Parish Council

A virtual meeting of Bishopstone Parish Council took place on Thursday 28th May using Zoom. Roger Stockton, our Emergency Planning Officer, also joined the meeting.

The Chairman, Cllr John Gibbon, put on record his thanks to all those providing support in the village during the Covid 19 pandemic. In particular he thanked Roger Stockton, Mike Ash and Michael and Pippa Pratt, who have done great work in running the prescription collection arrangements. Roger Stockton said that in general the rules on social distancing in the village were being observed though there were isolated incidents of certain people flouting the rules. The Emergency Planning Committee would continue to consider appropriate action.

The main business of the meeting was to approve the annual Governance and Accountability Return, covering the internal audit of the Council's accounts for 2019/20 and the various documents that the council is required to publish on spending during the year. The Council's expenditure in 2019/20 totalled just over £21,000, principally on provision of the new Children's Play Trail. Happily income was also enhanced through the use of developer contributions from previous years (Faulston Barns) and through the reclaim of VAT. The return is available for inspection by local residents and notices about this, and all the key documents, are published on the Recreation Field notice board and on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

The problem of fly tipping was also discussed. Councillor Thorne reported that PC Matt Smith and Wiltshire Councils Fly Tipping Enforcement Officer had both visited the site in Mill Lane that had been the subject of two major fly tipping incidents. They had also inspected the CCTV pictures obtained at Faulston House. It had not been possible to identify the licence plate of the vehicle involved, though certain other possible leads were being investigated. He said that Fly Tipping was now the subject of a new operational initiative between the Police and Wiltshire Council.

The issue of the extensive growth of Hemlock Water Dropwort near the river was also discussed (see separate notice) and it was decided that warning signs should be posted.

As regards Covid-19: all residents should continue to comply with the Government's guidance to maintain social distancing if venturing out. Mike Ash has a supply of masks and gloves. Whilst these are primarily for the use of Area Co-ordinators and Volunteers in the village, if anyone else has urgent need of these items please call him on 781044. ALL RESIDENTS ARE URGED TO STUDY THE ADVICE AND GUIDANCE THAT HAS BEEN PROVIDED, STAY ALERT AND HELP DEFEAT THE VIRUS.

No date was set for the next meeting of the Parish Council given restrictions on public meetings at this time. Meetings will be held, remotely if necessary, as needed and will be advertised on the village website, in STaB when possible and on the village notice boards.

Hemlock Water Dropwort



There is extensive growth of Hemlock Water Dropwort close to footpaths along the banks of the River Ebble this year. All parts of this plant are extremely poisonous to animals, including humans, dogs and livestock. It is considered to be one of the most poisonous of British plants.

Hemlock Water Dropwort flowers during June and July. It should not be confused with Cow Parsley, which flowers from April to June. It is a perennial growing to over a

metre high in shallow water like streams, ditches and rivers. Unfortunately, it is very difficult to eradicate. Digging up and handling the roots presents a hazard to the operator and plant material must be carefully disposed off, ideally by burning. It can be killed with glyphosate based weed killers, but this has to be used before the plant comes into flower and a special licence has to be obtained from the Environment Agency for the use of such chemicals near watercourses.

The Parish Council has consulted the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust who say: "Hemlock Water Dropwort is indeed a very poisonous plant. Ingestion of the plant, and in particular the roots, is life threatening whilst prolonged contact with the rest of the plant and sap can cause skin irritation. However the risk to people walking past the plant along footpaths is incredibly low and we don't usually recommend the removal of the plant unless local factors dictate otherwise".

In the circumstances the Parish Council has posted warning notices along footpaths urging walkers, and particularly those in charge of dogs, to take special care when passing these plants.

Covid-19 Recovery Strategy - Update and Guidelines

Things are changing fast as regards what you can and can't do during the Coronavirus pandemic. This note was written on 20th June – please check regularly on <u>www.gov.uk/coronavirus</u> and the village website for the latest information.

The number of Covid-19 fatalities and infection rates across the country are thankfully falling and the government has set out its plan to return life to as near normal as possible. However, it has made clear that if, after lifting restrictions, it sees a rise in the infection rate, then it may have to re-impose some restrictions. It therefore remains important to stay alert, control the virus, and, in doing so, save lives.



All those in a support bubble will be able to spend time together inside each others homes, including overnight, without needing to stay 2 metres apart. They must be exclusive, so you can't change which household you join with. If anyone in the support bubble develops symptoms, everyone in the bubble needs to self-isolate. This does not apply to those who are shielding due to the

increased risk to this group, but the government is keeping advice for those who are shielding under constant review.

Many non-essential shops are reopening. Wiltshire Council has provided some answers to frequently asked questions on how these will operate – go to <u>http://</u>www.wiltshire.gov.uk/public-health-coronavirus.



It is now compulsory to wear face coverings while using public transport in England. Bus, coach, train, ferry and aircraft passengers must wear a face covering to help reduce the spread of COVID-19. Wherever possible people should continue to avoid public transport and walk, cycle or drive. Face coverings should also be worn indoors in shops etc if it is difficult to observe the 2 metre rule.

