Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

Report for Town/ Parish Councils – Wilton Town and Wilton Rural Beats June 2019

Current local Policing Priorities

- **Non-dwelling Burglary (farm outbuildings, sheds, garages and commercial premises)**
Targeted patrols (evening and nights) – proactive targeting and stop checks of vehicles
- **Patrols to target Rural crime and Poaching**
Patrols by Police officers and PCSO's to target both daytime and night poaching at identified hotspots (see below crime summary). PCSO Nicola CLARK will continue to run targeted rural operations with support from our Rural Crime Team and local farmers and landowners
- **Speed Enforcement checks to support local Community Speed Watch (CSW)**
Our teams will carry out speed enforcement in areas identified via feedback from active CSW schemes – targeted areas are updated on a fortnightly basis

Crime summary (late April / early June)

24/04 – Dinton – barb wire fence cut to gain access to private fishing lake
26/04 – Wilton – wheel stolen from mountain bike which was locked in residential bike shed
28/04 – Dinton – gained entry by smashing back door, nothing appears to have been taken
04/05 – Broad Chalke – hare coursing caused damage to crops
13/05 – Alvediston – cultivator stolen from field
20/05 – Nadder Terrace, Wilton – door glass and a window smashed by hammer
27/05 – Broad Chalke Rd – attempted theft of lead from house, disturbed and made off empty handed
28/05 – Broad Chalke – entered locked shed through window, nothing appears to be missing
31/05 – Glenside Manor – gained entry through a window and £20 stolen from hand bag
06/06 – Barford St. Martin – rear number plate removed from car while parked outside owner's house.

Force-wide Update

101 call charges dropped - At present 101 callers are charged a 15p connection fee by the telephony company. From next year this charge will no longer apply and calls to 101 will be free, after the Home Office pledged £5 million each year to cover the cost.

Recruitment - To update on the additional officers and staff promised earlier this year, we had three transferees police officers start this month and another ten due to start in September. Police officers currently have five months initial training and a two-year probation period. It takes time to recruit and train officers to a high standard. During May 20 new police officers began their training and we are planning for a double intake of 40 students in October. From then our police officer recruitment is changing with three new entry routes, including a new three-year Police Constable Apprenticeship Degree, starting in June 2020. We are also on track to have 12 additional Community Co-ordinators in post across the county to focus on improved visibility and community engagement.

Under Sharon's stewardship sales in the Coffee Shop now average £1,000 per week.

Sharon has been passionate about maintaining the high standards and good home-made food for which the Coffee Shop has become so well known. She has done this with a light touch and a smile that lights up the room. She has been brilliant at managing people and her warm and caring personality has helped bring out the best in all who have worked with her. The visitor's book is full of praise for the delicious food, the warm welcome and the friendly service.

We will miss her and, like Ellen, she will be a hard act to follow. Having given so much to the HUB, she is leaving to spend more time with her family and for a less stressful job within walking distance of her home in Fordingbridge. We all wish her well for the future.

It has been decided to replace Sharon with four part-time team leaders, each working 12 hours a week in overlapping shifts. This will provide more flexibility to cope with busy periods, holiday cover and sickness absence. The recruitment process has been in full swing, with a very positive response, and the final interviews are taking place as we go to press. More news on the new appointees next month.

I know that this must read almost the same every month but it just shows how much need there is out there, and with the school summer holidays coming close many families are going to find extra pressure with having to find a dinner for their children who have been getting this at school. This extra meal can push many more over the threshold into short term poverty, so please try to be extra generous over the next two months.

As usual donations can be left in the box in the church porch where they are removed regularly or at The Old Post Office, The Cross, either ring the doorbell or leave them on the step. If you cannot get them to either drop off point then please phone me and I will arrange to collect at your convenience.

News from Coombe Bissett School

We are very proud to be an Artsmark school and every year we devote the last week of Term 5 to 'The Arts'. This year our Arts Leader, Mrs Bowers, put together a week of fantastic programme of activities for the school on the theme 'Our Wonderful World'. All the children worked together to create five panels for our worship table using batik; four of the panels each had a class tree at their centre with the fifth panel celebrating our core values: Care, Commitment and Creativity.

Throughout the week the whole school community – children, staff, parents and governors – created a 'calendar' by making clay columns for every day of the year! We also celebrated Outdoor Classrooms Day with a day of outdoor Arts: mandalas made from found natural objects; leaf printing; bark rubbings; clay tree faces; weaving on our giant outdoor loom and mobiles made from natural found objects. Another highlight was a workshop for each class with a dancer from West End in Schools. We finished the week with an open exhibition on the Friday with opportunities for everyone to explore the children's work including installations of performance poetry, graphic art, digital art and film. The exhibition finished with our Year 3 & 4 children performing 'Moon Songs' having just returned from performing the song with other schools as part of the opening to the Salisbury Arts Festival.

