Parish Council

The next meeting of the Parish Council will take place on **Thursday 8th July at 7.00pm in the Village Hall**. We will be joined, for the first time, at this meeting by our new Wiltshire Councillor Nabil Najjar.

As the Government has announced that the period of Covid 19 restrictions will be extended until Monday 19th July this meeting will be conducted on the same basis as the one in May. This means:

- If you wish to attend the meeting please send an email to the Parish Clerk (bishopstoneclerk@btinternet.com) by **Thursday 1**st **July** stating how many people wish to attend in your party (maximum of two). Appropriately distanced seating will then be provided. Only those who have pre-registered will be allowed to attend the meeting.
- Those attending will be expected to wear masks and to observe the Covid 19 related protocols set out for the hall.

MyWilts Online Reporting system

Changes To The Way Problems in the Village are Reported

It has been the practice, over many years, for villagers to contact the Parish Council to report problems such as potholes in the road, blocked drainage ditches or gullies, fly tipping, blocked footpaths and other rights of way, uncollected waste etc. However, responsibility for fixing the problem usually rests with Wiltshire Council – either because they have the statutory duty (eg highway maintenance) or the legal powers to require action by landowners.

In the past I would normally have contacted officers in the relevant Wiltshire Council department (Housing,



Highways etc) and discussed the action required. However, a few years ago Wiltshire Council introduced the "MyWilts App" as a means of entering reports on-line for works that needed to be done or action taken. Following the upgrade of Wiltshire Council's website last year, the App has been replaced by the "MyWilts on-line reporting system" and greatly extended. It is now expected that all reporting of issues will be submitted in that way. Indeed my own direct approaches to officers now often receive the response: "please submit a report on MyWilts".

It is therefore increasingly the case that I am just acting as an intermediary post box and that it would be a lot simpler, and save time all round, if those raising an issue did so by submitting their own report on MyWilts. Some people in the village are already doing this.



Submitting a report is pretty straightforward. Go to: www.wiltshire.gov.uk/mywilts-online-reporting. The web page explains what can be reported and how to do it. You can submit a report anonymously, without having an account – though if you do that you will not receive updates as your case progresses. You can set up an account – with your email address and a password – which allows a fully interactive use of the system. The system works on smart phones, tablets or computers.

It is a map based system. For highways you enter "Bishopstone" in the map search box and a drop down menu of local roads appears, click on the relevant road and a series of boxes pop up asking questions on the nature of the problem, exact location (outside number 9 or whatever) etc. For Rights of Way there is a RoW Map – click on the relevant path and enter details of the problem in the next box on the screen. It is possible to add attachments, such as photographs or relevant documents. The map shows you what current issues have already been reported – so a further report is unnecessary.

The Parish Council would therefore be grateful if everyone with a problem to report does so themselves, in the first instance, using the MyWilts system. If you do submit a report it would be helpful if you could let me know (by emailing me on bishopstoneclerk@btinternet.com) so that the Council is aware of what issues have been raised. If it is not possible for you to use the on-line system, please contact me to discuss.

We are pleased to confirm the following events as we move towards full opening.

We shall continue to follow government guidelines to keep the hall a Covid-19 safe venue, which are:

Do not attend if you or anyone in your household has had Covid-19 symptoms within the previous 48 hours.

At least until 19th July, anyone entering the hall will be required to:

- Hand sanitise on entering and leaving the hall, and before and after using the toilets.
- Follow a one-way system as marked by arrows on the floor.
- Wear a mask. Masks can be removed when seated if eating or drinking.
- Maintain at least 2 metres distance between individuals or groups, which can be no more than six people or two households. (Once in a group, you cannot swap to another group). Outdoors, groups of 30 can now gather.

Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

The hire charges include use of heating and electricity.



New Picnic Benches: We have invested in some specially branded Chalke Valley Sports Centre picnic benches to provide spectator and social areas for all the Centre's activities.

Make Someone Welcome Campaign: In partnership with the Go Out Get Active Project we have pledged to make everyone welcome at the Sports Centre. If you have ever considered coming and seeing what activities are available but then thought 'they are all going to be too good for me, I'll just feel out of place', then don't worry, all our Clubs and activities have pledged to make you welcome.

You can either turn up on a Club evening; email the sports centre general email; or email one of the Committee or Club reps and we will be in touch and make sure you don't feel out of place. Getting Our Community Active Again Project: In recognition of the constraints we have been under as a consequence of Covid-19 and to encourage more people to get outdoors and take up a new sport or activity, we have developed a project to

- Wiltshire Community Foundation: £2021 for basketball facilities.
- Go Out Get Active: £1000 for equipment and additional support facilities.
- Wiltshire and Swindon Sports Partnership: £2000 towards Pickleball courts.
- Broad Chalke Community Fund: £200 towards the bench seating.