You can also now:

- spend time outdoors, including in private gardens and other outdoor spaces, in groups of up to six people from different households, following social distancing guidelines
- go to work if you cannot work from home and your business has not been required to close by law
- attend a place of worship for individual prayer details are elsewhere in this STaB.

Children in early years (age 0-5), reception, year 1 and year 6 can return to childcare or school in line with the arrangements made by their school.

However, the Government has made clear that some people, **including those aged 70 and over**, those with specific chronic pre-existing conditions and pregnant women, **remain at higher risk of severe illness from coronavirus.** As restrictions are eased, this group are still advised to stay at home as much as possible and, if you do go out, to take particular care to minimise contact with others outside your household.

Whilst some of our volunteers have returned to work, the village community support services remain in place, including the arrangements for the collection of prescriptions from Sixpenny Handley. In the two months 27 March - 29 May, our drivers collected and delivered 165 packages of prescriptions for 75 different patients. The village owes a big vote of thanks to all those who are helping others in our community, particularly the team of drivers who are collecting and delivering prescriptions and Michael Pratt, who is organising this service.

Doorstep Sellers - A Warning

During June Bishopstone was visited by a pair of doorstep sellers claiming to be ex-convicts earning money by selling household items. When residents politely declined to buy, one of the men got very abusive, responding with swear words and an aggressive attitude. The Police were called and the vehicle details were taken. A quick online search of 'ex-convict door to door sales' reveals many tales of how this is most likely to be some kind of scam, so residents are urged to be cautious.

Bishopstone Prescription Collection Service

Over the last few weeks there has been a reduction in the number of people wishing to use the medical prescription pickup service from the surgery in Sixpenny Handley. The Emergency Planning Committee is therefore considering reducing this service from the current 5 days a week to 3 days a week (Mon, Wed, Fri).

Whether this is practical depends on a number of issues (eg. whether this creates any problems for the surgery, whether the volume on those days is manageable for the drivers etc). In order to assess the impact of this change we would like to move to a transition period where as many people using the service as possible request pick-up on those days of the week.

We would therefore ask that you contact your Area Co-ordinator well before the date when your prescription is due and ask for it to be collected on either the Monday, Wednesday or Friday preceding the due date or immediately afterwards. For example, if your collection day falls on a Tuesday you should contact your AC and ask for it to be collected instead on the Monday (or on the Wednesday if you have sufficient supplies to see you through).

During this transition period we will maintain the availability of drivers on the "non" collection days in case a request has not been made in time to move to an earlier day or an emergency request arises.

As stated in the last issue of STaB, now that people are returning to work, and may be in their houses less of the time, please remember that if you are requesting a prescription for the following day you can contact **any** of the Area Coordinators if you cannot get hold of yours. We would request that you do not leave answerphone messages if the prescription is urgent, as it may not be picked up in time to be added to the list sent to the surgery for the next day's collection.

A further announcement about changing the arrangements for the collection of prescriptions during the Covid 19 period will be made in due course. This will be communicated via the village website, the village WhatsApp Network or through your Area Co-ordinator, along with the normal update in the next edition of STaB.

Keeping Academic Skills Ticking Over

Some of our children are now back in school whilst those of keyworkers have been in place ever since the Covid crisis began, even throughout the Easter and half term holidays. Every school has approached this strange time in a different way. Some families have been able to access work in resource packs or online from their schools but if you've felt a bit adrift, here are some ideas to keep the brains of primary school aged children ticking over for the rest of the summer.

Maths Skills

•<u>Money</u>: I teach Year 5 and 6 at my school and know that many children don't have access to coins like we used to do when growing up thanks to the advent of contactless payments or on-line food deliveries. Maybe they still have something under their pillow from the tooth fairy or a piggy bank for odd-job money but not all handle the coins that are in circulation. But they still need to recognise the coins, understand giving change and totalling up items on a shopping list. Why not have a pretend shop or use the hand-outs at supermarkets like Aldi and Lidl to make some shopping word problems? Can you dig out those plastic coins that the Early Learning Centre used to sell (showing my age!).

•<u>Measuring</u>: In all year groups, they learn about converting units of measurements (g to kg, cm to m etc) so why not get out the tape measure at home and see who is tallest in the family? Can you rank the family in height order from tallest to smallest? Can you measure everyone's feet in cm? Who can grow the tallest sunflower? Can you help with some baking and use the scales?

•<u>Time:</u> With digital faces becoming common place, many children find reading clocks with hands more difficult. Maybe they could make their own clock with moveable hands using a split pin? Have you got a kitchen timer or stopwatch? Can they time activities like getting dressed or brushing teeth and get used to counting seconds or minutes?

