Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Thursday 9th January. The minutes of the meeting will be available on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk). Wiltshire Councillor Jose Green, Roger Stockton - Bishopstone Emergency Planning Co-ordinator and three members of the public, attended the meeting.

Cllr Green gave a short report in which she expressed concern about the lack of action by the Police in deterring speeding motorists. This was likely to be discussed at the next meetings of Wiltshire Council's Community Area Transport Group and the Community Safety Group. Inadequacies in the operation of their Operational Flood Working Group were raised with Cllr Green, in particular the lack of any proper record of agreed actions and the failure to follow-up issues raised. Cllr Green undertook to pass on these concerns.

Following the request from residents at the top of Whitlock Rise, Mike Ash reported that Wiltshire Council had agreed that the Parish Council could provide an additional salt/grit bin for that part of the road. This will be sited just inside the entrance to the resident's car park. The bin will be provided, and stocked with grit, by the Parish Council. Councillors made clear that the contents of the bin were being provided for use on the public footpaths and road, not on private garden pathways.

As reported at the last meeting, the Parish Council had been consulted by BT about the proposed removal of the telephone box opposite the entrance to Pitts Lane. This is part of a much wider programme to remove under-used phone boxes nationally. A total of only 2 calls had been made from this box in the last year. Following publicity in STaB, one representation had been received calling for retention of the box as a village landmark and in case of failure of the mobile signal. It was considered that BT was unlikely to want to continue to maintain the box on that basis. The box itself, without a phone, could be retained if it was purchased and maintained by the Parish Council. No suggestions had been received as to alternative uses (the village already has a defibrillator elsewhere, and uses such as a book exchange require someone to organise it). It was agreed not to oppose removal of the box.

Roger Stockton set out the current position as regards flooding in the village (see separate note in this STaB). The Parish Council agreed to support the case which had been made to the Environment Agency for action to be taken by the relevant landowner to repair a weir and the main river bank to the west of the village. At present excess water was flowing into one of the associated streams resulting in flooding threatening properties in the Croucheston area of the village.

It was pointed out that nearly all the volunteers who make up the village's Emergency Response Group (co-ordinator, flood wardens and area representatives) are somewhat elderly (most more than 70yrs) and that it would be helpful if rather more younger members of the community were to come forward to help. In a general discussion it was pointed out that the same could be said for other village institutions, such as running the Village Hall, looking after the Church etc. The fact that younger members of the community had come forward to produce STaB, run the Bishopstone Play Group etc was very welcome. However, it was agreed to mount a campaign to encourage more volunteering in the village,

including through social media.

Mike Ash reported that it is likely that fresh proposals will shortly be brought forward by the landowners for the re-development of Croucheston Mill. As before, the intention would be to have an informal public discussion about options for the use of the site before any proposals were finalised and a planning application submitted. It is possible that this could form part of the Annual Parish Meeting in early March.

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place at 7.00pm on Thursday 12th March 2020 in the Village Hall. This will be followed by the next meeting of the Parish Council. All residents of the village are welcome to attend both meetings.

Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

Edward Roy Draper Tribute

An edited version of the eulogy read at the funeral.

Edward Roy Draper (Ted) was born on 25th January1937 at the Three Horseshoes pub in Bishopstone. Son of Frank and Ena Draper, younger brother to John and Marcia and older brother to Diana.

When Ted was born his father, Frank, was the licensee of the Three Horseshoes and also farmed South Farm in the village. When Ted was 8 years old, the family moved to Netton Farm in Bishopstone after his father secured its tenancy. Ted went to Bishopstone school where he passed the 11+. However, as the grammar school was oversubscribed that year, he went on to Broad Chalke school for the remainder of his schooling life.

When Ted left school he joined the family farm, working with his father and brother. Ted worked in the dairy, milking the cows for many years while also carrying out relief milking at the Cooksons farm in Stratford Tony. Ted enjoyed his working life on the farm and continued to do so until he retired.

In his younger days, Ted's great passion was football and made his debut for the Bishopstone men's football team when he was only 14 years old. He played football for many years, having great success as captain of the team and scoring many goals. Ted played with many villagers including Cecil Wareham, Ron Ford and Terry Everett and with his future brother-in-law, Gerald Davies.