We would like to thank all the organisations for their support and for the funding provided. This will help to bring more opportunities for all sections of our community to take part.

Pickleball: Following receipt of the grants, we have now developed three outdoor Pickleball courts. This is a great sport for all ages and abilities, as well as it being played competitively. It's an ideal introduction to tennis and is played on a small court (about the size of a badminton court) with a bat called a 'paddle' (like a large table tennis bat) with an air ball the size of a tennis ball.

The Moonrakers Pickleball Club have become affiliated to the Sports Centre and had their first Wednesday evening Club session in June. New members are welcome, and if you are not sure what it is all about why not come along with family and friends to the **Come and Try It Open Evening:** on Wednesday July 7th between 6.00pm- 8.00pm. All equipment provided.

The Sports Centre's regular **Programme of Club Activities** includes tennis, cricket, table tennis, short mat bowls, football, pilates and yoga. Full details on our website and Facebook page.



Fire in Stanley Close

As many readers will already be aware, two homes in Stanley Close, Butt Lane, were affected by fire on Tuesday 1st June. Happily nobody was injured but one house has been totally destroyed and the other badly damaged.

The alarm was raised at about 12.45pm, with the first fire appliances arriving thirty minutes later. By this time one house was well ablaze. Many appliances attended, including from Poole, Southampton, Shaftesbury, Tisbury, Downton, the Wallops, Salisbury and Wilton together with a Command Unit vehicle. There was some initial uncertainty as to the location of the nearest fire hydrant (see separate note). The Hydrant was identified by a contractor from Outdoor South West who had seen it on a previous visit to the village. This was in the verge on the north side of Broad Chalke Road and hidden by tall grass. The hose was laid across the road and Butt Lane was closed to traffic, so traffic management arrangements had to be put in place. The blaze was finally brought under control and one appliance stood watch over night damping down and making sure there was no re-ignition.

Thankfully the two families concerned were physically unhurt, but one has lost almost all their possessions and the other has been badly affected. Both families moved in temporarily with relatives elsewhere in Wiltshire, but, at the time of writing, their long term housing arrangements are unclear.

The one positive aspect of this was the way that the village rallied round to help. Thanks are due to those who raised the initial alarm. Thanks also to Lee Curtis and the team from Outdoor Play South West who were working on the Children's Play Area, and who assisted Piers Edwards and Roger Stockton (past and present Emergency Planning Officers) in dealing with the traffic management issues.

Most particularly, thanks go to Zara Goodier and the staff at The White Hart, for looking after the families, and for setting up the appeal, through the Bishopstone WhatsApp Network, for clothing, bedding and other necessities for the families. The pub then acted as the central collection point for the numerous donations received. Two gofund.me sites were also set up to provide support for both families, to which many in the village have contributed. Rescued possessions were taken to the Village Hall and then to safe storage using boxes donated by Test Valley Packaging the company run by village resident Jerry Steedman.

It remains to be seen whether the two families are able to return to the village in due course. In the meantime we all wish them well and hope that they can make a full recovery from this terrible incident.

The Grand Bishopstone Hydrant Hunt

Are you aware of where the nearest fire hydrant is to your property and is the marker board plainly visible?

One issue that arose with the fire in Stanley Close was that both the indicator sign and the hydrant cover were in the verge of Broad Chalke Road and were obscured by long grass – see photograph.

Hydrant marker boards are yellow, with a black **H**, and show the size of the water main and the distance to it. Modern signs show these measurements in millimetres and metres, whereas older signs use inches and feet – both types of sign are in use in the village.



The Parish Council has been trying to obtain a map of hydrant locations so that it can ensure that they are kept clear. Unfortunately, this information is not made public. We therefore intend to keep our own record – as part of the Bishopstone Emergency Plan. We have so far located eight hydrants, but would like to check that there are no others.

So we are launching the "Grand Hydrant Hunt"! If you are aware of a hydrant near your house, or spot one when you are out for a walk with your dog, or want something to keep the children occupied – just record the location and call me on 781044 or email bishopstoneclerk@btinternet.com. The person with the most reports will get a big thank you in a future STaB! If you see a hydrant marker that is obstructed – please clear the obstruction (and don't park your car or put your bins in front of them).

Incidents such as that in Stanley Close should make us all more "fire aware" – make sure we have working smoke detectors, that minimum electrical appliances are left on when we go out, that washing is kept away from wood burners, that cooking is not left unattended etc... preventing the fire in the first place is the key, and we should modify our behaviours to help with that.

