

Parish Council

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday 9th May. Sadly only three members of the public attended. The minutes of the meeting are available on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk). Councillor John Gibbon was re-elected as Chairman of the Council, with Councillor Ali Thorne re-elected as Vice Chairman.

The meeting received a report on the internal audit of the Council's finances for 2018/19, which had been signed off without comment, and approved the Annual Governance and Accountability Return for submission to the external auditors and for publication on the village website. The meeting also formally approved the budget and outline expenditure plans for the year 2019/20. The main items of expenditure will be on improvement of the Children's Play Area and, potentially, the Salisbury Ladies Football Club project.

Councillor Gibbon announced that, unfortunately, he would need to stand down later this year from his role as Team Leader for the Community Speed Watch and in deploying the Speed Indicator Device. It is therefore desirable for new volunteers to be found to help control speeding through the village. A separate notice about this is included elsewhere in this edition of STaB *(see following page - ed).*

Other issues discussed were:

- The refurbishment of the Children's Play Area. The Clerk reported that discussions had taken place with parents from the village about the design of a possible "play trail" to replace the train in the Play Area. As a result a selection of component elements for the trail had been identified and quotations for the cost of supply and installation had been obtained. Information from three of the main providers of this type of equipment suggested that the project was likely to cost in the region of £8,000. It was agreed that this should form the basis of a bid to the South West Area Board of Wiltshire Council for grant assistance.
- Speeding at the east end of the village. The speed of vehicles along the High Road past the junction with Church Lane is making it very difficult for drivers to leave Church Lane safely. It was agreed to request that a Metro Count be undertaken to establish the facts. Consideration would then be given as to appropriate action.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday 11th July at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All are welcome to attend.

Note from the Editors: Following some reader feedback we have moved the names and phone numbers of the Parish Councillors and the Village Hall Committee to the end of the magazine (p50). This should make it quicker and easier for our readers to find the relevant contact numbers in the magazine.

SPEEDING THROUGH THE VILLAGE

Additional volunteers are needed for our Community Speed Watch Team and to help set up the Speed Indicator Device. The CSW and SID are the main means we have of encouraging drivers to slow down and obey the speed limits along the High Road/Broad Chalke Road. This is important – it could save a life.

You can help with either CSW or SID, or both. Putting SID in his place merely requires some muscles and 20-30 minutes of your time twice a month. Training is given.



Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.



"MY FIRST WEEK AS MANAGER OF THE HUB" An interview with Tony Patel

Q: So Tony what are your first impressions?

I must say first of all how grateful I am for the warm welcome I have received from everyone. So many people have introduced themselves to me which I have really appreciated and has made my first days as manager of the HUB, so enjoyable. But my first impressions are of the friendly atmosphere that exists at the HUB particularly between the staff, our volunteers, and our customers. This is Ellen's legacy and I am very proud to have inherited it from her. It is my determination that this should continue as I recognise that this is what makes the HUB the special place it is.

Q: It must be very different for you to run a business where volunteers play such an integral part.

Yes it certainly is but in many ways this is what appealed to me about the job in the first place. Having now been here for two weeks, it is clear that this unique model really does work. I am so impressed with how hard the volunteers work and how flexible they are in adapting to the day-to-day challenges. I particularly like seeing the way a volunteer one day becomes a customer the next. I had my first experience of putting out a plea for help when we were short of staff one day and the response from volunteers was fantastic. The dedication they show is truly impressive and I can see at first hand, how much they are appreciated, particularly now of course by me. I even found that one of our volunteers used to be my GP! And with the wonderful Judith, Sharon and Sarah I could not feel better supported.

Q: Have you started thinking about any changes you might make?

Obviously there are a number of ideas that are already in my mind but nothing will happen too quickly or without first consulting with my team. Everything I suggest will be measured against the original objectives of the HUB so as to maintain its core purpose and objectives, namely to serve the local community and to provide a safe place for people to meet, eat and enjoy themselves, either alone or with friends.

Q: On the business side – what opportunities do you see?