Growing up, Ted had many great friends especially local villagers Rex Adlam and David Emm. Ted and his friends would go to the Ron Percy School of Dancing in Salisbury where they learned ballroom dancing. Another good friend of Ted was his second cousin, David Bramhall, who was best man when Ted married Pauline Tapper in October 1966. Ted and Pauline went on to have two daughters, Tracey and Mandy. In the early 1990s, Ted met Sue Friend and they had 8 very happy years together. Sadly, Sue passed away in 1999, a year after Ted's dear sister Marcia had died.

Outside of family life, Ted had been an active member of the Bishopstone Parish Council from 1967 and served for over 30 years, including a spell as the Council's chairman.

In 1995, he was elected to the Salisbury District Council as an Independent councillor for the Chalke Valley ward. Four years later, in 1999, he became leader of the Independent group of councillors. He served as planning portfolio holder from 2002-3 and deputy transport portfolio holder from 2003-4. During this time, Ted helped many people in the Chalke Valley with a host of issues and he was particularly proud of securing housing for many local people.

In May 2005, Ted was elected as the new chairman of Salisbury District Council. During his term as chairman, he participated in many significant events. These included the opening of both the Britford and Wilton Park and Ride sites, which he attended alongside Kevin Wren, the then deputy chairman. He also attended the Queen's Garden Party at Buckingham Palace with his daughter, Tracey. Ted retired from the council in 2009 when Salisbury District Council was replaced by Wiltshire Council.

One of Ted's great passions was his love of music. In his later years, he enjoyed singing with his good friend Steve Thorne. Ted and Steve performed at various local venues including the White Hart, the Queens Head and the Fox & Goose. He also sang solo in the big marquee at the Berwick St. John Country Fayre and at his own Chairman's end-of-year reception. He also enjoyed recording his singing with his good friend Chris Theobald, who produced many of his later recordings, completing more than 15 CDs over the years. One of Ted's other favourite past-times was horse-racing and for 12 years he was a member of Salisbury Racecourse, also visiting many other courses across the south of England.

Being Bishopstone born and bred, there wasn't much that Ted didn't know about the village and he loved to talk about its history with family and friends. Ted passed away suddenly on 15th December 2019. He will be remembered as a family man and loved nothing better than enjoying time with his daughters, sons-in-law and his beloved grandsons. He will be sadly missed by all the family and by so many others.

Flooding Report Dec 2019 - Jan 2020

The autumn and winter months have produced a high volume of rainfall. The recorded amounts, courtesy of Rob Thorne's website, indicated 2.5 times the average in September, 2 times the average in October and nearly double the average in December.

The result has been high river levels but these have been nothing like the flooding seen at the same time of year in 2013-2014.

The flood meadows to the East of Pitts Lane did take much of the excessive water (see above) as they would have done in the early part of the 20th century. There have been breaches of the river banks which will need repair as water levels drop. Most threats to property have been successfully dealt with by their owners and it was only necessary to deploy signs in Netton Street and Faulston Lane and gel bag assistance to one property.

There have been some problems that the Parish Council have been unable to resolve and as of 15 January (the date of this report post an Operational Flood Working Group meeting in Dinton) these matters have been passed to either the Environment Agency or the Highways Division of Wiltshire Council for help in finding solutions.

The Carol Service was attended by over 100 people in the church and much enjoyed. This was followed by the Carols at the Crib, which was another great success, and much enjoyed by Jenny with the children. The Christmas day service was joined by so many it was uplifting to sing all those carols. And finally, we had the Epiphany service on the 5th which was well supported. The Cathedral service was a complete sell-out, as usual!



The rain has kept up all over this period with irritation for some as the springs sprang into action under their floors again! However, Roger and his noble team of wardens seemed to calm events and keep the river within its bounds. Interesting too, to note how the old water-meadows have filled as they should. 

Stratford Tony Harmonium Restoration

The Miller Harmonium in Stratford Tony Church. Built in November 1897 in Pennsylvania, USA. (and guaranteed for five years!)