Dorset & Wiltshire Fire and Rescue Service offer "Safe & Well" visits to all householders. It is a completely free service – providing smoke alarms and an inspection of your home to identify fire risks. For more information go to: www.dwfire.org.uk/safe-and-well-visits or call 0800 038 2323.

Improving the Bus Service

Wiltshire Council has asked for suggestions for improving bus services in the county.

On 15 March this year the government published "Bus Back Better" a national bus strategy for England. The aim of the strategy is to deliver better bus services for passengers across England, through reform of how services are planned and delivered. Some £3bn has been set aside to be spent in this parliament to implement the strategy.



As a prelude to this strategy the Government has granted Wiltshire £671,000 as revenue support to help to improve the provision of local bus services in our area in one or more of the following ways:

- improve current local bus services for instance increasing evening or weekend frequencies, or supporting additional seasonal services in tourist areas;
- restore lost bus routes where most needed to ensure people have access to public transport services;
- support new bus services, or extensions to current services, to access e.g. new housing, employment opportunities, healthcare facilities etc.

Wiltshire Council did conduct a previous consultation on this but is re-opening the process for further ideas. At the moment they are only asking for suggestions for new services or changes/additions to existing services. As the National Bus Strategy is implemented, they will be asking for suggestions of improvements that would make significantly more people use public transport. This will be the subject of a further consultation in due course.

Any suggestions for improvements to the bus service along the valley need to be sent to the Bus Network Manager at buses@wiltshire.gov.uk by Wednesday 14th July 2021.

Bishopstone Ultrafast Broadband Update



The project to bring Ultrafast (Gigabit) full-fibre broadband to Bishopstone is ongoing. We submitted our request to Openreach some weeks ago and received a response with few questions. Hemlock Water Dropwort

Once again this year there is extensive growth of Hemlock Water Dropwort close to footpaths along the banks of the River Ebble and in some nearby roads. All parts of this plant are poisonous to animals, including humans, dogs and livestock. It is considered to be one of the most poisonous of British plants.



Hemlock Water Dropwort flowers during June and July. It should not be confused with Cow Parsley, which flowers from April to June. It is a perennial growing to over a metre high in and alongside streams, ditches and rivers. Unfortunately, it is very difficult to eradicate. Digging up and handling the roots presents a hazard to the operator and plant material must be carefully disposed off, ideally by burning. It can be killed with glyphosate based weed

killers, but this has to be used before the plant comes into flower and a special licence has to be obtained from the Environment Agency for the use of such chemicals near watercourses.

The Parish Council has consulted the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust which says:

"Hemlock Water Dropwort is indeed a very poisonous plant. Ingestion of the plant, and in particular the roots, is life threatening whilst prolonged contact with the rest of the plant and sap can cause skin irritation. However the risk to people walking past the plant along footpaths is incredibly low and we don't usually recommend the removal of the plant unless local factors dictate otherwise".

In the circumstances the Parish Council has posted warning notices along footpaths urging walkers, and particularly those in charge of dogs, to take special care when passing these plants.

Road Closure

Portfield Road – the road down to Wilton – will be closed to traffic on Thursday 15th July for one day for road surface dressing. This is one of 16 road closures in and around Salisbury during July. A link to full details is on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

Notice of Restricted Access to Public Footpath

Access along the public footpath between Flamstone Street and Croucheston may be disrupted for a few hours during the week commencing 26 July 2021. This is to allow for essential pollarding works to take place on the tall willow trees beside the footpath and on other overhanging trees in the vicinity of the Old Dairy water meadow.

The tree surgeon contractors will do their best to keep the path open, but in order to prevent danger to users from the overhead works and falling branches, there will be times during the affected days when the path should not be used and barriers will be placed across both ends of the path while work is being carried out.




Marjorie and Freya chronicled some of the history and legends of Faulstone and Bishopstone....

Crossing the river to Faulstone, you come to Wilderness Wood, an island formed by the division of the River Ebble at this point. It has recently been cut down (approximately 1953) for re-planting, but was principally beech with some oak and chestnuts and a variety of poplar. Snowdrops flourish here and also monkshood. It is very swampy and legends attach to it......

That it was once a lake in which the monks of Wilton used to fish.....

That once a horse and cart (and driver) went into the wood and never came out, nor were they ever found in the swamp......

That once a young lady of the House of Vaughan living at Faulstone Manor, loved a snake in this wood and came daily to talk to it; so her father cut off its head and the young lady pined and died; and as a witness thereto a snake surmounts the Vaughan coat-of-arms in the north transept of Bishopstone Church

Stars Appeal News

Stars Appeal funds equipment to speed up diagnosis and treatment for lung cancer and other respiratory patients

Thanks to diagnostic equipment funded by the Stars Appeal, lung cancer and other respiratory patients at Salisbury Hospital can be diagnosed more quickly and no longer have to travel to bigger specialist hospitals.

