Preparation of new Church Electoral Roll for 2019

Every six years our church has to prepare a new Electoral Roll. This means that anyone wishing to be on the Roll, including those already on it, need to register again. Being on the Roll gives you a vote and voice in Bishopstone Church matters. Copies of the Roll Application Form are in the church and can be obtained from Anne Stutchbury our Electoral Roll Officer (01722 780339)

As many of you will know, Salisbury has a special link with the Sudan, and our own Chalke Deanery is linked with the Diocese of Cueibet in South Sudan. Some of you will know of the death of Canon David Henley last December. David's vision as Rural Dean led to our deanery forming the Chalke-Cueibet Partnership in 2012. The following is an excerpt from the January 2019 newsletter from the Chalke-Cueibet Link:

Chalke Deanery Support in 2018

The main focus of our support in 2018 has been on Education. We have continued to fund the attendance of two theology students, Charles Chol and John Luke, at Kajo Keji College and it is planned that a further four students will begin studying in 2019. Meanwhile, in Cueibet itself, there has been a huge expansion of the church primary school.

In 2015, there were four classes with 200 pupils, taught under the shade of trees and during the April to September rainy season, in the Cathedral. There is now a full range of Primary Classes 1–8 with over 960 pupils taught in separate Morning and Afternoon sessions. The free lunch provided is the only meal of the day for the majority of the pupils. An Accelerated Learning Programme (ALP) has started for older pupils who have come late to education and are considered to be better motivated. Teaching is from 14.00-17.00 and is condensed into 2 primary stages in 1 year. The second cohort of these students completed their course in December.

We have funded three brick built classrooms but two more are needed. The school is still relying upon 2 trained teachers and 10 volunteer assistants. Retention is a big challenge so we are continuing to assist with the payment of basic salaries.

What does the Parish Council do?

Parish Councils have a vital role to play by acting on behalf of the communities they represent. In recent years Bishopstone Parish Council has played a major role in:

- securing mobile phone coverage in the village
- updating the children's play area and maintaining the Recreation Field
- putting in place proper emergency planning and response arrangements
- promoting action to reduce speeding through the village
- dealing with development proposals such as Faulston Barns
- providing new facilities, including public seating and a community defibrillator
- working with Wiltshire Council's Parish Steward to ensure road and drain maintenance
- securing and managing allotments for the use of villagers
- helping riparian landowners to properly maintain waterways through the village
- representing the village at meetings of Wiltshire Council groups such as the South West Wiltshire Area Board, Community Transport Group, Community Safety Group etc.

The Parish Council also provides financial support to village organisations such as the Parochial Church Council, STaB magazine and the Village Hall.

We live in a beautiful part of the country – we need to look after it. We have a community – some of whom need our support. Bishopstone Village Hall has 2 rooms that are available for hire for a wide range of functions. The larger room is ideal for children's parties with lots of space for running around. It can also accommodate wedding receptions, charity functions and large family celebrations.

The smaller room (The Memorial Room) is a good size for meetings and smaller gatherings.

The modern kitchen is spacious and fully equipped with an electric catering range, a professional 4 minute dishwasher, water boiler, hot cupboard, microwave oven, 2 fridges and a freezer, all suitable for professional caterers. There is also glassware, crockery and cutlery for over 80 people.

The hire charges include use of heating and electricity.



OTHER NEWS

A new supplier. We will now be stocking Premium Organic Beer from a new larger-based brewery in the Wylde Valley called **Blonde Brothers**. The ethos of the Brewery is to combine the highest organic and environmental standards with the latest technology and brewing techniques. Their beers are gluten-free and vegan friendly. The barley is grown on the family farm and brewed with water from their own bore hole.

Blonde Brothers describe their beers as "*clean tasting and balanced.....a contemporary fresh flavour for everyday patrons of honest beer*".

To maintain this custom pancakes will definitely be on sale in the Coffee Shop on Shrove Tuesday!


Mothering Sunday -31st March

The Trussell Trust

History of the Trussell Trust

Today they support over 1,200 food bank centres across the UK and provide emergency food and support to people locked in poverty, while also campaigning for change to end the need for foodbanks.

When, why and how was it founded?

Carol and Paddy Henderson founded the Trussell Trust in 1997 based on a legacy left by Carol's mother, Betty Trussell.

The Trussell Trust's initial Bulgaria projects focused on improving conditions for the 60+ children sleeping at Central railway Station in Bulgaria.

In 2000, Paddy received a call from a mother in Salisbury saying “ My children are going to bed hungry tonight – what are you going to do about it?”