Readers may know that the church in Stratford Tony has been in the hands of the Churches Conservation Trust for more than twenty-five years. During that time the Trust has carried out many repairs on the building including re-roofing the nave and re-plastering the ceiling in both the nave and the chancel. In the intervening years there has been a tradition of holding a once a year Evensong service, on a Sunday afternoon around mid- summer, together with the occasional concert and art exhibition.

Up until some fifteen or more years ago music had been provided by the harmonium in the church. On occasions Heather and I have had to carry out emergency repairs to it just before the service. When Trixie Martin was leaving Coombe Bissett, she donated her electronic organ to the church, that sufficed for a year or two. However, some summers ago, as Richard Seal playing and Rev. Jenny Taylor, was processing up the aisle, the instrument began to emit sounds of extreme terminal pain. At this point several gentlemen in the congregation rushed forward to remove the offending key-board and replace it with the venerable harmonium. Order was restored when Richard struck up the Hallelujah Chorus, and the service proceeded with decorum using the very wheezy harmonium.

For a number of years since then, music for the service was provided by keyboards borrowed from either Broad Chalke or Coombe Bissett. This procedure was again followed last summer. However, when Ben Maton arrived, he spied the harmonium and elected to play it. By the end of the service, somewhat exhausted, it being a hot day, he confirmed that the instrument needed to be overhauled. In discussions after the service several members of the congregation indicated that they were willing to subscribe to its restoration.

The Churches Conservation Trust were approached and agreed that while restoring harmoniums was not their top priority, they were sympathetic to the idea. They were asked which firms were on their approved restorers list, that we might approach. We were put in touch with Stephen Moores of Chichester. When he arrived, I asked him if he would look at the instrument and quote for its restoration. He then indicated that the best way forward would be take it apart to see what was wrong, quite apart from the obvious failure of the bellows!

It turned out that Stephen Moores was only an advisor and not really in business as a professional restorer but by that evening all the components that might need repair were in our conservatory and I had been left with a small booklet on how to repair harmoniums. This was not really what I had in mind at the outset, so I was quite relieved when I received a phone call the next morning, from Stephen,

offering to restore the section of the instrument that contained the reeds and the pallets.

During inspection of the instrument it appears that the last time it had any major work carried out was in 1929.

Repair work this time included patching the many holes in the pump chambers and the plenum and replacing nearly all the pallet support springs. These were made from brass wire, which after 120 years were showing signs of fatigue failure. Unfortunately, the Miller Organ company folded in 1923, so spare parts were not available, and Stephen had to make 61 of these springs by hand, from piano wire which we supplied. To give some background, at the time of this harmonium's manufacture, in 1897, Millers were turning out 1,600 instruments a year.

When the Churches Conservation Trust's men were lime plastering the ceilings, some drips fell on the casing of the harmonium, so many hours have been devoted to restoring the casing to something of its former glory.

The harmonium has now been restored. Musicians playing it will discover that some of the stops are not working. This is because manufacturers tended to have a standard panel for appearances, but what features you got depended on the pocket of the individual purchaser. Further a stop used to reduce the sound level was almost certainly removed during the 1929 re-build, because the moths had made a meal of it!

It is hoped that the harmonium will now give more years of pleasure both to those who play and those who hear it play.

February was added to the Roman calendar in 713 BC. The length of the month changed over time and, at one time, it had as few as 23 days. When Julius Caesar remade the Roman calendar, the month was assigned 28 days during normal years and 29 days during leap years which occurred every four years.

In 1712, thanks to mistakes in calendar reform, Sweden and Finland had 30 days in February.

Private CV Walker, Australian Imperial Force

The solitary grave of a soldier of the Australian Imperial Force lies in the graveyard of the Church of St John the Baptist in Bishopstone. Marked by a standard Commonwealth War Graves headstone, the inscription reads CV Walker, Pte, 9th Infantry Bn, with the date of his death. What do we know about this young man who died so far from home and was laid to rest in our churchyard? Much information can be found on Pte Walker in the National Archives of Australia.

Charles Valentine Walker was a labourer living in the small town of Lyndon in Brixton, Queensland. He was single and his only close relative seems to have been his adoptive mother, Mrs Edith Blain,


who lived at Eurondilla, Longreach, Queensland. He was paid 5 shillings per day, of which he allotted 3 shillings in Australia, presumably to his mother.