English Skills

- <u>Reading, reading and reading</u>! This really is the most important life skill that they will learn because they use it in every area of school life, even Maths! Maybe your older child could read to their younger siblings? If they are reluctant readers, then try them on non-fiction. Many children prefer facts, especially gruesome ones about Science and History, to fiction. Why not download an audio book? Some of our most talented actors have made recordings of fiction that is more accessible to them in this medium. If they are hearing amazing words and exciting narrative, then it will help feed their imagination and widen their vocabulary. And don't forget to read TO your child yourself, even if they are perfectly capable of reading themselves. Sharing a book is a great bonding exercise and can be a great starting point for discussions. The Library Summer Reading Challenge is now online (see below).
- <u>Diary</u>: that old chestnut! Write a summer diary, encourage them to illustrate it.
- <u>Penpals</u>: Rather than text or message, is there a friend in the village that they can write to? Start an old-fashioned dialogue, ride your bike round and drop it off then wait to see of you get a response the next day? Are you moving up from y6 to "big school"? Could someone in the village help answer your questions and concerns about what school life will be like moving from a lovely village primary to a large secondary school?
- <u>Blurbs</u>: Can you write a new blurb for a book you've just enjoyed? What about designing a different cover page?

Recipe of the Month - Crunchy Courgette Pickle

Based on a recipe on BBC Good Food, adapted by Kate Pendlenton

This is a great way to use up a glut of homegrown courgettes, but can also be made using cucumbers. Eat alongside cold meats and quiches, or as a topping for a burger, these are a really useful condiment to have in the fridge.

Ingredients

500g courgettes
3 shallots or 1 onion, sliced
2 tbsp salt (preferably non-iodised)
500ml cider vinegar
140g sugar
1 tsp mustard powder
1tsp mustard seeds
1/2 tsp dried chilli flakes or a whole red chilli (optional)
1 tsp ground turmeric

Method

Thinly slice the courgettes; it's quickest to do this in a food processor, but can be done with a mandolin or sharp knife. Put them in a bowl with the sliced shallots/ onion and sprinkle over the salt. Cover with cold water, stir to dissolve the salt, and leave for an hour. Then drain thoroughly and pat dry with a clean tea towel.

Put the rest of the ingredients into a pan and bring to a simmer. Let it bubble for 3 minutes, making sure the sugar has dissolved, then leave to cool until warm. Then add the courgettes and shallots/onions and stir.

Scoop the mixture into 2x 500m sterilised jars. Seal and leave for a few days in the fridge before eating. Kept chilled these keep well for at least 3 months.

As one of his first paying customers I can confirm that this is a delicious product, with a perfect crumbly texture. It would make a great gift for someone - or maybe just treat yourself!



Nature Notes - Owls

The owl population of Bishopstone is more often heard than seen. If you hear an eerie screeching and hissing noise then there is a barn owl in the vicinity. The hooting sound we tend to associate with owls is most likely a tawny. I have heard both in Bishopstone at night but only seen a barn owl. The rough field at the bottom of Harvest Lane is a good hunting ground and very occasionally one will swoop silently at dusk causing great excitement.

This silent flight is one of many features which makes barn owls very well suited to hunting prey. Feathers are very soft and the foremost wing feather also has a row of tiny hooks that help to deaden the sound of air hitting the wings' leading edge. They also have very keen hearing and

eyesight which works well in low light conditions and which is particularly good at detecting movement.

Barn Owls have a very low wing loading (large wings supporting a lightweight body). This means they are able to fly very slowly without stalling and hover in only the slightest lift giving the birds ample time to locate and pinpoint prey on the ground below.

Unfortunately all these skills are of little use when confronted with one of the perils of modern life - large areas of glass, as the photo on the right shows. Hopefully the owl in question was merely stunned but otherwise unhurt!

Fly-Tipping Incident in Mill Lane

As indicated in the notes from the Parish Council, fly-tippers struck in Bishopstone in May. First came a load of builders rubble dumped just off Mill Lane on the night of 21 May with a second load of assorted rubbish at the same spot in early hours of 27 May. The police and council were informed and both loads have now been cleared.

So what should you do if you discover fly-tipping? If you are present when rubbish is being dumped, please contact the police with as much information as possible including descriptions of the people, vehicles involved and registration numbers.

Photographs and videos can also be very useful, but only if it is possible to obtain them safely. The more information you are able to provide, the better the chances of an investigation succeeding.

Wiltshire Council have launched a new campaign to encourage you to report flytippers. If you spot someone fly-tipping, report the offender to them, and as a reward you'll get a gift voucher of up to £200 following the payment of a Fixed Penalty Notice or a successful prosecution.

If you come across freshly tipped waste, **do not try to rummage through the** waste yourself or disturb the waste, as this could affect the scene and potential formal action. This may also put you in danger as there could be hazardous or sharp items hidden among the waste. Council staff will carry out a thorough examination of the waste as part of their investigation.

Sarah's Gardening Tips

- 1. Look out for blackened leaves on potatoes, indicating blight. If caught early you can cut off the leaves and still eat the crop.
- 2. Train in the canes of cultivated blackberries and loganberries.
- 3. Harvest blueberries, only picking the bluest fruit as they won't continue to ripen off the plant.
- 4. Pull out stems of willowherb before they set seed
- 5. Keep areas around newly planted trees and shrubs weed-free and wellwatered
- 6. Prune rambling roses that have finished flowering
- 7. Remove algae from ponds as it will spoil the appearance of it and take over.
- Check roses for pests and diseases like black spot fungus, aphids and sawfly. Encourage natural predators like birds, ladybirds and lacewings to help deal with pests.
