Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Thursday 11th July. The minutes of the meeting are available on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

In the absence of Cllr John Gibbon, Cllr Ali Thorne took the Chair and was pleased to welcome Michelle Tatner, who has joined the Council to fill the vacancy that has existed since the resignation of Marion Foster.

The main business of the meeting was to consider quotations for the provision of the new Play Trail in the Children's Play Area on the Recreation Field. Mike Ash confirmed that the South West Area Board of Wiltshire Council had approved a grant of £3,990 towards the project. Three quotes had been received for the cost of providing six main items of equipment (illustrated below) which will provide climbing, balancing and swinging challenges, linked together into a continuous "trail". Consideration was given to options for the extent of safety surfacing under the equipment and a final specification for the project agreed. Following debate it was agreed to accept a quote of £8,336 which had been received from Outdoor Play South West (the company that previously provided the Play Tower in our play area).

Discussions will now take place with the company to agree a final layout for the trail, which it is hoped will be in place by the Autumn. In the meantime steps will be taken to maintain the Play Train in as safe a condition as possible before its removal.

Following discussion at a previous meeting about whether to continue to provide grant support to the Chalke Valley Sports Centre it was agreed to maintain the grant but to encourage the centre to promote its use more widely.

Residents may wish to be aware that there is a major cycling event taking place through the village on Sunday 4th August. Groups of cyclists can be expected to pass along the High Road between about 8.00am and 10.00am that morning, with cyclists returning to Salisbury Racecourse via Coombe Bissett and Stratford Tony in the afternoon. Details are on the village website.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday 12th September at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All are welcome to attend.



THE VILLAGE WEBSITE SURVEY

Over the last three months the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk) has carried an on-line user survey. This will continue for a little longer, but you might be interested in the response so far.

So far seventeen responses have been received, which is a little disappointing. All but one of these was from within the village. The only exception was an international visitor; there were none from people living elsewhere in the Chalke Valley or the surrounding area. This may suggest a need for us to take opportunities to advertise the site more widely.

70% of respondents visited the website less than once a month, nobody visited it on a weekly basis. Particular items of interest were fairly evenly spread, with local news and events, what's on at the Village Hall and Parish Council matters the main ones. There was also a reasonable score for walks and village history.

It is good to report that 82% of respondents scored the website in the top two categories (of 5) with regard to its design and appearance. With similar proportions finding it easy to understand and the site meeting their needs. Respondents were split 50/50 between those over and under 60 years old, but most were female.

There were a number of very complimentary comments about the site and some helpful suggestions as to possible additional information that could be included. For the person who suggested there might be a discussion forum – the answer is that there is, its called the Village Chat Page!

We will continue with the survey over the Summer, so if you haven't yet registered your views and particularly if you have ideas which can improve the site, please log on.

CORONATION 1953 DOMESDAY BOOK OF BISHOPSTONE




Friday 4th October 2019

Bishopstone Church Patronal Festival



As I continue to walk around the village with Zinnie (not always in ever decreasing circles) several things arise. We chat a lot as we walk, and she draws my attention to things around us!

I am delighted that some generous and far-thinking person has repaired the Netton Street sign at the Faulston end of the road. It has been in poor repair for some time, as the wooden support rotted and the bolts of the sign eroded; recently held together by a rubber sapling support! However, only last week I noticed it was all fixed. A new piece of wood had been made, and with new screws the sign was properly affixed, and it now looks a real 'proper-job'. Well done and many thanks to the unknown who did the repair!

As a footnote, it is important to keep these old alloy, pale blue signs, as Wilts Council will destroy them if asked to replace a damaged street sign. We lost ours in The Croft several years ago, as we were not quick enough to catch the WC engineer as he replaced our sign. We now have a very dull black and white sign, in the wrong position!! The lesson is: **Guard it or Lose it!**

As you walk around the village and cross the many fields, remember to close the gates as you found them, and take care with cattle and horses. They are wild animals, and like our dogs, can react to our presence in unpredictable ways.

Be Aware and Take Care.

Also, a reminder to pick up the any mess your dog leaves behind. Just today, I picked up two pieces of sh** from clearly mown and private grass, carelessly left behind. This is not fair to the owner of the grass, it is dangerous to small people out walking, and is irresponsible ownership. Take care of your own droppings. Where the grass is mown, it is private and any mess MUST be gathered by the perpetrator. Where the track or path is in wild field condition, then the answer is to kick the offending article into the hedge. In no case should such things be left in full view, in the middle of the path. Please help us all to keep a clean village, more welcoming to visitors, ramblers and walkers. **Note it, Bag it and Bin it!**

Enough ranting! What a great success the Chalke Valley History Festival was this year. Yet another win for the Valley, and some incredibly interesting talks and demonstrations to be heard and seen. CRESS Open Garden - Thank you

The weather was kind on 15th & 16th of June when Caroline Lamb founder and CEO of CRESS opened her gardens at Knighton Manor, Broadchalke to raise funds for the 10th Anniversary Trip this autumn.