Well I am looking at each area of the HUB in some detail to see how we might create more revenue by using some spaces more productively. For example it is quite possible that with a bit of reorganisation we might be able to stock a wider selection of wine. I am also looking at the sales figures for individual products to see if they justify the space they occupy. An interesting example of this is that, to my surprise, we only sold three candles in the last eight months yet we stock quite a few which take up valuable space. So this is the sort of review I am undertaking, but if we make changes they will be done carefully and always with our customer's interests in mind.

Q: So Tony, would it be safe to say that you are pleased to have taken the job? Most definitely. I am feeling very excited and enthusiastic about being involved and helping the HUB move forward from the very solid base that I have inherited. No business should stand still and the HUB is of course no exception. I am confident that there are things we can do to improve our offer to customers but all in good time and always with an eye on maintaining the special atmosphere that has made the HUB the special place it is today. News from Coombe Bissett School

Dear Friends,

Although the weather has been a little on the cold side this month, everyone has been making great use of our new play trail. With the addition of all-weather safety matting, the children have been able to enjoy exploring and challenging themselves on the different pieces of equipment – especially the 'Twister Beam'!





On the last day of our spring term our whole school took part in workshops on the different events in Holy Week. Children from all year groups worked together, learning and exploring in the morning. In the afternoon family and friends joined us on an Easter journey; starting in the Village Hall, travelling to the school and finishing in St Michael and All Angels Church. Each group of children were responsible for sharing, through words, drama and craft, the event and its meaning.





A popular tradition at Coombe Bissett School is our May Day dancing. Family and friends joined us for a wonderful display from all the children in our school. Our younger children performed two circle dances: Com Hompton Hop and the Circassian Circle. Fir Class then performed a ribbon dance and the very popular 'Long John Silver'. Finally Ash Class performed three Maypole dances: the Barber's Pole; The Plait and The Spider's Web – a wonderful afternoon enjoyed by all.





This term, Oak and Elm class had a wonderful time at Coombe Bissett Nature Reserve Farm. They had a very interesting talk by Mel and Anne from Wiltshire Wildlife all about the workings on the farm. They learnt about the animals they would encounter as they went to explore and what other wildlife was resident on the farm. They learnt lots about health and safety and about what it was like to be a farmer. Then they met farmer Lucy and farmer Sarah, who let us watch her sheep being sheared. This was a first for many, the children were fascinated and asked lots of questions. Everyone enjoyed seeing the newly sheared sheep leap with joy in the sunshine and having the opportunity to feel their woolly fleece; it is amazing how huge the fleeces were when laid out! After this everyone went into the barn to see the lambs. This was very exciting as everyone got to stroke the lambs and see them close up. Finally each session ended with a fantastic trailer ride across the Nature Reserve where lots of wildlife was spotted and named while admiring the beautiful surroundings on our doorstep. Thank you so much to Wiltshire Wildlife Trust and Coombe Bissett Farm for a wonderful morning of hands on learning in the great outdoors.



The creative arts are an important part of our school and we provide a rich and exciting curriculum for all our children. This year we were again successful in enabling all of our Key Stage Two children take part in a music performance at Salisbury City Hall. Organised by Wiltshire Music Service, the children enjoyed two singing workshops at school, learning a selection of space themed songs before travelling to the City Hall to perform with children from other local primary schools. The children were accompanied by an orchestra that also performed a range of classical and modern pieces.

Finally, I would like to share a report by two of our year 6 pupils (Kezia Richter and Julia van Leeuwan) about their class trip to Salisbury Cathedral.

On 31st April Ash Class (Years 5 and 6) visited Salisbury Cathedral for a 'Chilling Gothic Tales' workshop. We split into three groups of approximately 10 students with one adult per group. Next we met our guides – Gill, David and Jim.

We met different characters from the cathedral's past. Lady Catherine Grey, the sister of Lady Jane Grey who was Queen for nine days. Lady Catherine told us about her family, her life and her imprisonment in the Tower of London.

Another character we met was King John who signed the Magna Carta. He told us about his broth Richard the Lionheart – he didn't exactly like him that much!

