REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY ... 11th NOVEMBER 2018 Remembrance Sunday falls on the 11th of November this year, and we will hold our Service of

Remembrance Sunday falls on the 11th of November this year, and we will hold our Service of Remembrance in the church, starting at **1050 hrs (10.50 am)**, to ensure we hold the silence at 1100hrs exact! We are honoured this centenary year that the Right Rev the Bishop of Salisbury is taking our service. We offer him a sincere and warm welcome to our little church.

This year we remember all the 23 men from Bishopstone who are named on our War Memorials, especially those who fell in 1918:

Pte Charles Baker, 7th Bn Wiltshire Regiment, aged 25, killed in action on 7th October and is buried at Vis en Artois.

Pte Arthur Gregory, 284th Bn Machine Gun Corps, aged 32, died of wounds on 11th January and is buried at Ypres Reservoir.

Pte Herbert Judd, 5th Bn Canadian Infantry, aged 37, died on 12th March and is buried at Aix Noulette.

2Lt Reginald Penny, 1st Bn Wiltshire Regiment, aged 20, killed in action on 1st September and is buried at Beaulencourt, Ligny Tilloy.

Dvr James Read MM, Royal Field Artillery, died in France in 1918, and is remembered on their family grave.

We look forward to a good attendance from the village. Collections for the RBL Poppy Appeal will begin on Saturday 27th October on the house-to-house basis as usual.

'There, But Not There' soldier silhouettes will appear in church on 27th October, and a Cross of Remembrance will be placed at the altar for personal memorial notes. A small display of related items and art will be on show over Remembrance Weekend.

CENTENARY REMEMBRANCE 2018

This year we remember the 100th Anniversary of the Armistice of 11th November 1918, when the fighting ceased on the Western Front, and the guns fell silent. Birds could be heard again, the trenches filled with chatter, but still the cries of the injured could be heard. At home, the weeping of the bereaved mothers, wives and sisters could be heard, mixed with the shouts of joy for those returning. Meanwhile, the hospitals were coping with some of the most dreadful injuries and disfigurements ever seen, as well as the mental horrors suffered by others.

It was a terrible time for everyone, and our little village, Bishopstone, suffered with the Country. We lost a total of 17 men who are listed on the Church Memorial plaque. A further 2 are listed on the Village Hall



memorial plaque, and another 4 are listed on other memorials. It seems that our village lost a total of 23 men to the Great War for Civilisation. What is not clear, how many came back home in 1918 and 1919, after their service overseas? How many served only in England?

We have two stories here, one of those who are lost, and another of those who came home. We know those who died for freedom, but can any families here tell us about the joy of getting loved ones back home after the Great War? There must be some stories to tell, and I ask that these too are shared with us. After all, those men did their bit for the Nation during the Great War, as much as those who died.

We are remembering this great anniversary with additional interest this year. From 28 October, you will see silhouettes of the 'There, but not There' figures appearing in the church. They will arrive two a day, every other day,

until we have the six in place. They will help us remember all those who served the Nation from 1914 until 1918/19. The figures will represent the Royal Navy, the Army, the Royal Flying Corps/Royal Air Force, the Merchant Navy, the civilian services such as Police, medical and nursing services, Fire Service, railways, and of course the Women's Services, to include munitions, steel workers, factory workers, farm workers and drivers. There are many to remember, as this was a truly national team effort.

Specially for this Centenary Year, there will be a replica of the standard Great War grave cross in a barbed-wire wreath at the High Altar, where those who wish to remember someone from the Great War or any subsequent wars can leave a note in remembrance. There will be small cards in the church, where visitors can write the name of any relative who died whilst serving their country, in any war, together with other details if they wish. These cards will then be fastened to the barbed wire around the cross to form a wider memorial to those who have given their lives for their country.

To support this, there will be a small display of art work and memorabilia connected with the Great War, in

the Chancel for Remembrance Weekend. Stewards will be available to help interpret the items on display. We hope that many of you will come to view the silhouette figures and the display.

For Remembrance Sunday, there will be the service at 1050 hours, conducted by the Rt Rev the Bishop of Salisbury, Nicholas, to be followed by the curry lunch in the White Hart Inn, courtesy of Tom and Zara. We trust that both occasions will be fully supported, and more details are in the separate advertisement.

BISHOPSTONE PARISH COUNCIL

The latest meeting of the Parish Council took place on Thursday 13th September. The minutes of the meeting are available on the village website (www.bishopstone-salisbury.co.uk).