The charity has funded £170,000 worth of advanced equipment in the Respiratory Department that has enabled the introduction of two new procedures, endobronchial ultrasound (EBUS) and thoracoscopy.

EBUS is a diagnostic technique that's especially useful for suspected lung cancer and related conditions. It uses a camera attached to an ultrasound machine that goes into the patient's lungs. The doctor can look at tubing in the lungs and nearby lymph glands on screen. As part of the procedure the doctor also takes a sample from the lungs. EBUS allows detailed analysis which helps the respiratory team design and deliver more targeted treatments.

Thoracoscopy enables the examination of the space between the lung and chest wall. It uses a specialist camera to let doctors look at the pleura (lining of the lung) and the area surrounding the lungs and is an important diagnostic and therapeutic intervention for lung cancer patients. It allows fluid to be drained from the pleural space, the pleura to be biopsied and treatment to be given to the lining of the lung to prevent more fluid from building up, all in one procedure.

The new equipment means patients now get results in as little as 72 hours. Previously patients had to travel to Southampton for tests, and the process of diagnosis and starting treatment could take 3-4 weeks. So patients can now get a diagnosis more quickly and start their treatment as soon as possible

Dr Richard Harrison, Respiratory Consultant said: "Thanks to the generous people who support our Stars Appeal we have revolutionised our approach to the early diagnosis of lung cancer and other respiratory conditions. This is undoubtedly improving the outlook for our patients. It's already helping hundreds of people a year and that will only increase. This is speeding up diagnosis, stopping unnecessary slower tests and giving us more information from one test. Because we can diagnose and stage lung cancer together we can create a treatment plan more quickly at what is a very distressing time for patients and their families, and ensure they continue to see the Salisbury medical team they've already got to know."



Recipes of the Month - Using Elderflower Cordial

By Kate Pendlenton

I'm sure that many of us will have made a batch of Elderflower Cordial this Summer. It's so easy to do, and so satisfying to make use of what is easily foraged from the hedgerows. It makes a delicious drink of course, but I thought it might be useful to explore some other ways it can be used:

Elderflower and Lemon Syllabub

Whip 300ml double cream into soft peaks, then gently fold in 2 tbsp elderflower cordial, and 1 tbsp lemon juice. Serve in glasses (serves 2-3).

Elderflower Icing

Add a couple of tsp of elderflower cordial to sifted icing sugar, plus enough water to make a thick spreadable icing. Use to decorate biscuits or fairy cakes.

Elderflower G&T

Add a measure (or to taste) of elderflower cordial to your regular gin and tonic.

Elderflower Spritz

Mix a measure of cordial, a measure of vodka, a few mint leaves and a squeeze of fresh lime juice in a glass, then top up with prosecco.

Elderflower and Strawberry Sorbet

Put 550g hulled strawberries into a blender or food processor. Add 100ml water, 200ml elderflower cordial and the juice of half a lemon, and whizz for 2-3minutes until smooth. Sieve into a bowl and chill for 2 hours. Pour the chilled puree into an ice-cream machine and churn until frozen.

Elderflower Thins

100g salted butter, softened 100g caster sugar

1 medium egg 1 tbsp elderflower cordial

200g plain flour, sifted 1 tsp baking powder, sifted.

Mix all ingredients into a soft dough. Shape into a cylinder, about 4cm in diameter, wrap in baking paper and chill for 2 hours.

Preheat oven to 190/fan 10/gas 5. Unwrap the dough and cut into about 50 thin slices. Bake on lined trays for 10-12minutes until golden.

Freezing Cordial

Don't forget that elderflower cordial can also be frozen (in plastic containers - and leave room for expansion when it freezes) so you can enjoy the taste of Summer all year long. The amount of sugar in the cordial prevents it from freezing too solid, so it can easily be scooped from the tub straight into a glass to make a chilled drink.

Sarah's Gardening Tips for July

- 1. As your penstemon flowers fade, cut them back to just above a bud to encourage more flowers.
- 2. Cut back delphiniums after the first flush to encourage new growth and more blooms.
- 3. Divide bearded iris so they have time to recover for next year.
- 4. Harvest garlic when the tops bend over and go yellow.
- 5. Pick, dry and freeze herbs for use over the winter.
- 6. Stop harvesting rhubarb. Leave the stems in place; this will encourage the plant to build up reserves for next year.
- 7. Earth up potato plants to stop the tubers going green or put grass clippings around them as a mulch.
- 8. Feed citrus fruit trees through the summer with special citrus fertiliser.
- 9. Check gooseberry bushes for sawfly larvae, which can strip the leaves in a matter of days. Jet them off with water or pick off by hand.