He joined up on 26 June 1916 at the age of 21 and embarked on HMAT Boonah at Brisbane on 21 Oct 1916 for England as part of the 16th Reinforcements to the

9th Infantry Bn.

somewhere on this photograph.






HMAT A36 Boonah, the troopship on which Charles travelled to England. (State Library of NSW)

Having previously served in Gallipoli, the Battalion had been serving in France since March 1916. Whilst undergoing training on or around Salisbury Plain prior to being sent to France, according to his Service Record he was admitted to Fargo Military Hospital at Larkhill (presumably on the site of what is now the Fargo Ammunition Compound for the Royal School of Artillery) with influenza. He died aged 22 on 1 February 1917 of broncho pneumonia.

Why was he buried in our churchyard? His records indicate that his body was passed to a relative, Mr Raikes, of Bishopstone for interment. A subsequent letter from his mother Edith indicates that this was her uncle, Revd F Raikes. This would be the Revd Francis Raikes, Rector of Bishopstone from 1914 to 1931. He presumably arranged for Charles to



be buried in the churchyard. Later, when the simple wooden crosses which marked the graves were being replaced with more permanent markers, Edith was asked if she wanted any inscription written on the headstone. She said:

'there is nothing to write about him. He was only a bush reared boy and went to do his duty.

The Revd Montgomery Coal Trust

Mary Blackmore - from Bishopstone to Bozeman

What connects a marriage in Bishopstone Church, a mountain in Wyoming USA and a suicide in Belgravia, London? The answer is the lives, and deaths, of Mary Sidford, who grew up in Faulston House, Bishopstone, and her husband William Henry Blackmore.

Mary Sidford was the daughter of John and Mary Sidford who farmed at Faulston from about 1823. On 14 May 1851 she married William Blackmore in Bishopstone Church. The Blackmore Vale in Dorset is named after his family and his father was a linen draper in Salisbury. Trained as a lawyer he came into contact with businessmen interested in the opportunities presented by the opening up of the USA after the Civil War.



William made a fortune arranging venture capital for land and railway development in both the USA and Mexico. He and Mary set up home in London where they entertained many prominent people including Alfred, Lord Tennyson and Mark Twain. He developed an interest in archaeology and acquired many antiquities excavated in the USA and Central America. Together with his brother, Humphrey, William set up the Blackmore Museum alongside the Salisbury and South Wiltshire Museum in St Ann's Street to house his collection. The Blackmore Museum opened in September 1867. The Encyclopædia Britannica described it as "one of the finest collections of prehistoric antiquities in England." Later the two museums were amalgamated and, following Humphrey Blackmore's death in 1929, much of the Blackmore collection was distributed to other museums.



William was clearly fascinated by the "wild" west and sponsored an expedition in 1872 to survey the Yellowstone region of Montana and Wyoming. He commissioned photographers to record the expedition and, in particular, to document the lives of Native Americans. This photograph is of William with Chief Red Cloud. He was joined on the expedition by his wife Mary. But in July 1872 Mary contracted pneumonia whilst in Bozeman, Montana and sadly died. William purchased land in the town for her

burial and donated it to the town for a cemetery, a purpose it serves today. The expedition leader, Ferdinand Hayden, named the 10,000ft Mount Blackmore, just north of Yellowstone National Park, in her honour. Her death was recorded in the local Montana newspaper as follows:

Sad News--Sudden Death of Wife of Sir William Blackmore

Bozeman, M.T., July 19--Mrs. Blackmore, the wife of Sir William Blackmore, an English gentleman eminent for his scientific attainments, died very suddenly at this place last evening. She will be buried today. They had just arrived at Bozeman for the purpose of joining Professor Hayden's exploring party up the Yellowstone. She died from a congestive chill, brought on from over fatigue and the sudden change in the weather.

