The Parish Council would like to thank Michael Pratt for repairing the steps on the public footpath by Raglands.

Wiltshire Council granted planning permission in mid-January for the re-building of the two houses in Stanley Close which were destroyed by fire in June 2021, so hopefully work will begin soon.

LATEST COVID ADVICE:

Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

The hire charges include use of heating and electricity.

Bishopstone Ultrafast Broadband Update



As you are aware our application under the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme exceeded the financial target necessary for the scheme to progress on 19 November 2021 when Openreach issued a confirmation notice to your project team. Our submission had 89 properties and 6 businesses. A small number have since opted out of committing to the project but we still

have more than sufficient numbers to enable the project to proceed.

So now what for our project?

Our project has four distinct phases that are carried out by Openreach:

Survey

Survey officers will check that the physical geography and plan lines up with what Openreach have on their systems. They will also identify if any traffic management or road closures will be required. You may have seen the team of Openreach engineers around the village and they have recently told us that this phase is now complete.

Planning

Engineers will design our network based on the survey to give the best speeds possible. They will order equipment and create a detailed installation plan. We have been told that this phase should be complete by the end of January.

Building the Network

Civil engineering work to install the fibre will use existing infrastructure (poles and underground conduits) where possible and install new infrastructure where required. The Openreach work ends at a Block Connector Terminal (BCT) up a pole or underground close to but not at your property.

Test and Commissioning

'Light testing' the fibre network and completing final tests and physical audits.

Work has started - When will it be completed?

Openreach works to a 12-month delivery schedule so in theory we will have FTTP by the end of November 2022 but your project team is hopeful it will be sooner than that. It is however a complex project and the village telephone infrastructure (conduits and poles) is old. Nevertheless, we will keep you updated on progress through the pages of STaB, the village and project websites and by email. Personal letters will not be sent out!

What have I got to do?

If you have signed up to the project there is nothing for you to do at present - except to be patient!

Once the infrastructure installation and testing has been completed your project team will be told - though the alert will notice lots of men up poles or in the underground network! - and we will inform you. Those who signed up will then be able to ask their Internet Service Provider (ISP) of choice to upgrade them to FTTP (Ultrafast Broadband).

Who should I choose as my ISP?

We are not able to give firm advice on this. The selection of an ISP is a matter of personal choice. We do know that some of the fringe suppliers will not offer a service, while the more established, like BT, will. A very useful website is www.which.co.uk/switch-broadband. This helps compare the frequently changing deals on offer and is specific to your postcode. Do remember that if you look at it now it is NOT offering FTTP deals for the area of the village that is part of this project as the system is not yet installed.

How does it get from the BCT to my property?

The final link into the system is provided by your selected ISP and will consist of a fibre optic cable running from the BCT to your property. In your property there will be a new box with all the essential connections. They vary in style from ISP to ISP but all do the same job.

If your existing link is overhead, we believe this will be repeated and if underground it will be installed in the same way. Underground may require some minor disturbance to lawns or flowerbeds. If you have any concerns, we can put you in touch with someone who has had this type of work done already and can reassure you that it only causes minor disturbance and lawns and flowerbeds quickly recover within days.

What if I did not sign up to the broadband voucher scheme?

You will be able to sign up to FTTP but there may be an additional cost. Further information on this will be published later when we have a little more clarity.

The Countryside Code for Dogs and Horses

Following a recent incident in the Valley involving an off-leash dog causing injury to a horse and rider, it seems relevant to remind ourselves of the Countryside Code in these circumstances:

Always keep dogs under control and in sight

The countryside, parks and the coast are great places to exercise your dog but you need to consider other users and wildlife.

Keep your dog under effective control to make sure it stays away from wildlife, livestock, horses and other people unless invited. You should:

- always keep your dog on a lead or in sight.
- be confident your dog will return on command.
- make sure your dog does not stray from the path or area where you have right of access.

Always check local signs as there are situations when you must keep your dog on a lead for all or part of the year. Local areas may also ban dogs completely, except for assistance dogs. Signs will tell you about these local restrictions.

It is good practice wherever you are to keep your dog on a lead around livestock. On Open Access land and at the coast, you must put your dog on a lead around livestock. Between 1 March and 31 July, you must have your dog on a lead on Open Access land, even if there is no livestock on the land. These are legal requirements.