Over the two afternoons 260 people came and enjoyed wandering through the flowers and sitting on the magnificent lawn to have afternoon tea. One of the visitors, Vicky said "[I] so enjoyed looking at your beautiful garden, well done, a perfect afternoon".

The total raised was approximately £4,000 – exact figures will be announced shortly. The funds raised are for workshops which will be held in Uganda while CRESS members are visiting in September. The workshops will include information for refugees on handling the trauma many have experienced through the civil war.

Young Apai is one of the people who has been helped by the trauma therapy we provide. She is just 15 years old and witnessed a horrific attack on her father when they went to graze their small herd of cattle in South Sudan. During a night attack, unknown men came to their camp and slaughtered Apai's father. After the attack, she was tormented by nightmares and became very withdrawn. CRESS provided her with trauma therapy to help her recover from what she had experienced. Following this Apai said, "it has made my mind free of the bad past experience... I am able to sleep at night with no nightmares and terrors about my late father."

As well as our visitors CRESS would like to thank the amazing team who made and served teas, helped on the gate and in the organised the event.

CRESS Trip - 3rd - 15th September 2019

The 10th Anniversary CRESS trip to the South Sudanese, now as Refugees in Northern Uganda, departs on 3rd September. From the Chalke Valley are Caroline Lamb on her 20th visit; Jeremy Metcalfe (2nd visit) and Fiona Sheldon (4th visit). They will be joined by 5 others, all of whom have been to Africa either independently or with CRESS.

The team will be meeting all the 62 sponsored school children and 18 university and diploma students on a family day and celebration of 10 years of CRESS educational support. The team will also visit the various agriculture projects and the CRESS Clinic as well as conducting trauma training, assisting in the CRESS Office organisation and running a two-day conference on handling stress and bringing children up in a Christian family.

What can you do to support the team? Three Ps: **Prayer**, **Pounds and Pants Pray** for the team – using the itinerary for daily guidance.

Provide **pounds** sterling for the team to purchase solar chargers £15, basic phones for students £10, and other products to make life more bearable in a refugee camp.

Present us with ladies' mainly cotton under**pants** as these are in very short supply (mostly small and medium).

Packaged new pants can be dropped off at Knighton Manor, Broad Chalke or Green Pastures in Bodenham.

Stuck for some seasonal salad recipes? Hazel Macleod is here to help you, writing in the South Wilts Church Magazine in August 1962. The moulded salad, made with lime or lemon jelly, is a dish that is yet to work its way back into culinary fashion!

Salad Days

SINCE we all need a good supply of vitamins and minerals every day it is only sensible to eat plenty of the foods which are comparatively rich sources—fruit, vegetables and salads of all types, milk, cheese and dairy products. In the summer salad vegetables are cheap, especially if you are able to grow your

own, and it is worth remembering that vegetables taken straight out of your garden are more valuable nutritionally than those which have been a day or two in transit from the market garden to your greengrocer's shop.

As a nation we could be a good deal more adventurous than we are in our choice of salads. Forget the limp and

tasteless mixtures of elderly lettuce and beetroot with a slice of tomato which masquerade as salads in so many restaurants and use watercress, curly endive and shredded cabbage with peas, broad beans, cucumber and baby carrots. Blanched chicory, mostly imported from Belgium, is delicious in season, and for a winter salad use chopped celery and tiny sprigs of crisp cauliflower with frozen peas or beans to add variety. Green and red peppers are pretty to look at as well as good to eat, cut in fine strips, and some variety of spinach is available all the year round. Remember, though, that raw vegetables such as cabbage and spinach must be finely shredded if they are to be digested easily.

Moulded Salad

If you enjoy something a little unusual, try a moulded salad. We use a lime or lemon jelly as the basis for ours, adding a dash of vinegar to take away the sweetness of the jelly but otherwise making up the jelly in the usual way. When it is cold and syrupy in consistency stir in chopped or shredded salad vegetables such as lettuce, cabbage, small cress, tomatoes, peas, diced carrot, etc., then mould in the usual way. (If this salad is moulded too soon the vegetables will rise to the top.) Half a jelly made up with half a pint of water should take at least an equivalent quantity of chopped vege-

tables—turn out when set on to a bed of crisp lettuce and serve with cold meat. This salad looks particularly attractive set in a ring mould with the centre filled up with a dark green salad vegetable such as watercress. If this jelly is too sweet for your taste then try tomato juice set with gelatine.