The main issues discussed were:

- Use of the Recreation Field by Salisbury Ladies Football Club. An update was provided on this project in the village. SLFC had begun training in Bishopstone and are seeking pre-application advice from Wiltshire Council as regards planning permission for the provision of changing rooms on the site of the old Recreation Field Pavilion. The Parish Council has obtained estimates for the connection of water and electricity supplies to the pavilion site and for re-establishing the toilets. These works will not be undertaken until it is clear that planning permission will be granted. In the meantime steps are being taken to clear the pavilion site of trees and scrub.
- **Speeding.** The management of Gurston Speed Hill Climb had replied to the letter from the Parish Council about vehicles breaking the speed limit along the High Road through Bishopstone on days when events were held at Gurston. The reply set out a number of steps they have taken to remind those attending events to observe the local speed limits. There is some evidence to show that speeding had been less of a problem at recent events. The operation of the Community Speed Watch was discussed and is the subject of a separate article in this edition of STaB.
- Vandalism in the village. A comprehensive report on recent incidents of vandalism and other anti-social behavior in the village had been sent to the Community Policing Team. No response has yet been received and it was agreed to send a reminder.
- Allotments. Wiltshire Council had agreed to extend for another five years the lease to Bishopstone Parish Council of the allotments in The Styles. A request had been received to provide a water stand pipe for the use of allotment holders. The cost of a connection by Wessex Water and the works on-site could be as much as £4000. It was decided that this project was probably unaffordable and that consideration should be given to alternatives, such as the provision of a water storage tank on site that could be filled from an outside source.
- White Hart Pub. In 2014 the Parish Council was successful in having the pub placed on the Register of Community Assets held by Wiltshire Council. This provided certain safeguards if the owners of the pub, Enterprise Inns, wanted to dispose of it. That designation will expire in January 2019. It was agreed to make an application to renew the registration.
- Miscellaneous. The Parish Council had been consulted about the Local Government Boundary Commission review of Wiltshire Council. This is looking at the size of the Divisions represented by Wiltshire Councillors. It was agreed to submit a return that emphasized the importance of keeping the Chalke Valley parishes together in a single Division. Cranborne Chase AONB had asked for support for their bid for the AONB to be an International Dark Sky Reserve. Whilst there was support for this proposal, it was decided to seek further information of the implications of that status for the area. Annual grants were agreed to the PCC, for maintenance of the graveyard, STaB magazine, the Village Hall and the Chalke Valley Sports Centre.

The next scheduled meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday 8th November at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

DO YOU CARE ABOUT SPEEDING THROUGH THE VILLAGE?

This might seem like a silly question. For many years local residents have pressed the Parish Council, Wiltshire Council and the Police to take action to extend and enforce the speed limits along the High Road and Broad Chalke Road. Yet surprisingly, there seems little active support in the village for those who try to do something about this problem and, in some quarters, only negative comments and criticism. At the meeting of the Parish Council on 13th September the steps that had been taken to discourage speeding in the village were reviewed. The Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been put in place and is effective if used for short periods. The Community Speed Watch (CSW) has operated for 3 years. Some 38,000 vehicles had been checked and more than 800 speeders reported. This was having some effect and the numbers reported each time are declining.

For their part, the Police have made it very clear that their resources for speed enforcement are limited but that they give priority to locations where CSW teams are in operation. So the Police will help communities that help themselves.

The CSW team has operated for 128 sessions of about an hour each, often in the cold and rain. The team comprises half a dozen people but John Gibbon and Rob and Jan Goodfellow have been the core members who turn out nearly every time. John and Rob also do all of the heavy work in setting up the SID. The village owes them a debt of gratitude for giving up their time and energy. Instead they have increasingly been the subject of criticism and negative comments on social media by some members of our community. At the meeting John Gibbon and the Goodfellow's expressed their disgust and disappointment at the way they have been treated. As a result John will be devoting less time to this activity and unless the village swings fully behind the CSW team others are bound to follow. If the Bishopstone CSW team reduces or stops operations, then Wilts Police will not support speed control measures.

Nobody thinks that the SID and the operation of the CSW are the complete answer to getting drivers to obey the speed limits. But no other options are available. It is completely unrealistic to think that major changes can be made to the road layout, or traffic calming measures introduced. Despite numerous attempts to persuade them otherwise, Wiltshire Council will not reduce the speed limits further.