A farmer can shoot a dog that is attacking or chasing livestock. They may not be liable to compensate the dog's owner.

Let your dog off the lead if you feel threatened by livestock or horses. Do not risk getting hurt protecting your dog. Releasing your dog will make it easier for you both to reach safety.

Dog poo - bag it and bin it - any public waste bin will do

Always clean up your dog's poo because it can cause illness in people, livestock and wildlife.

Never leave bags of dog poo around, even if you intend to pick them up later. Deodorised bags and containers can make bags of dog poo easier to carry. If you cannot find a public waste bin, you should take it home and use your own bin.

The *British Horse Society* has the following advice for riding in the countryside:

Enjoy the countryside and respect its life and work with courtesy, care and consideration for others and for the land.

- Leave only hoofprints and guard against fire.
- Help others to see you: wear hi-viz aids, even off-road.
- Keep dogs under close control. This usually means on a short lead which is not possible from horseback so it may be best to leave dogs at home.
- Observe byelaws where displayed at the entrance to a site.
- Take the BHS Ride Safe training if you ride on roads.

Care for the land

- Keep to the bridleway or byway unless on land with designated open access for horses. Check the Ordnance Survey map if there is doubt.
- Do not jump fences, hedges or walls you may cause damage.
- Horses' hooves can damage surfaces after wet weather. Avoid routes where this happens if possible. Avoid areas with heritage or conservation value which may be very fragile.

Courtesy to other users

- Pass others at walk and slow down well before your reach them, they may be frightened of horses or uncertain how to act.
- Be able to stop in the distance that you can see ahead.
- Acknowledge courtesy shown by other users.
- Adopt 'Share the Trail': each encounter with another user is a chance to build cooperation a smile and a short chat can work wonders!
- Encourage cyclists to call out when approaching horses. Many cyclists are unsure what to do around horses.

Consideration for farmers

- Ride slowly past all livestock.
- Leave gates as you find them.
- Do not ride on crops or cultivated land (except on public rights of way), including stubble (which may be sown with a new crop) and young grass.
- Keep to walking pace; faster paces may damage the ground.

Storm Arwen and the Faulston Beeches

In early December 2021 Storm Arwen took one of the village's great beech trees. The beech trees to the top of Faulston Drove are one of our local attributes and provide shade in summer, natural climbing frames and a place where past generations pledged their love.

The "Jubilee Tree", one of the line of beeches, has a carving in its trunk commemorating King George V's Jubilee in May 1935, so, assuming it was carved at the time, it indicates that these trees were all well developed nearly 80 years ago. Fortuitously it was **not** this tree that suffered the storm damage.

In Our Night Sky - Venus

Venus, the Evening Star, is the brightest planet. With an orbit inside Earth's it appears in crescent phases, like the moon, but never seen full as it is eclipsed by the Sun or as in early January it moved across the face of the sun, with its dark face towards us, to emerge as the Morning Star. Considered as a twin to Earth, being neighbours and almost the same size, but enigmatic and unknown for many years due to its thick uniform cloud and failure of initial probes. It is only of more recent years that its true nature has been revealed.


The probes failed due to the high surface temperature of 427 deg.C, the highest in the Solar System, enough to melt lead, with a surface pressure 90 times that on Earth and an atmosphere of 96 % carbon dioxide, 3.5% nitrogen with small amounts of carbon monoxide, argon, sulphur dioxide, and water vapour. Even worse is the sulphuric acid rain which evaporates before it reaches the ground.

The planet has a very similar composition to Earth, but it is thought that to have the same layered structure as when it was formed starting 4,540 million years ago. The consequence of that is that it has a negligible magnetic field, which means in turn that it does not have its own magnetosphere to protect it from solar wind, so was unable to keep any substantial amounts of water.

The layered core also prevents circulation below the mantle, which on Earth leads to plate tectonics and stratovolcanoes. However, as on Earth the centre was very hot and there have been many shield (broad flat) volcanoes (like Kilauea on Hawaii). So the surface is covered in volcanoes, mountains, volcanic and impact craters, big lava plains and dunes, with no small impact craters due to destructive effects on incoming projectiles of the thick atmosphere. Whether the planet is still volcanically active is disputed.

In all, the planet is truly inhospitable, quite the opposite of the Roman Venus of love, beauty, and desire.