Cueibet Church Primary School, South Sudan

The last two editions of STaB carried articles from local church primary schools so this month we feature a link with a church school which is not so near.

The Diocese of Salisbury has had a link with the Episcopal Church in South Sudan since 1972. In 2013, when our former Team Rector, Canon David Henley was Rural Dean, Chalke Deanery set up a link with the remote Diocese of Cueibet in South Sudan. Since then, Bishop Elijah Matueny (Bishop of Cueibet) has visited the Chalke Valley twice and small groups have made 5 return visits to Cueibet. It was on a visit with David Henley in November 2015 that Geoff Taylor began the link with the local church primary school.



At that time the school had 4 classes with over 200 pupils, all taught under the shade of trees. At the beginning of the week the children carried out the benches from the small cathedral for their seating and returned them on the Friday. During the rainy season which lasts from May to October, teaching took place in a mud hut and in the cathedral. Imagine the noise in a building not much bigger than Bishopstone Village Hall!

Before the 2015 visit, the parents and pupils of Coombe Bissett Church Primary School had been told about the small school almost 4,000 miles away in South Sudan. Although baggage was restricted, we were able to take a bundle of football strips to give to the children. 'CB' was very popular. During several conversations with the headteacher and Bishop Elijah we were able to explore ways in which we might help the school with its plans to extend to cover the full range of 8 classes or years.



The priority was classrooms and in 3 years Chalke Deanery has raised funds to build 3 mud brick classrooms. When Archdeacon Alan Jeans and Geoff Taylor visited Cueibet in March 2018 they were able to see the results. The school now has the 3 classrooms, a temporary classroom with a plastic awning, a very small staff room, a school kitchen and a

P&O shipping container used as a store room. However, the 'real estate' is only just managing to keep up with the increase in the school population.

There is now a full range of Primary Classes 1–8 with over 960 pupils taught in separate Morning and Afternoon sessions. The basic free lunch provided is the only meal of the day for the majority of the pupils. An Accelerated Learning Programme (ALP) has started for older pupils who have come late to education and are considered to be better motivated. Teaching is from 14.00-17.00 and is condensed into 2 primary stages in 1 year.



The need for education and the desire to learn in the world's newest nation of South Sudan cannot be over-estimated. The contribution of our local communities and schools in supporting the church primary school in Cueibet is highly valued by the pupils and their families. Last year we were able to take 900 pencils given by Coombe Bissett School and other families in the Chalke Valley. The smiles on the faces of the children said it all.

Much more needs to be done in providing books and school furniture and supporting training for teachers and assistants. It is heartening to know that we are playing our part in this.

St John Singers


The St John Singers, Salisbury, now a premier fifty voice strong choir, has its origins in the church choir of St. John the Baptist, Bishopstone, after which it takes its name. It can trace its roots back to the early 1930s when the daughter of the eminent Cathedral organist, Sir Walter Alcock, was its conductor. The present choir was formed in 1975 by John Powell, when he and his wife, Christine, came to live in the village. John directed and managed the choir for the next 42 years. Originally the choir was named 'Bishopstone United Churches Choir' whose members got together to lead the singing at the Christmas services in the village. The choir used to rehearse weekly on Monday evenings in the front room of Ruby and Reg Thorne's farm house in the village practicing for special services in the church and other events in the village hall. One of the choir's successes at that time was to win its class in the Wiltshire Music Festival at Devizes. With John Powell leaving Bishopstone to live in Salisbury and with the choir attracting more members from outside the village, it was decided that the choir should change its name to 'St John Singers' in recognition of its roots being in the church at Bishopstone (and certainly not after its conductor!!). At the same time, the choir moved to Salisbury to rehearse in a school hall as it needed a larger rehearsal room. Bishopstone residents who sang in the early days included Shirley Cooke, Alix Ricketts, Renee Gulliver, Audrey Rogers, Grace Sexton, Sally White and Ruby and Reg Thorne. Sally Leaver and Margaret Barter were original members who are still singing the choir, and they have been joined in more recent years by Rob Pendleton, Sarah Robson, Suzanne Price and Sarah Seal, wife of the choir's President, Dr Richard Seal. Richard, being a former Organist and Master of the Cathedral Choir, links in nicely with the choir's roots in the early 1930s.