Sweet Corn

Keep a tin or two of sweet corn in your store cupboard to flavour a salad when vegetables are in short supply—corned beef and tuna fish are other good stand-bys. Grated cheese and hard-boiled egg are obvious additions, but less usual is cold rice, cooked and stored in your refrigerator ready for use. Don't forget the salad dressing, bottled or home-made. The recipe which follows is simpler to make than mayonnaise:

Salad Cream

1 oz. margarine, 1 oz. flour, ½ pint milk, 1 level teaspoonful sugar, pepper, salt, 2 saltspoonfuls dry mustard, 3 tablespoonfuls olive oil, 3 tablespoonfuls vinegar.

Make a sauce in the usual way with the margarine, flour and milk. Cool a little, stirring occasionally so that the sauce does not form a skin. Add the oil and vinegar alternately, a small amount at a time, then the rest of the ingredients dissolved in a teaspoonful of vinegar. Use cold.

Recipe of the Month - Blackberry Cordial

By the time you read this, the hedgerows should be filling up with ripening blackberries, and we'll all be picking them for crumbles and pies. But if you want to preserve the delicate flavour of these hedgerow fruits for a little longer, making them into a cordial is an easy and delicious way of doing it. The recipe below can of course be halved or doubled, depending on how much fruit you have to use.

Ingredients

1kg blackberries Granulated sugar



Method

Rinse the blackberries and place into a large saucepan. For each kg of berries add 100ml of water.

Bring slowly to the boil, crushing the fruit with a potato masher or a wooden spoon until the fruit is soft and the juices flowing.

Scald a jelly bag or muslin (simply by popping it into boiling water to sterilise) and suspend over a large bowl. Tip the blackberries into this and leave it to drip overnight. Don't squeeze the bag.

The following day, measure the resulting juice and pour into a clean pan. For every litre of juice add 700g of sugar. Heat the mixture gently to dissolve the sugar, then remove from the heat.

Pour immediately into warm sterilised bottles (I sterilise them by pouring in a small amount of boiling water and popping the lids on for a few minutes) then seal with a screw-top or cork.

The cordial will keep for several months unopened, but once opened should be kept in the fridge.

Make up the drink with approximately 1 part cordial to 4 parts water, or to taste. The cordial can also be added to sparkling wine to make a slightly more modest version of a Kir Royale!

REQUEST FOR RECIPES...

Looking ahead to our October edition, we would love to hear about some of your favourite Autumn recipes. Perhaps recipes involving apples (there will soon be plenty of those around!), or maybe pumpkins? Or something locally foraged? Nature Notes - The Alder Leaf Beetle

Last year we noticed some significant damage to leaves of a hazel. Then in Spring this year we noticed the same severe perforation of leaves again, but this time the culprit was obvious, a small attractive shiny dark blue beetle about 7 mm long.

In May, there were hundreds of these beetles on our Golden Alder, with huge numbers of leaves damaged and many with yellow eggs on the undersides. The best control was to remove the beetles and affected leaves by hand – every day for weeks. Later, despite our efforts, there were still hundreds of black caterpillar like larvae, which had moved on to other leaves to fatten up, however they are susceptible to sprays. Apparently the tree should not be damaged, but the 7m tree is looking sick.

The Alder Leaf beetle was thought to be extinct in this country and was only discovered in 2003 in Lancashire, since then it has appeared in other parts of the country, notably in Hampshire in 2014. Ours is the first recorded case in Wiltshire.

Whilst they affect the trees which bear their name, they can also affect hazel, hornbeam and beech. The beetles overwinter underneath the affected trees.

Sarah's Gardening Tips

Seasonal hints and tips to keep your garden looking its best

- 1. Plants for dry shade: Japanese Anemone, Astrantia, Euphorbia, Hellebore, Lily of the Valley, snowdrops,
- 2. In the greenhouse, spray the floor with water to increase humidity. This discourages red spider mite.
- 3. To make good compost use a good mixture of green: plant material, grass, veg peelings and browns: tea bags, brown paper, manure.
- 4. Keep deadheading flowers daily to encourage repeat blooms.
- 5. Encourage tomato ripening with plenty of high potash feed.
- 6. Take photos of your garden through the season then make notes about ways to improve or change things the next year.

If I finish my day with no garden dirt under my fingernails and nothing new learned, it is a day wasted.