Recipe of the Month - Carrot, Grape and Rice Salad

At this time of year we may be trying to eat healthily to balance out our festive excesses, but it's really not the weather for cold salad or small portions. This hearty vegetarian rice salad has certainly ticked the boxes in our house this month.

Serves 4 (or 2 with some lovely leftovers for lunch the following day)

Ingredients

200g brown rice

200g carrots (baby carrots are lovely, but regular carrots chopped into batons are fine)

200g red seedless grapes

1 tbsp olive oil

200g green beans

100g pecan nuts (lightly toasted if preferred, otherwise raw)

2 handfuls of salad leaves (rocket, watercress, spinach, etc)

200g pack feta cheese, crumbled into chunks (optional - this is vegan if omitted)

For the dressing:

- 2 tbsp maple syrup
- 3 tbsp balsamic vinegar

Juice of half a lemon

2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil



Method

Cook the rice following pack instructions.

Meanwhile heat the oven to 180C, place the carrots on a baking tray, drizzle with oil and season, then roast for 10 minutes. After 10 minutes add the grapes and return to the oven for a further 10 minutes.

Bring a saucepan of water to the boil then add the green beans. Cook for 3 minutes until tender but still with a crunch. Drain and set aside.

In a large bowl whist together the dressing ingredients with salt and pepper to taste. Add the rice, carrots, grapes, beans, pecans, salad leaves and half the feta and mix together.

Transfer to a serving plate and scatter over the rest of the feta.Drizzle over anyjuices from the baking tray, and serve.Kate Pendlenton

The earliest surviving Valentine was written by a prisoner in the Tower of London.

In 1415 the French Duke of Orleans was imprisoned in the Tower of London having been captured at the Battle of Agincourt. In a letter to his wife he wrote, "Je suis desja d'amour tanné, Ma tres doulce Valentinée..." This translates as "I am already sick of love, my very gentle Valentine..."

Victorians used to send each other 'Vinegar Valentines'.

Sending Valentine's Day cards anonymously became popular in the Victorian era, but there was a dark side to the tradition. Just as people used to send romantic (and often racy) messages to their loved ones, they would send rude or insulting cards to anyone they didn't like.

In Japan, only women buy gifts on Valentine's Day.

This is because of a translation error made by a chocolate company in 1936, when Valentine's Day was first introduced to Japan. It's traditional for single women to reveal who they fancy on Valentine's Day by giving them a small chocolate gift.

The saying 'wear your heart on your sleeve' comes from an old Valentine's Day tradition.

In the Middle Ages schoolboys would draw the names of girls out of a hat, to find out who would be their Valentine. They'd wear the name pinned on their sleeve for the rest of the week.

In Finland, they celebrate Friend's Day (Ystävänpäivä) instead of Valentine's Day.

The 14 February celebrates friendship instead of romance in Finland, and people buy cards and gifts for their pals.

Saint Valentine was executed for illegally performing weddings.

Roman soldiers were forbidden from marrying, as the Emperor Claudius thought that married men made poor soldiers. Valentine, who was a priest, disagreed with the ban and performed weddings in secret. He was eventually discovered, thrown in prison and executed on the 14 February. Legend says that before his death he wrote one final letter to the woman he loved, signing it "From your Valentine."

Valentine's Day was once banned in the UK.

Oliver Cromwell banned Valentine's Day celebrations (as well as Christmas) when he became Lord Protector in 1653. The holiday wasn't restored until 1660, when the monarchy was reinstated and Charles II took the throne.



Sarah's Gardening Tips for February

- 1. Prepare seed beds. As long as the ground isn't frozen you can prepare and warm the ground with cloches and polythene.
- 2. Take mint root cuttings to grow on indoors for tasty early leaves.
- 3. There is still time to prune Rhododendrons as they are still dormant.
- 4. Plant chilli and tomato seeds, use a sunny windowsill or propagator.
- 5. Prune any group 2 clematis before the end of the month.
- 6. Prune over-wintered fuchsias back to 1 or 2 buds on each shoot.
- 7. Cut back winter jasmine after flowering to encourage new growth for next year.
- 8. Mulch perennial vegetables such as asparagus and artichoke with well-rotted manure or compost.
- 9. Prune blackcurrant, gooseberry and redcurrant bushes to maintain framework.