From the early beginnings, the choir is now a well established and recognised choral organisation, with charitable status, which has sung in cathedrals and other prestigious establishments up and down the country, premiered several first performances, toured abroad and raised in excess of a quarter of a million pounds supporting some two hundred charities in the process. Their next concert is a performance of Mozart's Requiem and Vaughan Williams' Five Mystical Songs at 7.30pm on Saturday 6 July at St Martin's Church, Salisbury (see below).



Recipe of the Month - Pickled Courgettes

With courgette season rapidly approaching, I suspect many of us will soon be dealing with a huge glut of these fast-growing vegetables. Whilst I'm sure we have all accumulated a collection of soup recipes to use them in bulk, this recipe was one I discovered last year, and is incredibly useful in that it preserves the courgettes for several months, allowing you to enjoy them well into the Autumn, Winter and even the following Spring.

I use these pickles in the same way that you might use gherkins: in sandwiches, on burgers, alongside a quiche, etc. I bottle them in sterilized jars and keep them in the fridge once opened.

Ingredients

5 medium courgettes
approx. 80g table salt
500ml malt vinegar
350g soft brown sugar
4 tsp mustard seeds
1tsp tumeric

Method

- Finely slice the courgettes - a mandolin makes this easy but you can do it with a knife too - and layer them in a colander sprinkling them with the salt as you go. Place a weighted down plate on top of them and leave for a few hours or overnight. This will draw out any excess water.
- After the salting, rinse the sliced courgettes and drain well.
- Combine the vinegar, sugar, mustard seeds and turmeric in a large saucepan and bring slowly to the boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar.
- Add the well-drained courgette slices to the pan and bring back to the boil for a short time, no more than a minute - you don't want to soften the courgette too much.
- Transfer the courgettes to sterilised jars, using a slotted spoon.
- Bring the liquid back to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes or so until slightly reduced, then divide it between the jars, filling them to the brim.



Nature Notes - Hemlock Water Dropwort

This is a toxic and potentially lethal plant that everyone in the village should be aware of. It is stated to be the most toxic plant in the UK and is very widespread in Bishopstone. It grows close to water and looks very much like cow parsley or even celery, but bigger and stronger (can be 2m or more). It is found close to the Ebble, Mill Stream, around the lakes, Netton Street and in the area by Faulston bridge.

In most years it flowers a month later than cow parsley, but this year the latter has flowered later and the dropwort has started flowering before the cow parsley has finished. The flowering gives rise to a huge number of seeds and the increases the plant proliferation in the village.

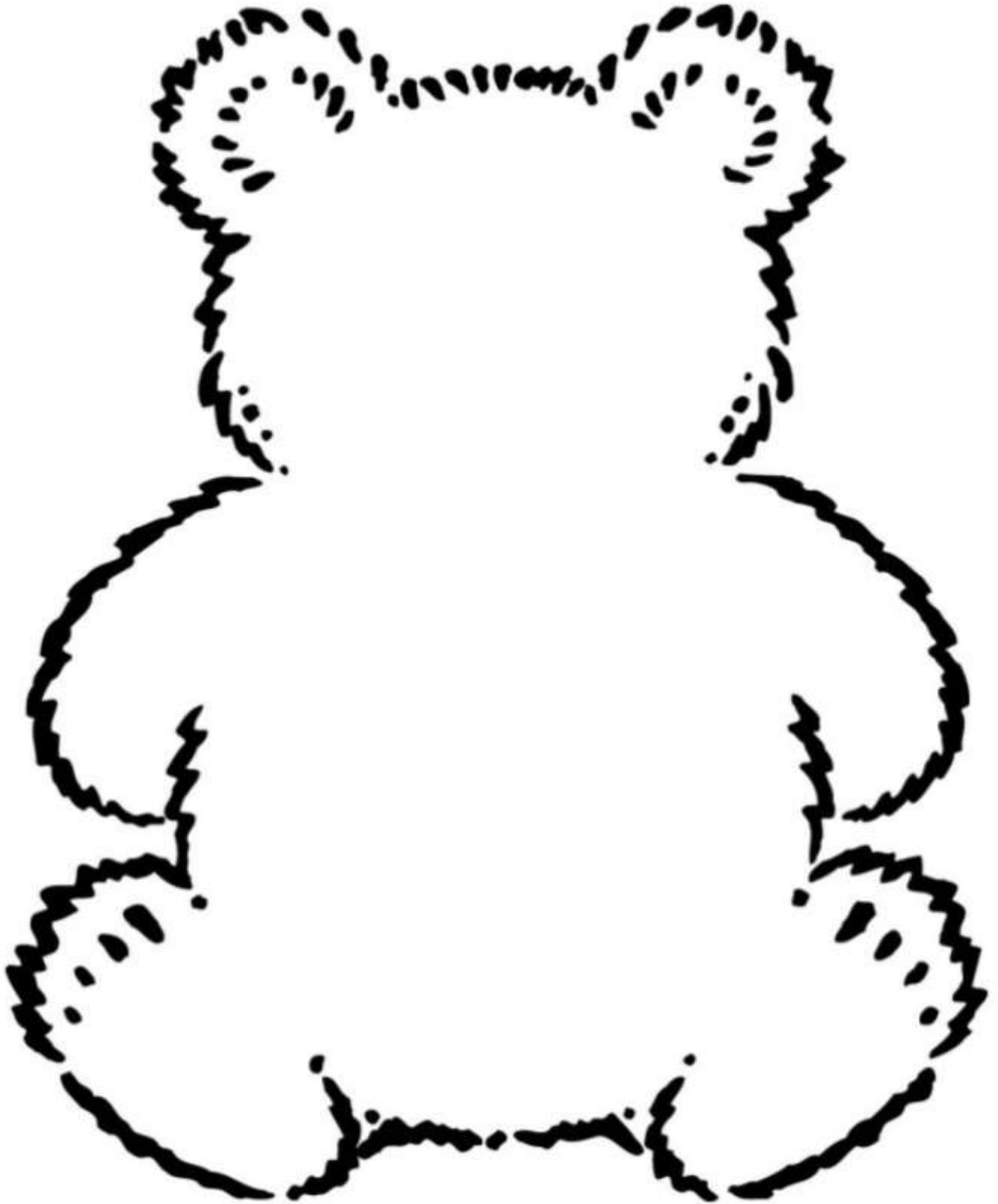
The toxicity increases lower down the plant. Touching the upper parts can cause irritation, but the lower parts can be lethal. The active ingredient is a neurotoxin (oenanthotoxin) has been identified as the agent used for executions in Sardinia, hence to the term sardonic smile on its victims.