Near the font sat Agnes Cooper, a poor widow who lost her husband and children to the plague. A few hens, her only source of income to survive on, were killed and eaten by a fox.

The final character was a woman, the gossiper, who told us a true story about an organist who disappeared one day.

After lunch outside on the West Lawn, we visited the characters again to ask them questions.

Finally, we experimented with real quills and ink, wrote our names and copied 'Gloria in excelsis deo et in terra pax' (Glory to God in the highest and peace be on earth).

All in all, we had a fabulous time, learnt some amazing things and returned to school bursting with ideas for our own gothic tales.

Alabaré is leading a national collaborative art project called 'Flags of Thanks' as part of the 2019 Armed Forces Day celebrations hosted by Salisbury. People have been invited to create customised 'flags' to reflect their gratitude and support for the Armed Forces Community. The finished works will feature in a public exhibition during the event in June, at St Thomas's church in Salisbury.

The general public will be able to sponsor a "flag" made into something useful, such as a sleeping bag or quilt. These will be gifted to residents of Alabare's Homes for Veterans. Lt. Col. Neil Stace, also known as the Sewing Soldier from his appearance on "The Sewing Bee" on TV is spearheading the project, running workshops and leading the transforming of the flags into finished items.

I decided that I must take part in the project. As a military family we lived in Germany for several years in two different areas. During that time I was employed by SSAFA as a health visitor and worked with both air force and army families. We

were based in the medical centres and we covered anti-natal and postnatal care, immunisation and baby clinics. I therefore felt it was important to recognise the work done by SSAFA (formerly the Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association) a UK charity that provides lifelong support to serving men and women and veterans from the British Armed Forces and their families or dependents.

As a keen quilter I chose to make a quilted 'flag' and to reflect SSAFA's badge in the design. The 'flags' will be displayed in St Thomas's Church between the 24th and 30th of June.



Lottery Grant Award - Chase and Chalke Valley Landscape Partnership

A £1.68 million grant from the National Lottery Heritage Fund was awarded on 10 May to Cranborne Chase Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) for the Cranborne Chase and Chalke Valley Landscape Partnership project. The fiveyear project, which totals £2.7million thanks to additional match-funding from partners, aims to unlock the secrets of Cranborne Chase and the Chalke Valley.

Roger Goulding, the scheme's development officer, said: "Over 6,000 local people have already been involved in the creation of this project with more than 350 volunteer days donated. This project is for everyone. Whether you live in or around Cranborne Chase and the Chalke Valley, we welcome everyone who wants to join in and get involved. We can't wait to get started."

A selection of the project highlights include:

• **Nurturing Nature**: a biodiversity programme which aims to improve 375ha of habitat for species including Adonis blue butterflies, farmland birds including yellow hammer and corn bunting and mammals such as water voles, with 3,400 volunteer days on offer involving practical training.

• **Crystal Clear Ebble**: to protect, restore and improve 22km of this important chalk river to tackle run off and alien species.

• **Wonderful Woodlands**: to create, manage or improve at least 115ha of woodland and to train 90 people in woodland skills and crafts.

• **Greater Grazing**: to transform grazing on the third largest unbroken chalk grassland in the UK to benefit 15 key species and 10 ancient monuments.

• **Starry, Starry Nights**: to monitor the dark skies to aid International Dark Sky Reserve status and train at least 12 new Dark Sky Champions.

• **Champions for the Past:** an extensive archaeological programme to engage people in the towns around the AONB. More than 4,000 children will receive 'dig boxes', there will be 'Horrible History' style roadshows and an app to help bring the hidden landscape to life.

• Ancient Ways: to improve or restore 110km of rights of way with newly promoted walks, cycle rides and walk leader training.

• **Community Arts**: to include writing competitions, theatrical productions and an oral history project to capture stories of traditional land management, such as water meadow management, coppicing or hurdle making.

Recipe of the Month - Elderflower Fritters

Ingredients

For the Batter 125g plain flour 25g of caster sugar 2 tablespoons of olive oil 150ml water a pinch of salt. 2 egg whites 8 elderflower heads, rinsed in cold water, insects and debris removed. Enough oil to fry the elderflower heads in.