If villagers really care about the safety of themselves and other road users, in particular children and the elderly, then things have to change. More people are needed to operate the CSW and, more importantly, carping and mocking the efforts of those who are prepared to contribute needs to stop. Those who criticise the CSW team have a simple choice: carry on whinging and sniping and see a complete cessation of all speed control measures or get behind the team and provide support. VANDALISM AND ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR IN THE VILLAGE

At the Parish Council meeting on 13th September (see elsewhere in this STaB) I reported that no reply had been received from the Police as regards the information we sent them about Vandalism and ASB in the village. Since then a reply has been received. PC Matt Holland has apologised for the fact that we did not get a reply but has said that Police patrols were increased over the summer. They have also been monitoring crime and incident reports and note that nothing has been reported recently. He emphasizes that if incidents have occurred they should be reported on 101.

Some of the issues we reported related to the use of catapults. Apparently catapult related damage seems to have been a bit of a theme this summer and similar issues have arisen in Wilton and Harnham. PC Holland says he would encourage local residents to report any incidents or damage to the Police promptly, if there are sightings of kids with catapults, these should be reported via 101 which will give the Police a chance to respond and identify those involved.

MY SHEPHERD'S CROWN By Harold Williams age 9

I was walking through our field one day and I came across a rock. I picked it up and found that it had strange markings. I thought it was a starfish, but when my dad saw it he thought it looked like a sea urchin. When we looked online we found it was a Shepherd's Crown, which is another name for a fossilised sea urchin, also called an Echinoid. The name comes from Greek 'ekhin' meaning Spiny and 'ooid' meaning egg-like. The one I found was 35 million years old and evolved in the Jurassic period, by the time it had evolved, it's spines were defenceless against preditors and so it was able to burrow in the sediment at the bottom of the

The sea urchin must have been buried in sediment, while burrowing for food. Then over millions of years the sediment formed chalk.

They are found world-wide in chalky areas. In the olden days Spanish people through they were stars fallen to earth and paid a lot of money for them. The author Terry Pratchett ,who lived in the same chalke valley as me wrote a book called the Shepherd's crown.

I had recently heard of a phenomenon called Facebook. As the youngest of 3 sisters, we had a very happy childhood. My Dad worked for Reg Thorne at Manor Farm (it was then called Wort and Thorne), ploughing with horses. We used to meet him at the end of work when he took the horses back to the stables. Then tractors came into use in 1940 which replaced the horses. I remember playing down by the river Ebble; at harvest my mother would make up a family picnic which we ate in the fields. We used to picnic at the Races, watching the horses. There were many activities in the village, a Youth Club, tennis, badminton, billiards, darts, football and cricket. At that time most people walked everywhere or went by bicycle.

HOW LONG HAVE YOU LIVED IN BISHOPSTONE?

All my life except for 3 years in Wylye.

HAVE YOU ALWAYS LIVED IN THE SAME HOUSE HERE?

I was born in No 5 Manor Farm Cottages in 1936 and stayed there until the age of 10. Then we moved to No 10 Manor Farm Cottages across the road. When I married Les in 1956 we lived in Wylve for 3 years.

On 5th November 1960 we returned to Bishopstone and were the first couple to move in to the newly built Whitlock Rise with our daughter Janice and son Nicholas. Our house was blessed by Reverend Humphrey Hall, the Rector of Bishopstone.

WHAT DID YOU DO IN THE WAR?

I was quite young, but I remember we had 3 cousins from London who were evacuated with us. A family arrived next door with nothing, and everyone rallied round to give them bedding etc. One of the soldiers from the Searchlight Station, John Porter from Pontefract, asked if anyone had a spare bed for his wife to come down one weekend. My mother put her up, and their friendship remained during their lifetime.

SCHOOL & WORK

When I left Bishopstone School I went to South Wilts Grammar School in Salisbury. I left there when I was 16, and went to work as a horticulturalist at Hedley Coombes nursery on the Downton Road (where the BP garage stands today). I loved the job and grew all the carnations from cuttings. I worked there until I was married. When the children were older I got a full time job with MRC (Medical Research Centre) at the Common Cold Unit in Salisbury on the Coombe Road (which is now a housing estate). I was responsible for all the linen and the stores in the Unit, and the volunteer flats. Also I did their shopping, placing their bets at the bookmakers, etc! As they were volunteers who had to be in isolation for common cold research, they couldn't wander at will. The last volunteers left in 1989, so I was made redundant. Then I worked as deputy Manageress of the Swiss Chalet (bakery) in the George Mall. The shop closed and I was made redundant again. I then worked for Reg and Ruby Thorne helping them in 1995. I finally retired in 2006.