It can readily be removed and composted, but as the toxin can be absorbed through the skin, care must be taken to avoid contact with the sap. The plant, particularly when young, is however very susceptible to broadleaf herbicides such as the old Verdone Extra.

Green Corner - Eco Issues - The Wilton Book Bunker

In our May edition we profiled Laura Twomey-Hunt, Wilton resident and passionate environmentalist. She has set up the 'Greener Wilton' scheme, but also repurposed an old telephone box in Wilton which has now been transformed into The Book Bunker (dedicated to her late friend James Bunker, who loved sharing books). The STaB editorial team went to visit it and check out what it has to offer.

So what exactly is the Book Bunker? Well, first and foremost it's a street-library. A place to both drop off and take books (for adults and children) as well as DVDs and CDs. It also serves as a drop-off point for many items that can be recycled, often to benefit local charities.

What can be recycled there? So much! Carrier bags (for reuse), used batteries, used stamps, water filters, crisp packets, milk bottle tops, old spectacles, old pens... and of course the books, DVDs and CDs that you no longer need. More will doubtless be added in the future.

So where is it, and how can I access it? The Book Bunker is situated next to 3 Shaftesbury Road, almost opposite Hingston's Antiques. It's on the left as you are driving out of Wilton on the A30 towards Shaftesbury, and easy to spot as it's just below a large billboard. Sadly, due to a couple of incidences of vandalism, the Bunker is currently kept locked with a combination padlock. If you follow the Book Bunker page on Facebook you can message Laura to request the code, or please feel free to e.mail or ask the editorial team as we know it too!

Sarah's Gardening Tips

Seasonal hints and tips to keep your garden looking its best

1. Don't grow Wisteria in a pot as it needs a deep root run.
2. To create year round interest visit the Garden Centre once a month to see what's in flower and treat yourself!.
3. In a small garden paint the shed black to make it disappear.
4. If you're limited for space but want a tree, grow a Japanese Maple (Acer Palmatum), they are slow growing and look beautiful.
5. Grow ornamental flowers amongst vegetables. They will act as pollinators and can also be cut for the house.
6. Carrots like free-draining sandy soil, in stony soil they will fork as they grow. Alternatively grow round ones or grow in large pots.

Just because you've only got houseplants doesn't mean you don't have the gardening spirit: I look upon myself as an indoor gardener.

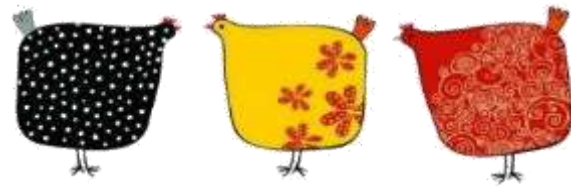