<u>Method</u>

- 1. Make the batter, by mixing together the flour, caster sugar, olive oil and water until if forms a thick batter.
- 2. Cover and leave for 30 minutes.
- 3. Whisk the egg whites until "soft peaks" and fold into the batter.
- 4. Dip the washed elderflower head (one at a time) into the batter and fry until golden.
- 5. Remove the head from the oil, drop quickly onto a piece of kitchen towel to soak up the excess oil.
- 6. Eat while hot and crispy, perhaps with a little more sugar, or honey and a slice of lemon.

Nature Notes - Crayfish Invasion

The tranquil waters of the Ebble are home to an alien predator which threatens the survival of the native population. We are talking of course about crayfish, specifically the North American signal crayfish (*Pacifastacus leniusculus*). These were introduced to the UK by the government in the 1970s as a commercial alternative to the native species for export to Scandinavia. Inevitably, signal crayfish soon escaped from captivity and have decimated the local populations by spreading the deadly crayfish plague and outcompeting the native white-clawed crayfish for habitat and food. The invaders cause further problems by burrowing into river causing erosion, bank collapse and sediment pollution. Their burrows also displace threatened riverside species such as Britain's water vole .

You might imagine that catching these troublesome incomers (which incidentally are excellent to eat) would be encouraged. This is not necessarily the case. Anyone wishing to trap them must apply for a trapping licence from their local Environment Agency office. Do not be surprised is a licence is refused as trapping



trials have concluded that although numbers may be reduced during the short-term, traps may favour the capture of larger individuals. An unintended consequence of such selective harvesting is the increased growth and earlier maturation of juvenile crayfish, which can cause the population to increase.





Village Memories - Olive Moody (née Kent)



MEMORIES OF THE CHALKE VALLEY

Apart from living in Ford for 23 years, I've lived in the Chalke Valley all my life. I was born at Tottens Farm, Coombe Bissett, the youngest of 5 children and spent my childhood there. My earliest memory, aged 4, is being tossed by a cow in the farmyard – a punishment for fondling her calf! My father, a dairy and arable farmer, was also a drowner, proud of his water meadows, and kept them in immaculate condition.

From an early age we had to work on the farm: feeding hens, collecting eggs, milking cows, even driving tractor and trailer from hile to hile (old SW England for stook) at harvest time, and treading sheaves on the rick. There was also great freedom to roam at will, cycling miles around the valley to other villages to visit family and friends, sledging on the lynchetts, and growing to love the flora and fauna, particularly the abundance of wild orchids. It was a very sociable and secure life of a close community, with a focus on the chapel and its music, particularly the carol singing when a harmonium was put on a trailer, pulled from place to place by a tractor. The rhythm of the flooding of the meadows and the course of the river Ebble, which ran through the farm, was the rhythm of our lives. In the river we played, learned to swim, gathered watercress, fished for minnows with jam jar and string, trapped eels, occasionally caught crayfish, and devised perilous games on the hatches.

One of my most rich and abiding memories is lying on my back on the downs, watching the skylarks rising above me and listening to their song. Larks still soar above the Valley and whenever I hear them, or Vaughan Williams' *The Lark Ascending*, it links me to that memory and the timelessness of this place. Another early memory at 14/15 years of age is travelling to both Bristol and Plymouth with Ralph Whitlock and his father to take part in a BBC Radio 'Young Farmers Quiz' and 'Children's Hour Country Quiz'. I earned the princely sum of ¹/₂ guinea and 1 guinea respectively. Good money in those days!

SCHOOL

I attended Coombe Bissett school where I thoroughly enjoyed outdoor nature walks. During the war, I remember that some pupils from the school went potato picking at Flamstone Farm. A back-breaking occupation but lovely to be in the fresh air rather than in a classroom! We also picked certain plants to be used for medicines. I continued my education at South Wilts Grammar School for Girls. When my parents retired, I moved to Homington with them. I played the organ at Homington Methodist Chapel for 19 years.