HOW DID YOU MEET YOUR HUSBAND?

Les and I met at a dance held at the Michael Herbert Hall in Wilton. Les had just come out of the army and his father was a Sgt Major in the RAF Regiment, stationed at Boscombe Down. His family came from York.

WHAT ARE YOUR HOBBIES OR PASTIMES?

Reading, gardening, cooking and singing with The St John's Singers until 2006, but I still sing with The Bishopstone Singers.

My latest hobby is short mat bowling at the Sports Centre in Broad Chalke.

WHAT WAS YOUR FAVOURITE HOLIDAY?

Greek Islands. Les loved them. The first time we went to Cefalonia, the airport was nothing more than a shed.

YOUR FAVOURITE BOOK

I love reading but no special favourite.

FAVOURITE MUSIC

Church music, choral and music from the shows.

IMPORTANT THINGS YOU'VE LEARNED IN LIFE

Be honest and trustworthy. My mother used to say 'Do the best you can'. I am very lucky to have 6 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.

VILLAGE HALL CAR PARK

Planning permission for refurbishing the village hall car park was confirmed on 4 September. This will allow the village hall car park to be resurfaced in October. Sufficient money has either been raised or is being pledged to allow the urgent work to be carried out before the winter.

The confirmed start date is **8 October** and work is expected to continue for up to three weeks. The work will consist of scraping and levelling the existing car park surface, installing kerbing around the whole area and laying tarmac to the surface. At the same time the driveway will be levelled, kerbstones installed on the edges of the driveway and a new tarmac surface laid.

Bollards will be installed and a blue badge parking area is to be included.

While this work is carried out there will inevitably be some disruption, though hopefully the end result will be well worth the minor inconveniences caused. Potential disruption may be summarised as:

- Contractors traffic on Butt Lane
- Complete closure of the car park
- Cancellation of some events in the village hall e.g. coffee morning
- Temporary diversion of the public footpath along the edge of the car park
- Noise from machinery and equipment being used by the contractors.

The Village Hall Management Committee apologies in advance for any inconvenience this may cause.

When equipment, machinery and stores are being moved onto site residents may find using Netton Street and Harvest Lane is an alternative route to the High Road.

This notice is prepared on 6 September and aspects of the project may change between now and publication at the beginning of October.

Further details and updates will be posted and are to be found on the village website.



RECOLLECTIONS OF CHILDHOOD



'Will you need a cushion, love?' the driver asked. 'Yes please' I said. I had never ridden in a taxi before and I wanted everyone to see me. I felt like a little princess as we turned into the avenue, Beaconsfield Road.

High walls each side, big houses behind them. The driver stopped and got out to open the big red gates. They swung back wide. He drove up the drive to the front door which was opened quickly.

I looked at my father. 'Better get out, lass', but why the strange look? I looked at the house. We couldn't live here in this posh house, but we were ushered in by one of the staff. She greeted us warmly and told us to sit down. Matron would come.

Were those tears in my father's eyes? I was feeling agitated myself. I began to cry. I just wanted to go home. We had a little chat with the lady, then she rang the bell for someone to come.

'Give your father a nice cuddle and say goodbye for now, and someone will show you around, and where you will be sleeping.' What did she say? I burst into tears. I gave my father a big cuddle. He left swiftly. I knew he had tears in his eyes. I just sobbed. He promised to come soon.

I was taken into the bathroom and said loudly 'My what a big bath.' The lady liked that and said it would be put in the 'War Cry', the Salvation Army magazine. Then into the bedroom with 3 pink beds. One girl sat on her bed. Tears again. 'Cheer up,' she said. 'You'll be here until you're 16 and soon you will love it' - and I did.

Strawberry Field was a Salvation Army children's home in Liverpool. The house and estate was sold by a wealthy merchant to the Salvation Army in 1934, opening as a home in 1936 for 40 girls. The name was immortalised by John Lennon and the Beatles. It had meant so much to John in his childhood, and he used to go to the Strawberry Field Garden Party every year and a group of boys would nip over the wall and sit in the trees.