In this William Blackmore is referred to as "Sir". In other writings in the USA he is referred to as "Lord" Blackmore. Unfortunately, he was never knighted or ennobled! This perhaps reveals a slightly less respectable side to William Blackmore. Many of his investment projects appear to have been somewhat dubious. He was adept at persuading businessmen to make investments on which they were promised extraordinarily high rates of return, which never materialised. Following the recession of 1873 most of his fortune was lost and on 12 April 1878 William shot himself in his study at Belgrave Mansions, Grosvenor Gardens, London.



In 1866 Mary Blackmore had funded the north window in the Farmer's Aisle of Bishopstone Church in memory of her parents. The memorial commemorating her death in Bozeman, Montana is alongside that window. Caroline and I visited Bozeman in September 2019. It is a fine town and a lovely final resting place for Mary Blackmore from Bishopstone.



Recipe of the Month - Sticky Toffee Cake

Recently I decided I wanted to make a cake that captured the flavours of a Sticky Toffee Pudding, a family favourite in this house. I found a recipe online for a date cake, and made it - it was great - but I have gradually added to it and adapted it until I feel it's pretty much 'mine'. I often make this cake for Bishopstone Playgroup and it's always popular!

This cake is superbly easy. I love this kind of 'all in one', chuck it in the food processor type of recipe, and the fruit content means it's always moist. It keeps well for about a week, and I have even frozen it in slices to no ill effect, ready to defrost quickly for unexpected guests. It works well as a cake with morning coffee, afternoon tea, or warmed with custard as a pudding (a drizzle of toffee sauce on it would be perfect too). All in all a great cake to have in your baking repertoire!

Ingredients

250g dried dates
275ml boiling water
1 tsp bicarbonate soda
175g soft light brown sugar
150g butter
3 eggs, beaten
175g self raising flour
100g raisins or sultanas



50-100g crystallised ginger (optional, and to taste)

Method

Pour the boiling water over 3 quarters of the dates and leave for 15 minutes or so to soften

Meanwhile chop the remaining dates - and the ginger, if using - and put aside. Preheat the oven to 175 degrees Celsius.

In a food processor, blend together the butter, sugar and dates, including the stillwarm soaking water.

Add the eggs, then the flour and bicarb, and blend until smooth.

Stir in the chopped dates, chopped ginger (if using) and the raisins.

Pour the mixture into a greased and lined (I just line the base) 24cm round tin.


Bake for 40 minutes until firm in the middle, and the edges are slightly pulling away from the tin. I usually check it at 35 minutes, but in my oven 40 is spot on.

To make the cake look less 'plain' and give it a crunchy topping you can brush it with melted butter and sprinkle with demerara sugar while it is still hot.

Tales from the Time Capsule

In April 2018 George Brutton, one of our churchwardens, discovered a Smiths Crisps tin box carefully wrapped in a plastic sheet and fastened with wire to a roof timber in Bishopstone Church. The box turned out to be a time-capsule, created we think in 1963 (some items date back to 1954), with other things added from various years up until the 1980s. Each month in STaB we will be showing you a few pieces of interest from this fascinating time capsule.

BISHOPSTONE VILLAGE STORE

The local shop and Post Office is now under new ownership, by Carole and Paul Gallagher. It is still being managed by Mrs. Natalie Bundy, though unfortunately, Molly Veale has left to work in Salisbury. Her place has been taken by Mrs. Jean Burt.

The shop has been completely restocked, and now carries an ever increasing range of groceries and provisions. A retail license has been applied for to sell liquor and they would hope, if successful, to be selling wines and spirits within two months. There are plans to stock a number of frozen convenience foods by mid-June and a small range of gifts. The hours of opening are as below, though these are to be extended in the near future.



Sarah's Gardening Tips

- 1. The term "In the green" i.e. Snowdrops, means after it has flowered but before it goes to sleep for the summer.
- 2. Chit early potatoes by placing in a warm, dry, light place with buds facing up. Once the buds are 2cm long they can be planted outside.
- 3. Sow cauliflower seeds at about 10-15 degrees C for an early summer crop.
- 4. Spray fuchsias with water on warmer days to encourage new growth.
- 5. Check plants for early greenfly and wipe off with damp tissue or fingers.
- 6. Half-hardy flowers such as geraniums and dahlias can be sown now as can veg that are slow germinators. Use a heated propagator or put a plastic bag over the pot on a window sill.