Paddy investigated data on poverty and deprivation in the UK and found that significant numbers of people faced going hungry as a result of a sudden crisis. So Paddy started **Salisbury Foodbank** in his garden shed and garage, providing three days of emergency food to local people in crisis.

Chalke Valley Watercress

Once considered a weed, watercress was cultivated in the U.K. in the 1800s, and was being commercially grown in Bishopstone in the 1880s. The historical popularity of watercress can be seen due to the steam train networks that sped the watercress from the growing regions up to Covent Garden.

Watercress grows wild in the Ebbles that flow through Bishopstone and can be harvested at any time of year. However, foraging for watercress comes with warnings of misidentification of the plants as well as parasitic liver fluke infestation and so with any foraging, it should only be undertaken after careful research.

Although watercress is no longer produced in Bishopstone, it is still grown and sold in Broadchalke by the Hitchings family. They have been growing and selling watercress in the Chalke Valley for five generations, keeping the tradition of watercress production in the valley alive and providing the local population with a delicious, readily available and locally sourced food.

Ten Watercress Facts

- (1) Watercress contains more Vitamin C than an orange, calcium than milk, more iron than spinach and more folate than bananas!
- (2) Watercress was first cultivated in Germany in the 1600s.
- (3) James Cook used watercress to prevent scurvy in his sailors and so allowed him to circumnavigate the globe three times.
- (4) Watercress was recorded as one of the items on the menu of the first Thanksgiving.
- (5) Hippocrates used watercress to treat blood disorders.
- (6) In Crete, it is believed by the islanders to be an aphrodisiac.
- (7) Watercress is a member of the mustard family.
- (8) Roman emperors ate watercress to help them make "bold decisions".
- (9) Watercress is native to Europe and Asia and was introduced to America in the 18th Century.
- (10) Watercress soup became popular when it was claimed to cleanse the blood.



Recipe of the Month

Watercress Soup

To mark the renewal of watercress sales from our local producer after their short Winter break, our recipe this month is for watercress soup.

It is hard to exaggerate the wholesome qualities of watercress. It ranks number one on the US Centre for Disease Control's Powerhouse Fruits and Vegetables list! A 100-gram serving of watercress only contains 11 calories, but is very rich in vitamin K (good for bone health) as well as containing significant amounts of vitamin A, vitamin C, riboflavin, vitamin B6, calcium, and manganese.

It is believed to be beneficial in the prevention of a range of conditions, including diabetes, cancer, heart disease and various eye conditions.

As it's grown locally, it is also good for the planet. This recipe comes from the website of Chalke Valley Watercress in Broadchalke. You can buy your watercress directly from them for 75p for a 100g bunch.

1 onion chopped

25g butter

250g potatoes diced

600ml chicken stock

2 bags or bunches
watercress, chopped

50ml cream

A little milk if needed

Seasoning



In a large pan, sweat the onion in the butter until soft but not browned.

Add the potato and stock, cook until the potatoes are soft (approx. 15 – 20 minutes).

When potatoes are almost cooked, add the watercress (try to allow no longer than 5 minutes cooking time for the watercress).

Liquidise, add cream. Use a little extra milk if the soup seems too thick.

Season with salt and black pepper and serve hot.

Tales from the Time Capsule


These photos are from the 1963 Youth Club Concert. Does anyone know who these young performers are? Please let us know if so!

Village Memories - Anne Webb



A love of flowers from an early age!

EARLIEST MEMORIES

I moved from Coombe Bissett to Throope, Bishopstone around 1946/47. My earliest memories are winter and deep snow. The family always walked on Sundays, and I remember stepping over barbed wire fences in the snow. Our playground was the farm. Using my doll's pram as a trolley we used it down the cinder tracks. Before I went to school I had to learn to ride a bike to get there. It wasn't easy learning on the grass, over mole hills. We had to clear mud from the mudguards and the wheels with a stick. I can still see the old milk churn stand at the end of the track, between tall elms (which were later cut down with Dutch Elm disease).

In the early 1950s the American tanks at Throope used to zigzag through the hedges on the farm. I remember finding opened baked beans tins left behind by the soldiers.

When I was 13 years old I sold all my dolls, prams, doll's house and trains to buy my first racing bike. On Saturdays we would cycle to Salisbury to do shopping.

SCHOOL/WORK

I started school at Bishopstone, where we learned to write in a sand tray practising the letters. Then I went on to Wilton Secondary Modern where I was really happy. At age 7 I had an operation on my eye, which had prevented me from reading clearly, so after that it was wonderful.

Jenny Bundy (nee Thorne) taught me to ride, and horses became a huge thing in my life. I left school at 16 years as Head Girl and also remember learning to use a telephone at school in the Headmaster's office, as we didn't have a phone at home. I was a member of the Wilton Hunt Pony Club and was permitted to miss some school to take part in Pony Club rallies. From the age of 8 years I rode Lord Head's horses.

