sea. Thence to Salisbury when we chose to live in Bishopstone. Jean had worked briefly in Brighton before the family arrived.

MOVE TO BISHOPSTONE

We moved to Teacher's House next to the school. When it was no longer required by the school, it had been sold to Dom Shirley, and we were the second owners in 1976. About a year after we moved, the village school closed and was sold by auction.

When we moved here the village was completely different. There were lots of activities in the Village Hall – the annual football and cricket dances were very

popular. The Croft was fairly new. Two football teams played in the Salisbury league and the cricket team in the Hampshire league. The White Hart was well supported at the time when Dusty and Sylvia Miller were hosts. I played a lot of sport for the village and spent many hours rolling the cricket square and maintaining the field. Jean was a member of the ladies' darts team. Following retirement I became Assistant Secretary at South Wilts Golf Club, Committee Member and finally President. I remain a social member.

HOW DID YOU MEET YOUR WIFE?

We were both at Leighton Buzzard in the RAF. Jean was working as secretary to a Squadron Leader. We became engaged and my parents came to visit to 'inspect' Jean and she passed muster! Jean was then to be posted to the Middle East but I said 'As we're engaged, you're not going' so we got married in Brighton! We started our married life in two rooms above the garage at my parents' house, where my grandparents also lived. My grandfather was a fine gentleman if a little eccentric, and he always raised his Homberg hat to people indoors! We have four sons: Andy in Warminster, Graeme in Lingfield, Neil in Liverpool and Alan in Sixpenny Handley. Now we have 3 grandsons, and 3 great-grandchildren, one of whom is a girl – at last a girl in the family! Now I enjoy watching their sports matches.

WHAT ARE YOUR HOBBIES?

Most sports, having played football, cricket, golf, athletics to a decent standard. Now it's spectating. I finished on a high as goalkeeper for Bishopstone 2nds aged 50! Jean is a very keen gardener.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE HOLIDAY?

The most enjoyment has been taking grandchildren away, mainly around Great Britain. Jean and I have also been to Australia, South Africa and America where we found a family connection.

FAVOURITE BOOK?

The Master Mariner by Nicholas Monsarrat which was made into the film The Cruel Sea. Jean reads Catherine Cookson novels.

FAVOURITE MUSIC?

Eclectic choice: Big Bands, Trad Jazz, Gilbert & Sullivan. While living in Liverpool I worked near The Cavern so was very aware of The Beatles. Jean likes orchestral music.

ANY REGRETS IN LIFE?

I regret not talking more to my father and my grandfather about what they did during the wars, and also about family history.

For Jean, the fact she couldn't say goodbye to her mum. She was at school and was expecting her mum to arrive home by ambulance. When Jean arrived home she received a telegram to say that her mum had died in hospital.

IMPORTANT THINGS LEARNED IN LIFE

Play fair, be more tolerant (difficult!)

For Jean, Be kind to others as you would expect them to be kind to you.

Recipe of the Month - Mini Egg Cookie Bars

From Kate Pendlenton

Ingredients

275 g Plain Flour

1 tsp Bicarbonate of Soda

1/2 tsp Salt

1 tbsp Cornflour

115g Butter/Stork

55g Granulated Sugar

135g Soft Light Brown Sugar

1 Medium Egg

1 tsp Vanilla Extract

150g Mini Eggs, slightly broken/chopped

100g Milk Chocolate Chips



Method

Preheat your oven to 190C/170C fan and line a 9x9inch square tin with parchment paper (or grease well).

Mix the flour, bicarb, salt and cornflour together so it's evenly distributed and leave to one side.

In a larger bowl (that will later hold all the dough), melt the butter. Add in the two sugars, and whisk for about 2 minutes so the sugar starts to dissolve and the mixture is smooth. Add in the egg and vanilla, and whisk again briefly until smooth. (I used an electric whisk)

Add the dry ingredients to the wet, add the Mini Eggs (apart from a handful), and the chocolate chips and mix with a spatula until a thick cookie dough is formed.

Press the mixture into the bottom of the tin and press in the handful of Mini Eggs into the top for decoration. Bake the traybake in the oven for 20-25 minutes, until the top of the cookie bake looks 'dry'! The middle should still be a little squidgy, but if cooked for a little longer the bars will be less soft and more crunchy.

Leave the cookie bake to cool for about 10 minutes, then leave to cool fully on a wire rack. Cut the bake into 4×4 or 5×5 depending on preference.

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Nature Notes - how to help nesting birds in Spring

April is here and Spring has well and truly sprung. This means our garden birds are getting busy preparing for the breeding season and you may have spotted them flitting to and fro with nest material as they prepare for family life.

This is the start of an exhausting time for birds as they struggle to feed their chicks. Usually both the male and female will expend a great deal of energy flying to and from the nest. One blue tit chick will happily finish off 100 caterpillars a day.

So what can we do to help? The RSPB publish some useful guidance on the subject. Here is their top 5:

- 1. **Put out the right food.** At this time of year, they advise live mealworms, dried mealworms, high-energy sprinkles, and buggy nibbles. Avoid leaving choking hazards like whole peanuts on bird tables, and remember not to put out too much at one time or it may go stale.
- 2. **Keep it clean.** To prevent birds picking up and passing on diseases to their young, try to clean your feeders every two weeks.
- 3. **Don't forget the water.** It's also helpful to leave out fresh water, especially on hotter days. Make sure water dishes are cleaned and refilled regularly.
- 4. **Help feather their nests.** In April, many birds will still be building their nests. Leave out natural nesting material like pet fur or scraps of wool (not the artificial stuff, though). Tie bundles of it up with string and deposit it around the garden.
- 5. **Go carefully with the hedge cutters.** Try not to do too much intensive pruning of your hedges, ivy and shrubbery at this time of year, when birds may be nesting unseen beneath the foliage and relying on it for cover.

Follow this guidance and your garden will soon become a haven.

Sarah's Gardening Tips

- 1. Choose plants with a long season of interest to brighten a border. The perennial wallflower Erysimum 'Bowles's Mauve can bloom nearly all year and the orange Geum 'Totally Tangerine' can bloom for several months.
- 2. Right plant, right place. When you buy plants, check the labels to make sure they will suit your soil type and aspect (light levels). This can prevent expensive mistakes.
- 3. Avoid dominant plants in small borders as they can take over. Mint, Japanese Anemones (Esp the pink one!), Acanthus (Bears breeches) to name a few.
- 4. Sow beans directly or in individual pots. Runner beans don't like root disturbance so don't pot them on, get them into the ground.
- 5. April is the last chance to cut dead stems from fuchsias as the new ones grow.
- 6. Ferns. Cut last years foliage to ground level but take care not to damage the new unfurling leaves from the centre of the plant.
- 7. Hedges often provide nesting sites for garden birds so leave pruning until late summer
- 8. Hydrangeas benefit from a dose of high potash feed this month. This will encourage strong healthy growth..