After leaving school I joined the staff at Uplands Preparatory School, where my sister Rozalie (who now lives in Bishopstone) was co-principal. I taught 6/7 year olds, and singing throughout the school. After I married, I took posts as a peripatetic piano teacher at Sarum St Michael's Teacher Training College (now Salisbury Museum), Bishop Wordsworth's, Godolphin and South Wilts Grammar Schools.

HOW DID YOU MEET YOUR HUSBAND?

I met Gordon Moody through the Salisbury Chamber Music Club and we were married at Homington Methodist Chapel in 1961. Our wedding reception was held at Flamstone Farm, Bishopstone, a wedding present from Don and Gertie Thorne my brother-in-law and sister, who lived there at the time. Gordon and I lived at Ford enjoying our family of 3 boys - Neville, Howard and Roger - before moving to The Croft, Bishopstone in 1984. I have lived in the same house for 35 years.

INTERESTS

In 1985 I founded the Bishopstone Singers. We have sung at many church services over the last 34 years, and have had the privilege of singing in the Long Gallery at Montacute House.

I sang with, and sometimes conducted, the Farrant Singers for 37 years and also sang with the Salisbury Musical Society for 60 years. I enjoy travel, theatre, gardening, attending classical concerts and opera. In my youth, swimming and tennis.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE HOLIDAY?

I have enjoyed many lovely holidays but our trip to the Holy Land in 1967 was the most re-awakening.

YOUR FAVOURITE BOOK?

I enjoy reading fact rather than fiction, particularly biographies.

YOUR FAVOURITE MUSIC?

Wagner operas.

It is a joy and a privilege still to live in the same river valley in Bishopstone, to have that sense of place and continuity. I have a wide family network in villages along the length of the Chalke Valley and many activities keep that sense of community and friendship alive, particularly the music making, with the carol service which I rehearse still at the heart of village life. Some of the everyday things of my childhood, such as orchids, are now only found in conservation areas, but they are still there. The downs on either side of the valley still enfold and almost seem to protect it.

Windwhistle Farm Charity Shoot - 3-5 May 2019



Over the weekend of 3-5 May there was a Charity Clay Shoot at Windwhistle Farm. Over 450 shooters attended this event organised by Greenfields Gun Shop in Salisbury and Ali Thorne. Good weather and an occasionally tricky wind made for some testing clay shooting. The main event aimed to raise funding for Salisbury District Hospital's Stars Appeal, specifically the very worthy **Benson Suite**. The suite was built for couples who were to have a still born baby or for couples whose child has a limited time to live. Every year, thousands of local families experience the joy of the arrival of a new baby at Salisbury District Hospital. Tragically, for a very few families, the hours or days after birth are the only time they will have with their babies.

Whilst midwives provide support and care of the highest quality, until the opening of the Benson Suite, there were no dedicated facilities at the hospital where these families could give birth away from the main facility, spend precious moments together as a family and begin to grieve.

The facilities running costs are about £10,000 per annum and by the time STaB is published a cheque for £10,000 will have been presented the Stars Appeal to cover a year's costs.

Over and above this, the coffee, tea and BBQ Stall at the shoot raised an additional £1,500 which is being donated to Salisbury Cancer Research.

So well done to the dedicated team at Windwhistle Farm and Greenfields Gun Shop for this tremendous local effort.





Sarah's Gardening Tips

Seasonal hints and tips to keep your garden looking its best

- 1. For pots in a shady front garden: Try azaleas and rhododendrons (use ericaceous compost), lungwort, heuchera, epimedium and hellebores.
- 2. Keep pond water topped up and remove blanket weed.
- 3. Edge the lawn will instantly make the garden look better.
- 4. Set slug traps with cups of beer (What a waste!), milk or malt drinks. Alternatively use wool pellets or crushed eggshells
- 5. If you don't want to grow herbs from seed buy a plant in the supermarket, it will be cheaper than the garden centre and can be planted out into the garden.
- 6. Feed courgette plants with a tomato feed every 2 weeks after the flowers have formed and don't let them dry out, they are thirsty plants.