I worked at Throope, calf rearing a herd of Red Polls, and reared several bulls for showing at Shows. I still look after 1 pony at Throope today so have spent a lifetime with horses. I also worked for Caroline Lamb at Knighton, but as the horses went, gardening took over my time.

I worked for 6 months at Lambourn, working with race horses, and that is one of the few times I lived away from Bishopstone.

For 19 years I drove the mini buses for schools at Harnham and Coombe Bissett.

WHAT ARE YOUR HOBBIES OR PASTIMES?

Flower arranging, photography (sticking the photos in albums, not kept on the computer), jigsaw puzzles. I really enjoy flying in helicopters. I used to do gliding from Compton Abbas airfield.

After I was 16 years I made all my own clothes. I had an auntie who was a milliner so she would make hats for me.

I'm the treasurer of the Chalke Valley Flower Club, and also belong to 3 other clubs - Salisbury, Fordingbridge and Flora Mundi Clubs.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE HOLIDAY?

I love Canada and have visited 3 times – St Lawrence River, the Great Lakes and the Falls. The favourite has to be Bear Paw Lodge in Calgary for New Year.

YOUR FAVOURITE BOOK

Black Beauty by Anna Sewell as a child, which I read and re-read. It would make me cry.

FAVOURITE MUSIC

I enjoy all music.

BUCKET LIST

Hot air balloon trip – preferably along the Chalke Valley.

IMPORTANT THINGS YOU'VE LEARNED IN LIFE

REGRETS IN YOUR LIFE?

Horatio's Garden, the national charity started in Bishopstone, creates and nurtures stunning gardens in NHS spinal injury centres for all those facing the realities of paralysis and long stays in hospital.

The charity was founded as legacy to our eldest son, Horatio. Horatio loved the beauty of the Chalke Valley and really appreciated the benefits of the natural environment. His inspiration, following his time volunteering in the Salisbury Spinal Injury Centre, forms the founding principles of the charity – to make lives better for everyone affected by spinal injury.

Following the success of the garden in Salisbury which opened in 2012, a year after Horatio had died, we have opened gardens in Glasgow and Stoke Mandeville and our fourth garden in the Midlands will open this summer.

Each garden has been carefully developed into a stunning oasis by a leading garden designer, including Cleve West, James Alexander-Sinclair, Joe Swift, and Bunny Guinness.

Celebrated garden designer Tom Stuart-Smith has given his expertise to design the next garden in London and Sarah Price will be designing the sixth garden in Cardiff.

We have always aspired to create spaces which are the antithesis of the ward; places that offer both tranquility and community to patients and their families.



This would be simply impossible without the help of our remarkable volunteers, who maintain the gardens throughout the year with the guidance of a Head Gardener. They also support patients with gentle garden and art therapy sessions and they are always on-hand in the gardens and garden rooms to offer tea and cake to patients and visitors, providing them with the warmth and normality that can sometimes be absent from a clinical environment.

We rely solely on the generosity of our donors and supporters to bring these beautiful sanctuaries to people throughout the UK. In the future, we hope to have a Horatio's Garden at each of the nation's eleven spinal centres.

This summer we are launching a Horatio's Garden Fabulous Summer Tea Party – supported by Joanna Lumley – as a national fundraising initiative from 3 - 9th June.

Lazy Birds!



Sarah's Gardening Tips

Seasonal hints and tips to keep your garden looking its best

1. If you want to put new bulbs in your pots every year replant the old ones in your borders. You'll get a free display!
2. Ivy is good for wildlife, it offers pollen when it flowers and nesting sites for birds.
3. Divide and thin out Grape Hyacinths if they stop flowering. Add some bonemeal in the planting hole then add tomato feed the following year when they start to come up.
4. Plant a Daphne in your garden for lovely foliage and gorgeous scent They suit well drained soil and are frost hardy.
5. Use your patio for pots and short term colour which can be changed throughout the year. Use walls to create height and colour with climbers.
6. Visit other gardens large and small to get inspiration for your own. This could be Kew, the NGS (National Garden Scheme) or your next door neighbour!

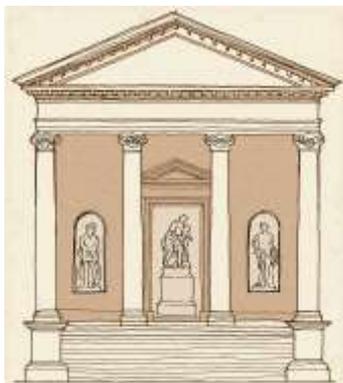


